



Vision...

... seeing things at a great distance and with great depth.

... a consuming, passionate, and compelling *inner* picture.

... seeing what others may not see.



First, we envision or "see" the people we lead...

before we outline what action is desired of them!

"Open the eyes of my heart, Lord..."

We envision ministry ... not just to the people, and for the people, but ministry with the people and ministry by the people!

A theological vision is an inner picture of our identity and calling...

- who we are as the people of God,
- what we are called to do in the mission of God, and
- **how** we are to live together as the family of God.

Christlike leadership is grounded in these biblical perspectives ... not just in organizational skills.

The primary motivation of our actionsmust be *deeply theological.*

l and Thou

The most healthy and mature relationship possible between two human beings ... an I-Thou relationship.

In such a relationship, one recognizes that both are made in the image of God.

l and Thou

This makes the other person a "Thou" to me.

Every person deserves respect—that is, I treat them with dignity and worth.

They are God's own creation to be served with *respect, dignity, and grace.*

<u>I –It Relationship</u>

We relate to others... as individuals to be "dehumanized" or "objectified" by us for **our** benefit... **our** purposes!

"Whoever wants to become great among you must first be your servant, and whoever wants to be first, must be slave of all. For even the Son of Man did not come to be served but to serve" Mark 10:43-45a. Jesus made leading... dependent upon service to others.

All Christians are called to this ministry of serving others in Jesus' name!

We use our leadership gifts and graces in developing the equally specific gifts of the people whom we lead and serve.

We nurture, mentor, model, and reflect this theological vision through

- clear communication with our people,
- integrity in our relationships,
- the way we make and implement decisions, and
- the credibility we establish through serving them and working with them.

Servant leadership is the transference of theological vision!

One transformative insight...!

God grieves... when we fail to treat those we lead as the people of God, as brothers and sisters in Christ, as the fellowship of the Spirit, and as members together of the family of God (*Eph* 4:25-5:2, especially 4:30b).

The Spirit of God is deeply concerned with the speech of His people.

EED YOU I FORGIVE YOU I trust You **LOVE YOU** Saccept you IRESPECT YOU l accept your forgiveness I SERVE YOU

When we do *not* live together by these guidelines, God is *grieved* (*Eph 4:30b*).

Offending a sister or brother by a false word or act especially grieves God.





Our gentleness should be known to all (Phil 4:5).

Our words are to be channels of God's grace to others (*Eph* 4:29).

Guard against sarcasm, judging, cynicism, condescension, and gossip (*Eph 4:31*).

Leading with theological vision...

equips us to care enough to confront our sister or brother in Christ.

We speak the truth in love, and we to allow our brother or sister in Christ to speak truthfully to us.

Relationships within a faith community are intensely theological.



My challenge ... **connect intentionally** the faith in Christ you **profess and proclaim** to the way you **live and lead**.

The Spirit of God is pleased when we *intentionally* relate to each other as *redeemed* children of God.

Articulate a theological vision of...

- seeing the people you are asked to lead as God sees them,
- guiding those whom you lead, and
- embracing their identity as the graced,

blessed, called, and gifted children of God!

This theological vision of servant leading empowers, strengthens, changes, and guides us when we lead decisively and faithfully in our unique leadership assignments!
