Rev. Charles Childers Conducts Revival In Chapel

Rev. Charles Childers, high school principal, was the special speaker during a week of revival services in chapel, May 18-20, sponsored by the Student Council.

On Monday Rev. Childers spoke on a portion of Scripture taken from II Corinthians 13:5—"Examine yourselves to see whether ye be in the faith. . ." He asked some heart-searching questions and many seekers found their way to an altar of prayer.

He spoke from the nineteenth chapter of Genesis on Tuesday, concerning Lot's choices in life, and dealt mainly with two words found in the sixteenth verse—"He lingered. . ."

On Wednesday the message concerned three sinners who made an everlasting impression by their attitude toward Christ—Zaccheus, the sinner on the cross, and the rich young man who was challenged by Christ to sell what he had and give to the poor.

"Sanctification" was the topic of the message on Thursday with the Scripture reading from Acts 2:1-16. He brought out the conditions and the nature of Pentecost and what it will do for the heart.

Rev. Childers brought a message on "Practical Holiness" on Friday. Holiness is something that we need to put into practice every day. It is really a practical way of living.

This series of services seemed to be a success with many souls seeking and finding spiritual needs.

S. C. Representatives Elected for Next Year



Dr. Powers has served as general superintendent since 1944 and as chairman of the Board of General Superintendents since 1949.

ing the Civil War it was occupied by St. Mary's Orphanage. The battle of Nashville took place in this vicinity, and soldiers camped on the front field after advising the occupants of the orphanage to find a better place of shelter. After the battle, the orphanage moved back to the property. In 1903 the orphanage moved again, and the property was left in the hands of a real estate company until 1907 when Dr. John E. Stevens bought the property and opened a sanatorium. In 1922 he sold it to the Board of Education for Negroes of the Methodist Episcopal Church, who began Walden College. It was closed three years later and was left unused until Trevecca moved here in 1935. This building, plus Hardy and McKay Halls and seven acres of land, was purchased for \$15,000.
