TNC Students Pledge \$20,500

Trevecca's student body proved their concern for the construction of the new chapel by pledging approximately \$20,500 in the chapel service October 24.

The faculty and administration added their support pushing the community's pledged figure over \$25,000.

During the meeting of the Board of Trustees on October 16-18, a proposal was approved requesting \$25,000 worth of support from the students, faculty, and administration. The Board also pledged \$25,000

themselves. This figure does not include the amount pledged by John T. Benson, Jr.

A community meeting took place Thursday, October 26, discussing recommendations to be presented to the Board of Trustees in their next meeting.

The tentative recommendations included the proposal that the McClurkan Building not be destroyed.

A tentative blueprint was also organized. This included a fan-shaped building equipped to seat approximately 1200 people.

The Recommended blueprints for the building have been presented to an architect for an estimate. The estimate may be accepted, rejected, or altered at the next meeting of the Board of Trustees during Homecoming Weekend.

Whatever amount is approved by the Board of Trustees, the Kresge Foundation has pledged the final \$100,000 needed to build the structure.

A campaign is now being organized to raise money from the churches across the zone.

Chaplain Boggs stated that the chapel will be built on a "pay as you go" basis—the amount ultimately raised will be the total spent on the construction.

The most promising location for the new building according

to Boggs, seems to be behind the Science Building in the area of the parking lot.

No recommendations were decided upon concerning the future use of the McClurkan Building.

Surgeon Presents Lectures

The Slonecker Lecture series this year featured the words of Dr. Ralph Byron, the chief surgeon of the City of Hope Hospital in Los Angeles, California. He is also a Nazarene layman.

Response from the students was overwhelming. Many said that without doubt, this was the best lecture series ever. Dr. Byron related some very

profound thoughts, but interweaved them with humor and personal experiences that made us apply what he was saying to our day-to-day lives.

Of major importance in his messages was the thought: "Be God's man to stand in the gap, no matter where or what position you may be. His thoughts will not be soon forgotten."


afterwards, I sought the opinion and/or suggestions of these men, and each time they voiced their satisfaction with the way the party was progressing.

A Biblical View of Moral Issues

Editor's Note: The following is the complete article submitted by Steve Rushing for the Spiritual Life column of the October 26 issue. The Editor deeply regrets that only a portion of the article was printed and hopes that the questions which arose from the last issue will now be answered.

In one of my classes recently, we were discussing how we need more biblical preaching and less topical. Topical would be pulling a verse of scripture out of the Bible and building a sermon on it. Biblical preaching would be going through parts of the Bible, verse by verse, explaining what they meant in reference to the author, who he was writing, the situation, and things of this nature. We came to somewhat of a conclusion that in the Church of the Nazarene there has been more topical preaching and less biblical preaching. In many cases we almost preach from

the Manual. Because of this, many Nazarenes do not have a biblical view of some issues we face today.

With this in mind, I would like to raise the question, how do we as Christians face moral issues such as social drinking, disco dancing, movies, etc? To some their first reaction would be to say it is definitely wrong! They would point to the Manual and in a topical way say "it's wrong!" Or they would point to their pastor or someone who advised them and say "we are Nazarenes we don't do those things." But that doesn't help me much, for I want to have a biblical view of these issues and we can't turn to Mark 3 or John 5 and find a verse that says "you can't dance." As disciples of Jesus Christ we must have more of a biblical view on these matters than just "The Manual says you can't do that."

On the other hand, there are those who would say the Bible is silent on these issues so it

really doesn't matter what we do. Well, you are right when you say the Bible doesn't speak to these specific issues. But we must go beyond the issues and get to the real problem. This being, the values that we as Christians are to have.

And the Bible speaks much on this. The Bible does not speak to the issues, for the issues will change from generation to generation. But the values and the principles that it has will never change. And each of us disciples of Christ must have his values unmixed with the values of this world. There are many who seek to follow Christ but their values are the same as the worlds. The same importance that the world puts on big parties, material possessions, emotional times, money, are the same importance that we put on them. Surely, this is not right. You see, it's not so much the acts that are wrong. It's identifying ourselves with the world by doing these acts and the value that we put on them.

We look at a pleasure and say "it was fun." But we never stop to look at how it will effect us in the long run or how it may effect our brother. This is self-centeredness (which is the root of sin). We say, "if it's fun; do it. Eat, drink and be merry, don't worry about the future." This is the same values that the world has. We cannot eat at the world's table and turn to Jesus and expect to eat with him also. When Christ comes into our life, His values must become ours.

The problem I am beginning to see is that too many of us young people have taken the word of somebody else that says these issues are wrong. For some, it has caused them to experiment with the values the world has set up, to see if they are wrong. Instead of taking someone else's word or experimenting, we need to go to the Bible. Don't look for a verse that will tell you yes or no. but look for the values that God has set up for His children.



Basketball Season Looks Promising

Under the direction of first year head coach Ron Bargatze, along with assistants Kevin Smith and Terry Compton, this year's team has an exciting outlook. An outlook for the season that has not been quite so bright in years past.

Coach Bargatze comes to us from Vanderbilt where he served as head assistant and enjoyed great success in recruiting ventures. That same success was carried over when he came to Trevecca. This year's squad contains no less

than eight freshmen, all of whom bring with them outstanding statistics from high school.

Calvin "Offense" Holmes is from Nashville's Hume-Fogg High School where he averaged 21 points a game. Calvin is 5'10", weighs 155 pounds and will be playing guard.

Also playing at the guard position is 5'10" Lester Morris. He scored 11.5 points a game last year for Glencliff High School here in Nashville.

Dupont High School in

Hermitage had the good fortune to have Greg Pemberton playing for them and now we have him here. He stands 6'5½" and averaged at 14 points a game chip last year.

Hume-Fogg sent us another young man in the person of 6'4" forward Johnny Reynolds whose game average was 10 points.

Mike Sanderson is also a 6'5½" forward who, for his efforts, was named to both All-District and All-Region teams. His 22 points per game didn't

hurt him.

Nashville Maplewood got 8 points a game from smooth and steady 5'11" guard Lance Smith and white House, Tennessee had 6'4" Larry Smith who averaged 15.0 points a game. Named all-district last year Larry will play center-forward.

At 6'8" Steve Thompson, from Elkton High School in Pulaski, Tennessee is rapidly becoming one of the team's most dependable big men. Last year he was named All-District and All-Region and was also named to the State Tournament team. He was an 18 point a game scorer.

Bowling Green, Kentucky is where Brad Whitlow went to high school. He thrilled his high school fans with his assists. His passing ability should be exciting to watch this year. At 6'1½", he too was named All District.

There are only two sophomores. They are Roosevelt Burrell and Kelly Harned. Burrell is a 6'3" forward who average 13 points a game and was second in assists and rebounds last year for the Trojans. Harned also

saw quite a bit of action last year.

There are just two juniors and they are both transfers. Don "Dr. Z" Zeiler is originally from New Jersey, but came to us from East Tennessee. "Dr. Z" is 7.0" tall and provides a lot of help both on offense and defense because of his height.

Fred Harris possesses the most impressive list of credentials. 6'1" guard out of McGavock High School, Fred was named All-District, All-Region, and to the All-State tournament team during high school. He spend the last two years at Cumberland Junior College. He averaged 18 points his first year and 19 his second. Both years he was the leading rebounder and both years he was named team MVP. He'll be counted on quite a bit.

Gary Van Atta is the only senior on the team. He is a 6'3" forward whose court experience should prove valuable.

Coach Bargatze says, "We'll run and play a fast-paced game with a lot of enthusiasm. We're going to be competitive with everyone we play. The team spirit and cohesiveness is great.
