Dr. John L. Knight, district superintendent of the Florida District, is chairman of the Board.



As our 1961 school year draws to a close, it is with gratitude that we acknowledge Dr. A. B. Mackey in his twenty-fifth year as president of Trevecca Nazarene College.

On April 16, 1897, in the small town of Highway, Kentucky, was born a child destined to become one of the most outstanding men in the history of our college.

Olivet, Eastern Kentucky State Teachers College, Peabody, Vanderbilt, the University of Chicago, Harvard University, and Northwest Nazarene College are contributing factors to the knowledge which he possesses.

He obtained the A. B. degree in education from Eastern Kentucky State College and the M. A. degree from Peabody College. The LL.D. degree was conferred upon him by Northwest Nazarene College. Economics, educational psychology, and educational administration are the areas in which he received his major training.


In actual teaching experience, Dr. Mackey is well qualified, having taught on elementary, high school, and college levels before coming to Trevecca. His administrative work varied from the position of principal of an Albany, Kentucky school to that of faculty member at Peabody.

His close association with Trevecca was begun in 1925, when he came as a part-time teacher in Latin and agriculture in the high school department and French in college. Thus began his climb from high school principal to college dean; then, to college vice president, and finally to president in 1937. It is in this capacity he has served ever since. Under his able leadership Trevecca has progressed into the strong holiness college it is today.

Despite attempts in 1935 to locate the college in various other places, our president leased, and later purchased, an eight-acre tract of land in his own name. Seven acres of central campus were purchased shortly thereafter. Since that time additional property has been purchased, bringing our college property, with a campus valued at one and one-half million dollars, to its present approximately fifty acres.

We are indeed grateful to this great man of God who has sacrificed for himself and his family far beyond the call of duty in order to make a dream a reality—Tre-

Dr. Hardy C. Powers Is Commencement Speaker, June 6

Dr. Hardy C. Powers, of Dallas, Texas, will be the commencement speaker on June 6. He has been chairman of the Board of General Superintendents since 1949, and a member of the board since his first election in 1944.

Dr. Powers joined the Nazarene church in 1923 and prepared for the ministry at Pasadena College, Pasadena, California. For ten years he served as pastor in California and Iowa. In 1936 he was elected superintendent of the Iowa district, serving eight years. He served as district president of the young people's society and for several years as a member of the General Board of the church. Here he served with distinction as vice-president, chairman of the Department of Publication and as a member of the Department of Foreign Missions.

He has traveled widely for foreign missions. His exploratory trips preceded opening of work among the Europeans in South Africa, Haiti, New Guinea, and West Germany.

Dr. and Mrs. Powers have five children, including a son in the Nazarene ministry.

Dr. Powers holds an honorary doctoral degree from Northwest Nazarene College, Nampa, Idaho.

Full-Time Christian Work Is Plan Of 231 Students

A total of 231 Trevecca students are preparing for full-time Christian work, while 203 plan to teach school, according to the vocational survey of the 1960-61 school year.

Of the Christian workers, 148 will be ministers, 62 will be missionaries, seven will be song evangelists, one will be a minister of music, two will be directors of Christian education, and eleven will be doing other types of Christian work.

Alumni "T" Award Given Dr. Greathouse


Once again as the commencement season approached, alumni of our college looked toward Trevecca in anticipation of the annual alumni banquet, which was June 5.

There will be a happy welcome in Tripolis, Greece, this fall when Anna Koliopoulou returns to her home with a well-earned A. B. degree.

Anna's Greek accent has almost disappeared after her four-year stay at Trevecca preparing to teach English in her home country. Because of language difficulties Anna took only eighteen hours during her entire first year here. But this year she has managed to make good grades with nineteen hours per quarter.

After graduating from high school she went to an English institute in Athens, a school in Tripolis and then taught English to beginners for a year. A real love for the English language made her want to come to an American college. Her cousin, Mrs. Joe Duncan, whose husband operates a dry-cleaning plant in Nashville, recommended that she attend Trevecca and made arrangements for her acceptance.

Anna's ship will leave New York for Greece on September 23, 1961. She hopes to have a job after Christmas, 1962, teaching English in Athens, where she may take more courses at the university there.

There is an old English proverb which says "All is well that ends well." I would like to change this to say, "All is well that begins well." A good ending necessitates







The man that leads the field of batters with the highest average this year is big Gene Cook. When Cook stepped to the plate he just put a little weight behind the ball and in 20 times up he pounded out 12 hits for a healthy .600 average. Following him is Wendell Poole (9-17) with a .529, while Lowell Clyburn is third (10-25) with an even .400. Don Irwin (12-31) is fourth with .387 and close behind him for fifth is Fred Cunningham (12-33) with .364.

Rounding out the top ten are the next five in this order: Fred Cobbs (10-29) .345; Hugh Smith (5-15) and Leverne Deel (6-18)

each with .333; Paul Andrus (6-18) .316; and Charles Kirby (6-20) .300.

In the opinion of the TREV-ECHOES sports staff, Fred Cunningham is the best all-around softball player of the season. Cunningham, a freshman, has the catcher end of the Beta batteries that clinched the title. Fred stood fifth in batting averages for the season, but it not only this that makes him stand out. Seeing him in action on the field makes you realize that he is right at home in this game. Covering home plate with ease, and backing first and third bases with better than average sharpness make him stand out. At the plate Fred has belted out 12 hits in 33 trips to the plate for a .364 average. The Deltas and Alphas can look forward to one fact: that they will play against this home coverage for the next three seasons.

Working under some strenuous problems and difficulties at times for the past three years, Wendell Poole has done a job well worth commending as president of the TAA.

The TAA has made tremendous progress under his leadership. So, to Wendell Poole, graduating senior Alpha, good athlete, good sportsman, and a wonderful Christian, here are congratulations on a job well done.
