President Moore Resigns Accepts Kansas City Post

Dr. Mark R. Moore, the President of Trevecca for the past 11 years, resigned last Wednesday, January 17, and accepted the election of the General Board of the Church of the Nazarene as the new Executive Director of the Department of Education and the Ministry of the Denomination. The post was vacated by the retiring of Dr. Edward S. Mann effective January, 1979.

Dr. Moore's responsibilities will include two major areas: Education and Ministry. In the area of Nazarene Education, he will be administrative director for all eight liberal arts colleges in America, the Canadian Nazarene College, British Isles Nazarene College, Nazarene Theological Seminary, and Nazarene Bible College. Dr. Moore will serve as administrative link to the General Headquarters for these institutions.

Within the area of Nazarene Ministry, his responsibilities will include directing the li-

censed minister testing and course programs, post education for ministers entitled "Continuing Education;" overseeing of Christian Service Training (CST) program; and overseeing the Nazarene Chaplaincy program with the military, and with prisons. He will be working in this area with Dr. Neil Wiseman, former Trevecca Chaplain, who is working with continuing Ministerial Education, and directing such programs as PALCON and WILCON.

While looking back at more than a decade of service as the chief executive of this college, Dr. Moore reflected: "We have accomplished a lot of things here. One is accreditation; another—new and improved facilities; including the new Science and Business Building, construction of Benson Hall, renovation of Tidwell, completion of the P.E. Center, and temporary provisions

made for student government offices and a new student center.

Academically there have been many achievements: enlarged Business Department, beginning of the Physician's Associate and Allied Health Programs, the youth ministry program, and the Forensics team. The intercollegiate athletics have also made great progress during Moore's term.

What does Dr. Moore feel is his greatest accomplishment? "Bringing a positive, optimistic attitude here, which was not here before. Our vision?—This school has as great a future if not greater than any of our other colleges—to reach high enrollments—send out more students to serve God,....the Church,....the world"

Dr. Moore's response to his new appointment was "The election was of such nature, it was very re-enforcing, I was really overwhelmed."

There were three goals Dr. Moore had wanted to reach before leaving: "I would like to have seen two new buildings built,—a chapel, and a new student center; campus streets closed to public traffic; and a

basketball conference championship. I'll have to leave these to someone else to achieve."

The former president plans to be here 30-60 days yet, wrapping everything up.

Trojans Fall Second Time to Lipscomb Bisons

Maybe the cold, winter weather had something to do with it, maybe the guys on the team were just a little tight, maybe it was just a simple fact of losing to a super charged defensive

effort. Whatever the reason, there's no way to explain away the really thorough 61-42 loss to David Lipscomb's Bisons. Evidently the Lipscomb coach fed his team some secret

formula that caused them to play with an unreal tenacity, especially on defensive.

Down by only a 27-20 score at halftime, the Trojans were still in the game, but led by

sharpshooting left-hander Kenny Weal, Lipscomb broke it open early in the second half. Trevecca did close within nine points mid-way through the period, but could get no closer the rest of the way.

Guards Brad Whitlow and Calvin Holmes each had seven points to lead the Trojan scoring and the team shooting percentage which dropped to 31.5%. They had shot over 50% on their last three games so this was quite a tribute to the Bison defensive effort.

One thing that must not be overlooked was the tremendous support from Trevecca students and friends. Trojan fans numbered well over 300 and probably closer to 400 people who braved the bad roads to help cheer their team on. It spoke very well for how much the fans think of the team which has played so well all season long. Keep in mind the possibility of a winning campaign is still a very real one.

The Trojans had come off a big weekend which saw the young team lose a heartbreaker to Lambuth, then trounce Christian Brothers over the weekend.

On Thursday evening the high rolling Lambuth Eagles invaded the Trojan gym in what turned out to be a frustrating loss for the scrappy young Trevecca team.

The Lambuth Eagles, 15-5 on the year and leading the VSAC Western Division with a 7-1 record put on an incredible display of outside shooting to keep them in the game. The Trojans fell behind early, but through tough defense and a poised offensive attack the Trojans were able to grab a 42-33, nine point lead at the half. The Trojans who hit a blistering 65% from the field in the first half, were sparked by freshman Brad Whitlow who came off the bench after being out with an ankle injury in recent games. Whitlow led the team with eight assists and hit a total of thirteen for the game.

In the second half the experienced Lambuth club fought back to grab the lead, but the Trojans again battled back in the waning minutes to recover it. The game looked to be "on ice" as Roosevelt Burrell pulled down in rebound with

This past January, the biting winter cold has been coupled with biting-yet-unfamiliar pangs of hunger as well over one hundred TNC'ers participated in a thirty hour fast held

January 24 through January 25, in order to learn firsthand the plight of the millions of unfortunate people on earth for whom hunger pangs are a way of life.

The entire student body experienced chapel services and saw films and dramatizations concerning world hunger last month preceding the two days of fasting. Conceived by

Steve Rushing and Bill Boggs, Trevecca's comprehensive world hunger seminar was held in conjunction with World Vision International evangelical organization which channels over ninety-nine percent of all of its monetary contributions into food and other provisions for hungry natives of Asia, Africa, and South America.

There is much more to Circle K than a jersey and a jacket. One of their main projects for this year is the adoption of a dorm of 12, 13, and 14 year old boys at the Tennessee Preparatory School, located just a few blocks away from our own campus.

"This group of 15 young boys really need our love. In the 3 activities we have had so far they have given us much more

than we could ever give them," stated one Circle K member. "These boys just don't have the chances to do things that we as students experience. By coming into contact with them we show our love for Christ to them.

These boys are at a stage in their lives where everything we say and do will make a deep impression on them. Their futures are being shaped right now. We feel that we have a chance to help in this development."

The boys are beginning to open up to the Circle K members and trust them. The reason for this is that activities are planned for the week with

one of the five teams which Circle K is divided into, being in charge at each activity. Swimming, roller skating or playing basketball are among the roster of activities for the boys.

The main goal for the club is to influence the boys spiritually. All the boys who want to go, are taken to Church each Sunday night.

Wall, Glass Assist In State Legislature

Trevecca students Howard T. Wall, junior, and Rob Glass, senior, are participating in a special Tennessee program this quarter, serving as assistants to the State of Tennessee Legislature at the Capital.

Only 23 college and university students from across the state were chosen from over 50 applicants, and Trevecca is represented with two of these.

Howard is serving as a committee assistant to the House of Representatives Ways and Means Committee, while Rob is serving as assistant to the House Judiciary Committee. The

program includes 12 hours of political science credit, and will take up nearly all of the time for Howard and Rob this quarter. Howard is also working directly with Representative John Bragg of Murfreesboro, while Rob is working with Representative Ira Murphy of Memphis.

Other responsibilities include bill analysis and summary, and record keeping of legislation. This internship program will last the length of this quarter, yielding first-hand experience in political procedure.

Felixes Leave for Florida

After serving several yeears on Trevecca's faculty, Dr. and Mrs. Richard Felix left Trevecca's hill shortly after the close of Trevecca's fall quarter, to move to their new home in Gainesville, Florida.

During Dr. Richard Felix's five-year association with Trevecca, he has acted as Vice-president of Development and, since last May, as Director of Graduate studies and chairman of the Graduate Studies Council. In working to make a graduate program at Trevecca a reality, Dr. Felix recently has compiled and submitted an impressive, fifty-three page proposal to the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools! Dr. Felix's wife, Mrs. Vivian Felix, has been a teacher of English and journalism at TNC for the past three years—as well as being *Trev-Echoes'* gracious advisor/sponsor.

Now that this Trevecca chapter of the Felixes' lives has come to a close, they have left Nashville for Gainesville, where Dr. Felix has begun work at the University of Florida. The university is populated with sixty thousand undergraduate and graduate students. More students receive graduate degrees there every year than any other university in the United States.

Dr. Richard Felix's new position there is that of Associate Vice-President of Development and Alumni Affairs. He will consult with

the President's Council, establish public relations with alumni and potential contributors, direct the use of monetary gifts of ten thousand dollars or more to the college, and work with the deans of the law, dental, agricultural, and other divisions of the university in establishing endowment funds and "endowed chairs."

When Dr. Felix was asked for a parting comment about his years at Trevecca, he expressed his love and respect for the school, students, and faculty, and declared that his time at TNC has been "the most productive years of my life so

far." As for Mrs. Vivian Felix, she observed that Trevecca has "excellent students, who are dedicated and hard workers—and fun to have in class!"

The Felixes have three children—Doak, twelve; Tris, nine; and Melissa, who is eight years old. The family already has purchased a house in Gainesville which is close to the University of Florida. The Trevecca community wishes Richard and Vivian Felix Godspeed and happiness in their new step in their lives.

When a school starts having more fans attending away games than the host team, something is really happening.



TNC Advances During Moore's Tenure

Editor's note: The following is a "letter of appreciation" to President Moore from Howard Wall. The purpose of the article is to point out some of the advancements Trevecca has made during Moore's years in office.

With the departure of Dr. Mark Moore as college president an era in Trevecca's history comes to a close, and it would do well to look back.

It has been an era of progress as Trevecca has made the transformation which began in the early 1960's into becoming a reputable educational institution. Early

in Dr. Moore's term Trevecca received full accreditation from the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. From that point Trevecca has been able to strengthen her academic programs and place students in jobs and graduate schools.

The campus itself has undergone many changes with the completion of six major new buildings and one major renovation. In cooperating with other businessmen and community leaders the Trevecca Towers System has expanded, the Health Care Center has been constructed, and the city has improved the streets, sidewalks, and lighting

to increase the desirability of the community.

Trevecca has also diversified and expanded to increase the quality of academic program and increase enrollment. The teacher workshop program, adult education, and Allied Health are just examples of the programs which have taken total enrollment from 750 to 1200.

Despite financial difficulties, which most private colleges are experiencing, Trevecca has greatly increased its donations received from businesses and individuals outside the church.

It was only ten years ago at the beginning of Dr. Moore's term that Trevecca began participating in intercollegiate athletics. Dr. Moore was president and in attendance at Trevecca's first basketball game ever, against Belmont in 1968, the Rebels winning 110-45. Dr. Moore reaffirmed his commitment to an athletic program last year and as a result after twenty-one (and that is the correct number) losses to Belmont, he witnessed our first basketball victory over the Rebels, 73-70, last Tuesday.

Guidelines for Selecting President

Editor's Note: The following is a description of some of the characteristics which should be sought for in our new president.

Trevecca was shocked and saddened at the announcement of the resignation of Dr. Mark Moore as college president and happy for him because of his assignment to a new post with the general church in Kansas City. The Board of Trustees are now faced with the difficult process of selecting a successor.

Student input in this decision is essential and the following is a list of considerations which should be made in this selection process.

1. **Ability to communicate with the student body.** A college president should be open and candid with the student body. He should be sensitive to student opinion and should consult with student leaders when making important decisions. The key to

an open administration is an open president and it is very important that students feel they are treated with dignity and responsibility.

2. **A "Benevolent Dictator."** He should be an individual who does not abuse the power he is given. He should give firm leadership; however, he should surround himself with able administrators who are experts in their fields and he should heed their advice. We need a leader who will not attempt to make all the decisions, but realize his own shortcomings and listen to those who are more qualified in certain areas. He must lead the college, but he alone should not attempt to make decisions for his administrators, faculty, or the student body.

3. **A Churchman.** We need a president who is in touch with the Church of the Nazarene and the Southeastern Educational Zone. A layman or elder who has close connections with the general church and is a

To say that pre-marital sex is condemned by the Bible is true for in I Corinthians 6:18, we find, "Shun fornication. Every

other sin that a man can commit is outside the body; but the fornicator sins against his own body." (NEB) Some might say that is not the right

translation of that verse, for Paul is talking about a harlot and she is selling her body. That may be true, but the

principle does not change. Paul says he that would give himself to a harlot becomes physically

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1978-79 Trojans: Best Season Since 1972

The Trojans are off to their best season since 1972 as their record stands at 12-13 after last Saturday.

Coach Ron Bargatze has transformed the Trojan basketball program into one which can compete vigorously in the NAIA District 24 and the Volunteer State Athletic Conference.

The Trojans opened the season with two disappointing overtime losses, but in the following week the youthful Trojans made history by beating the unbeaten Lipscomb Bisons who had downed the Trojans earlier in the week. Freshman Brad Whitlow hit for 26 against the Bisons including an incredible 18 for 18 from the line. The final was 70-64. Trevecca shocked everyone with a 73-72 victory over Cumberland College of Kentucky, ranked nationally in the NAIA in the first round of the Lee tournament. On the following night the youthful Trojans fell to the host team for the third time this year, losing 60-54. Mike Sanderson was named to the 1st all tournament team, partly because of his efforts in this game.

Before Christmas break the Trojans won five of their twelve games to surpass last year's victory total of four. Other scores in the first half of the season were Lipscombe 57-Trevecca 46, Belmont 64-Trevecca 59, Southwestern 71-Trevecca 68 (ot), Trevecca 80-Covenant 57, Trevecca 76-Bryan 66, Trevecca 74-Lincoln Memorial 63, and Bryan 62-Trevecca 58. Mike Sanderson led the Trojans in the 1978 half of the season with a 17.1 average. Fred Harris was

close behind with 11.2 and the junior transfer out of Nashville McGavock led the team in rebounds with 6.9 caroms per game.

Going into the 1979 half of this season the young Trojans have matured and developed into one of the top contenders among small colleges in Tennessee.

Since January the Trojans have gained wins over John Wesley, Freed-Hardeman, Union, Belmont, Christian Brothers (twice), and Sewanee (University of the South) and we have lost to Messiah (rated seventh nationally in NCCAA), Lambuth twice, (including one overtime game), Bethel, Lemoine-Owen (twice in overtime) and Southwestern.

The highlights of the 1979 half have been the losses to Southwestern, and Lambuth (at home) and the victory over Belmont. Southwestern which defeated the Trojans in overtime in Memphis earlier this year came to Nashville 11-2 and rated seventh in the NCAS-III. Down by 16 in the first half the Trojans never gave up and "Rose" Burrell came off the bench to score bring Trevecca back. The poised Lynx held on to down Trevecca 62-57. Calvin Holmes, starting for injured Brad Whitlow led the Trojans with 21.

History was made on January 23 as Belmont fell to Trevecca first time in 22 games at Trojan fieldhouse. It was a real gift for Dr. Mark Moore as he departs after serving as the College's President for eleven years. Dr. Moore was President when the Trojans first lost to Belmont in 1969. 110-45. The final was 73-70.

Trojan scoring was balanced with Harris leading with 16, Sanderson 15, Pemberton 14, Whitlow 12, and Holmes 10. Pemberton pulled down 8 rebounds.


The Trojans have started nine various players in recent weeks as the depth of the young team has become obvious. Mike Sanderson, who continues to lead the team in scoring, has held down his starting forward position, and has displayed much all around ability in addition to his incredible shooting ability.

Greg Pemberton has settled down to playing consistently superior ball as he has proven to be an explosive force inside as well as a clutch defensive rebounder. Captain Fred Harris continues to provide leadership for the team as he plays a well rounded game with high averages in scoring, rebounding and assists, and especially excels in the offensive rebound category.

Brad Whitlow has been plagued with an ankle injury, but he has proven to be one of the best floor generals in the NAIA district 24 as he leads the team in assists and also contributes with consistent scoring.

Calvin Holmes "offense," has proven to be an invaluable player as he started for the injured Brad Whitlow in three contests and has come off the bench to provide explosive displays of scoring and aggressive play. Senior Gary Van Atta also has come off the bench to provide some outstanding defensive performances.

Three men have started in the center position in the last three games. Sophomore

"Rose" Burrell has been a good rebounder and scorer, and has engaged in very aggressive play which has helped spark the Trojans. Freshman Steve Thompson at 6-8 has given us a big man to put at the pivot, and freshman Johnny Reynolds also has performed well in the middle.

The remaining Trojans on the roster has played well when called on and show potential which gives depth to the fourteen man team.

As the year progresses a .500 season seems very possible, but regardless of the final tally the

Trojans have reached new levels of success. Coach Ron Bargatze and the young Trojans are to be commended for the manner in which they have brought honor to Trevecca, on and off the court.

Finally, the day after the heartbreaking loss to Lambuth a petition with over three hundred names (over half of the students on campus) was turned in to the team expressing their support.

1978-1979 has been a year for the recordbook in TNC basketball history.

less than twenty seconds to go, but for unknown reasons a jump ball was called. Seconds later, however, the Trojans had a three on one break going, but with twelve seconds to go Fred Harris missed a short jumper, Mike Sanderson missed the followup and "Rose" Burrell fowled Malcolm McKinney on the rebound. The enthusiastic crowd was shocked with disbelief as the victory of the season slipped from our grasp. McKinney hit the first of the one and one to throw the game into overtime and the Eagles dominated the overtime to grab a 94-87 win.

Lambuth's Delk and Martindale hit 25 and 22 respectively, almost all of which were from the twenty foot mark or beyond. Terry Martin who scored 36 earlier this year when Lambuth took Trevecca to the hoop by a score of 103-94, was held to 14 as

the Trojan zone kept the inside clogged up and won the battle on the boards 37-33.

Over the weekend Trevecca travelled to Memphis to face the unpredictable Christian Brothers in an afternoon homecoming contest. When the smoke cleared the Trojans were on top by 16, 77-61.

Fred Harris hit 11 of 14 from the field and tossed in 9 from the charity stripe to gain scoring honors with 31. The Trojans hit 56% from the field and after a slight 26-24 half time lead they hit 51 second half points to blow out the hosts.

The Trojans effort was helped by Mike Sanderson and Brad Whitlow who both hit for 14, and Greg Pemberton who pulled down 12 rebounds and scored eight points.

Unofficial Guide to Trojan Basketball History

(Editors Note: Howard Wall has been a supporter and observer of Trevecca Basketball since the program was begun in 1968. The following is a personal account of how the program has progressed over the last ten years.)

It was a very important night on that cool autumn evening in 1968. The Belmont parking lot was full as Nazarenes from across the city converged on their campus to see the Trevecca Trojans compete in their first intercollegiate basketball game.

The event resembled more or less a circus and the comical Trojans under the leadership of Elmore Heaberlin, the man greatly responsible for intercollegiate athletics at Trevecca, were routed by a score of 110-45. And so began Trevecca's basketball history. It should be noted that Clyde Spencer scored the first Trojan fieldgoal and led the scoring with 15.

The first season saw no wins against ten losses. The first home game pitted the young Trojans in their brand new gym which then contained folding chairs to seat the fans, against the mighty Tennessee Temple. In a tough contest the Trojans were beaten by only a 58-56 score as recorded on the chalk scoreboard which preceded the electric scoreboard, in the only close game of the year.

By mid-season Coach Heaberlin had resigned and in a coachless game against Calvary the Trojans fouled out down to four players and were thoroughly demolished.

After the resignation of Heaberlin however, the administration was to make a decision which was to change the nature of Trevecca Basketball. A young promising

graduate of MTSU was hired as a coach and athletic director. His name, Bill Boner (recently elected as U.S. Congressman from Nashville.)

In the last game of that season against Olivet, the Trojans were soundly beaten, however, they showed some enthusiasm which caused a positive attitude toward Trevecca basketball.

In the following year, Bill Boner transformed a loser into a winner and brought in six players who, for four years, gave Trevecca a winning basketball tradition. Those players were Butch Baker, Gary Bedwell, Brent Godby, Mickey Johnson, Nelson Ridley and Charles Torrain. The 1969-70 season saw a 13-8 season with a freshman roster, the emergence of a small, loyal group of supporters and a future for Trevecca athletics.

The 1970-71 season saw its ups and downs. Outstanding recruits Mike Poer and Tim Kemp were lost at mid-season and standouts Mike Sexton, Nelson Ridley, and Charles Torrain were out for the season through injury and grades, but the Trojans led by forward Gary "Machine" Bedwell were able to gain a 16-8 record, including big wins over Mt. Vernon Nazarene College, Tennessee Temple and Aquinas.

Bill Boner was elected to the state legislature and Chet Foraker from Mount Vernon Nazarene took the Trojan helm to lead them through the most memorable 1971-72 season. The starting five of Butch Baker—center, Gary Bedwell and Charles Torrain—forwards, Mickey Johnson and Nelson Ridley—guards with substitute men like Larry

Griffey, Ralph Watson, Carl Windrell, and Brent Godby were destined to win the Trevecca Invitational Tournament over three other Nazarene colleges., the regular season championship of the Southern Christian Athletic Conference, and a third place finish in the National Christian Collegiate Athletic Association Tournament. The rivalry of the year was between Eastern Nazarene College led by the Eades brothers and Trevecca led by their former Coach Chet Foraker. In close contests in the Trevecca Invitational and the NCAA tournament the Trojans always came out on top. The honors from 1971-72 are numerous: Southern

Christian Athletic Tournament—1st place team, 2nd in tournament, Charles Torrain (1st team All SCAC and MCP), Butch Baker, Gary Bedwell and Nelson Ridley (2nd team All SCAC), TNC Tournament MVP—Charles Torrain, Team MVP—Charles Torrain, Nashville Tennessean All-City College Team (1st Team)—Nelson Ridley, Mr. Hustle Award—Nelson Ridley, NCAA Tournament Third Place, Chet Foraker—SCAC "Coach of the Year."

In 1972-73 Richard Haynes took over for Trevecca and faced a much tougher schedule with the prospect of the six outstanding senior graduating and little recruitment to replace them. It was the Trojans first losing season since the first season, posting a 12-19 mark, but the team began playing teams in the Volunteer State Athletic Conference and other large schools. The potential highpoint of the season was the home game against Belmont when the Trojans took a ten point lead, but again the jinx was on and the Trojans fell to the cross-town rivals 67-62.

1974-76 can be described as the dark years of Trevecca basketball. In Coach Haynes last year and Coach Vail's first

year the Trojans only pulled out four wins. There are various reasons for this failure, such as no effective recruiting since Bill Boner, increased difficulty of competition, and diminishing fan support.

Few players during that period were standouts, however, Rick Arnott, Ralph Watson, Johnny Evans, and Sam Davis deserve recognition for their efforts in such a losing cause.

Through the efforts of Coach Vail some rebuilding did occur which provided a basis for Trevecca's current program. Trevecca scheduled more difficult schools and became a part of the Volunteer State Athletic Conference. Between 1976 and 1978 the Trojans won very few games, but were able to gain a strong student following. Blanchard Howard,

Richard Harrison, Dave Hill and others showed abilities which grant them recognition in the Trevecca basketball history book.

The progress and enthusiasm over the last three years along with the success of other sport have resulted in a new basketball emphasis at Trevecca. Winning is nothing new to Trevecca basketball and for those who can remember the great years of Boner, Foraker, and Torain, it is a welcomed move. To appreciate the success of the 1978-79 Trojans we need to see where we have been. From our 110-45 loss to Belmont in our opener and after twenty consecutive losses to Belmont without a victory we have come a long way.
