

Education counseling and choir and chorus auditions were highlights of Friday afternoon. Each educational counselor endeavored to fit the student's curriculum around the student's vocational goal and personal interests.

Dr. A. B. Mackey, president, officially welcomed the new students Friday evening at 7:30 p.m. in the Fine Arts Auditorium. This was followed by a faculty reception on campus in front of McClurkan Building.
