## Nazarene wounded in Oklahoma Post Office Massacre

Shortly before 6:30 on the morning of Wednesday, August 20, Michael Bigler parked his car in the lot at the Edmond, Oklahoma post office. Immediately to his left, Patrick Sherrill parked his subcompact, got out and began walking toward the building. Sherrill carried his mailbag, recalls Bigler, "He always carried it around instead of leaving it at the post office. That morning I noticed he had blue postal service raingear in it. I never suspected that he had several handguns and rounds of ammunition underneath it."

Thirty minutes later, 15 persons (including Pat Sherrill) lay dead and Michael Bigler was one of eight wounded in what is considered one of the worst one-day massacres in the United States.

Mr. Bigler is a third generation Nazarene who attends the Harrah, Oklahoma Church with his wife, Karen, and children, Matthew Aaron and Kristiana Michael. By "playing dead" after being wounded in the back, Mike was able to escape by bolting out the back door of the post office while Sherrill was reloading his .45-caliber automatic pistols.

"I had been in my area sorting mail when I started hearing a 'pop, pop, pop' sound. At first I thought it was some kind of mock drill, but when I saw Mike Rockne lying on the floor in a puddle of blood, I knew this was the real thing."

Seconds later, the Southern Nazarene University graduate felt the sting of one of Sherrill's bullets. The projectile entered his right shoulder and skipped across the concave portion of his back, missing the spinal column before piercing the left shoulder blade.

"I began saying 'by His stripes I am healed,' over and over. I then sensed the Holy Spirit say to me, 'Mike, play dead.' At this point Sherrill was attracted to another worker. When I heard him reloading his weapons, I fled out the back while another co-worker ran out the front."

Upon leaving the building, Bigler said he was almost shot by

policemen who mistook him for the killer.

The Nazarene postman said he tried to comfort two other injured workers as they waited to be transported to a local hospital. Bigler was one of three persons treated and released. Five others were admitted.

"I believe he (Sherrill) came in expecting to kill 90 to 100 people that morning," adds Bigler. "Earlier in the week he had asked a fellow-worker what time the glass doors in front were opened. He thought they stayed closed until 8:30 am, so he expected many people to be trapped up there. In reality, the front doors were unlocked at 7:00 am and the shooting began at about 7:02. If the front doors had been shut, many more would have been killed."

"I just praise God that I was spared. I give Him all the praise," said Bigler. "I also love those that died, and I mourn them."

Mr. Bigler read the scripture at a mass memorial service for his slain co-workers at Central State University football stadium, Sunday, August 24, which was declared an official day of mourning by Oklahoma Governor George Nigh. The memorial service attracted 3,500 persons from the community of 34,000 people, including Governor Nigh, U. S. Postmaster General Preston Robert Tisch, and Edmond Mayor Carl Reheman.

Bigler said his stitches would be removed in a few days. "I went back to the post office to sign some papers, Friday, and I was a bit shaky. I'm not completely whole, but God is helping me. I hope to be back at work in a week or so."

Members of the Harrah church have been very supportive to Michael and his family. They have brought food, flowers, balloons, and one person helped by answering scores of phone calls that the mailman received from well-wishers and the news media.

"I believe God has spared me for some purpose. I plan to follow Jesus wherever He leads."


## Congratulations Summer Grads!

Trevecca's first graduate commencement was held on August 10, 1986 with 75 graduates receiving the M.Ed. degree. Along with the 35 graduates in the June Commencement, the total graduates this year in the Master of Education Program is at 110. Dr. LaRue Moss, Coordinator of Off-Campus Graduate Programs in Education, was the August commencement speaker.

The graduate program was started two years ago with 20 students. Presently there are over 400 students enrolled in 12 cities throughout Tennessee. Dr. Melvin Welch is the Associate Dean for Graduate Studies.

Plans are still under way for a new Masters degree program in Religion. Dr. Ray Dunning, Chairman of the Department of Religion

and Philosophy, has completed the self-study prospectus which will be sent to the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools this month. A Committee visit is scheduled for October 6-9. As part of the prospectus, Trevecca is exploring the possibility of offering graduate courses in Religion in the Orlando, Florida area as well as the usual on-campus classes.

# NAZARENE NEWS

## **Two Dead Following Incident at Fast Food Place in Oklahoma City**

Two men in their early 20s entered a Hardees restaurant where two Southern Nazarene University students are employed on the southside of Oklahoma City at about 3:00 PM, Wednesday, September 3. Waving their guns in the air, the men forced the employees and patrons to leave and then called police to say they had a hostage. Four gunshots were heard shortly thereafter. Police arrived on the scene and placed a phone in the restaurant to communicate with the men, but they received no response. At about 6:30 PM an Oklahoma City SWAT team stormed the building to find the two men dead, apparently of self-inflicted gunshots.

Two students, Pam Deselle and Jeri Miner, both juniors at Southern Nazarene University, are employed at the fast food place and were enroute to the restaurant as the incident occurred. Pam is an assistant manager at the store. Jeri is the daughter of Rev. and Mrs. James Miner of Kansas City.

The seven employees and three customers who were in the store at the time of the takeover were uninjured. The Hardees, which is located about 20 minutes from SNU, reopened for business the following morning.

Investigators are trying to determine the motive for the bizarre incident.

## **Gary Sivewright Elected NYI Ministries Director**

Rev. Gary Sivewright, 39, has been elected NYI Ministries director in the Christian Life and Sunday School Division, according to Rev. Phil Riley, CL/SS Division director. He was elected to the post by the Board of General Superintendents following his nomination by Rev. Riley and Dr. Raymond W. Hurn, responsible general superintendent. The nomination was approved by the general NYI Council and the CL/SS Department of the General Board.

Rev. Sivewright replaces Rev. Larry Leonard who resigned the post to accept the pastorate of Hutchinson, Kansas, First Church. Karen DeSollar, who has served as assistant editor for NYI Ministries, has been appointed editor of BREAD and TEENS TODAY.

## **First Mexico '87 Church Organized**

The first Nazarene church to be organized as part of Mexico '87 is in Cuahutepec, an area of 500,000 in Mexico City. The announcement of the organization was made by Rev. Jose Palacios, Mexico Central District superintendent, during a recent monthly meeting of the Mexico '87 Steering Committee.

The new church was started by Eneas Alegria and was organized under pastor Aner Ruiz. Both are students at Seminario Nazareno Mexicano, A.C. With 15 charter members, the young congregation is currently meeting in a rented place.

Mexico '87 is the name given to the Thrust to the Cities program for Mexico City which officially begins next year and runs through 1991. Plans are being made to organize 100 new churches in the city of 18 million during the first year of the evangelistic campaign.

## **Dwight Rich, Nazarene Missionary, Recovering After Motorcycle accident**

Nazarene missionary Dwight Rich is showing improvement following surgery to place a temporary and a permanent pin in his broken legs, Wednesday, September 3. The 32-year-old minister broke both legs in a motorcycle accident in Quito, Ecuador, August 18. The next day he suffered stroke-like symptoms when bone marrow seeped into his bloodstream causing an embolism.

Doctors were going to perform surgery to set the broken bones last week, but the vital signs of the missionary dropped when anesthesia was administered, so surgery was postponed.

Rev. Rich is reportedly doing very well, except for complaints concerning pain in his legs. His doctors say this is a good sign indicating that the nerves in the affected areas are working properly. A CAT scan showed no brain damage, but he is suffering from swelling in his eyes, especially his left one, which is causing blurred vision. Physicians say this condition may last six months to a year and that Rev. Rich may need to wear corrective lenses.

# WNAZ 24 hours

Listeners to Trevecca's WNAZ began hearing their "Christian Music FM" 24 hours beginning September 1st. WNAZ decided to go 24 hours in response to listeners requesting more late night and early morning broadcasting. Beginning at midnight and ending at 6:00 am, inspirational music is provided by the services of "Music Through the Night," a satellite service.

Response has been encouraging. The station has already received a number of calls from listeners telling how much they enjoy the new format. John Wesley, WNAZ's station manager,

says that "This program helps provide a sense of peace in some of the listeners life."

WNAZ is now able to say that they are the only Christian FM station in the area that broadcasts 24 hours a day.

WNAZ has also made changes in their Saturday night programming. Saturday nights now have a full line-up for teens and young adults. "Christian Count Down" starts things off by playing the top 20 Contemporary Christian songs in the nation. "Count Down" starts at 7:00 pm. "Saturday Night Alive" follows at 9:00. The show is

hosted by Ron Hutchcraft, the New York director of Youth for Christ. The program deals with teen issues and problems. Each show has a selected theme. Music and skits dealing with the theme are used.

10:00 is the time for "Cross Walk." This music show is the number one syndicated Progressive Christian Music Program in the nation.

"Neon Knights" begins at 10:30. Trevecca DJs Burt Sumner and Scott Winchel host an hour and a half of progressive Christian music.


But it seems like a cruel joke. This trend for compassion is new and fresh, yet God and his church have always stressed compassionate ministries.



## Dan Peek in concert tonight at TNC

Success comes very naturally to Dan Peek, who was an integral part of AMERICA, one of the foremost rock groups of the seventies that made eight successful albums, a dozen hit singles, and musical history in less than a decade. Dan was chiefly responsible for founding the group and contributed to their constant string of #1 hits with songs like, "Today's the Day," "Don't Cross the River," and "Lonely People," to name a few.

Dan is now on his own, having premiered with his first solo album, "All Things Are Possible," which enjoyed tremendous success, climbing the charts and breaking a record for being in *Billboard's* Adult Contemporary chart for 34 weeks. In addition, "All Things Are Possible" was nominated for a Grammy.

Dan will appear tonight in the Benson Auditorium on Trevecca's campus. Trevecca's Student Government Assembly is putting on the show which starts at 7:30 pm and is open to the public. Tickets are \$7.00 at all Ticketmaster locations. Student tickets are available on campus through SGA.

While in high school in London, Dan met the other members of what later became AMERICA.

Enthusiasm for their music gained tremendous popularity in the London area and the group soon caught the attention of Warner Brothers recording label. A recording contract was obtained from them and soon AMERICA's popularity spread throughout the world with their first single release, "Horse With No Name," which became #1 both in England and in the United States, even before their first promotional tour was completed. The group won a Grammy in 1973 for Best New Artist of the Year. In the span of eight years they recorded eight albums — all of which went gold, four platinum.

They conducted 32 nation-wide tours and three world tours, as well as numerous television appearances, including a Bob Hope Special. 

## Seaman opens Fall Chapel Schedule



### American Heart Association:

## Americans eating habits on the upswing

The more things change, the more they reflect our past which is true of our eating habits too.

According to the American Heart Association, the past two decades have shown a return to some of the more healthy eating habits of our ancestors.

Statistics show that our consumption of beef, animal fat, eggs and sugar has declined, while our consumption of fresh fruit, chicken and turkey, fish and vegetable fat has increased.

These changes in eating habits have, in all probability played a role in the 30.7% decline in total

heart disease mortality rates from 1972 to 1983.

Many things have helped this decline. Diagnosing and treating heart disease has come a long way in the past two decades. People are smoking less and having their blood pressure checked. Overall, people are more informed about their health.

However, cardiovascular disease still accounts for almost one half the deaths in the United States and Tennessee. While our health habits have improved, we are still behind the times compared to our counterparts of the 1920's.
