## Diehl to become director of Nashville Youth for Christ

Claude Diehl, Trevecca's Director of Corporate Support, has resigned his position to assume the responsibilities of the Executive Director of Youth for Christ in Nashville. An experienced fundraiser and successful liaison between Trevecca and the Nashville business community, Diehl has received a number of honors for his outstanding capabilities, including being elec-

ted to the presidency of the local chapter of the National Society for Fund Raising Executives and being named chairman of the President's Committee of the Nashville Chamber of Commerce. In an interview, Diehl answered a few questions about his new responsibilities.

**t-e:** You have been chosen to be the Executive Director of Nashville's Youth for Christ. What will your new responsibilities be and how did you come about receiving this position?

**CD:** I was approached by one of the board members of Youth for Christ about considering the vacancy they were going to have. Most of the Youth for Christ executives have been very ministry-oriented and their business and administrative responsibilities were not their emphasis. This time, they (Y for C) felt they wanted someone who has administrative experience. In order to expand programs, increased fund raising is necessary. My job will be mainly to see that the funds and staff are available to meet the real goal for Youth for Christ—to meet the needs of teens. There are two basic aspects to Youth for Christ. Youth guidance deals with the juvenile courts in order to reach first-time status offenders. Campus ministries is a club program that works through high schools and junior highs to reach young people there.

**t-e:** In addition, you were recently elected to serve as President of the local chapter of the National Society for Fund Raising Executives. Would you explain that position?

**CD:** As President of the local chapter it is my job to work with the rest of the officers to come up with programs for the Middle Tennessee area. The NSFRE is a professional organization that provides for certification for fund raisers. I was also chosen recently to serve on the national board of the NSFRE. And I will be the co-host of the national convention to be held in Nashville next year.

**t-e:** As you leave Trevecca in June, how do you want your associates at the college and in the business community to remember you?

**CD:** I want to be thought of as a person who is committed to Christian higher education and its relationship to the business community as well as to the church. I hope I did something to build the relationship between Trevecca and the business community.

**t-e:** As Youth for Christ executive, what would you give as advice to Trevecca students?

**CD:** I believe that, since Youth for Christ is a volunteer organization, I would encourage students to get involved in volunteer ministry to help others.

## Break-in at Johnson

An unidentified man broke into the first floor of Johnson Dorm this past Friday night, February 13, 1987, at about 1:30 in the morning and escaped without any apparent theft or damage.

The intruder entered the dorm through the laundry room window. He had apparently climbed on the railing which runs along the backside of the dorm and entered through the unlocked window. He was attempting to break into a room when Beth Rainer, a sophomore from Homestead, Fl., startled him. Rainer ran back up the steps, and the man left, supposedly, through

the same window.

Rainer alerted some others, and Trevecca Security and Metro police were on the scene by 2:00 am. A cursory check of the floor showed no signs of the intruder still being in the building.

The laundry room door and window are supposed to be locked each night, but neither was on the night the break-in occurred.

The incident raised questions about just how secure the campus really is. In an open forum sponsored by SGA Monday night, Earl Hyatt, Director of Campus Security, fielded questions about security procedures and problems. Several students mentioned the need for more security in the area

with metal grill work and additional lights being the main solutions offered.

Evie Freeman, a junior from Tampa, Fl., said in the meeting, "This is the second time in the three years I've been here that this has happened. They promised to do something last time and didn't. I don't want it to happen again."

Dr. Homer Adams, president of the college, and Steve Harris, Dean of Students assured the meeting that at least temporary measures would be taken to enhance security, and all the windows would be sealed as part of the air-conditioning project work projected to start this spring.

## IDLE CURE

Frontline Records

Christian music has had a number of bands to surface recently. Most, unfortunately, offered little or nothing innovative or different. I won't get on my soapbox about Christian artists and settling for mediocrity. What I do want to say is that Idle Cure did catch my attention. Their initial LP is impressive.

"Breakaway" opens the A-side with driving guitars and aggressive vocals, not unlike those of Petra or the Allies. "Silent Hope" follows with a hopping synthesizer that slips into a groove. "Come Alive" is an eye-opener that pushes dangerously close to metal. But the jewel in Idle Cure's crown is their diversity. "Take It" is the LP's shining moment. In a Chicagoesque style, this ballad pulls you through key changes and emotive vocal riffs that soar. Likewise, in a style more like Journey or Bryan Adams, the ballad "From the Heart" shows the band's versatility.

Idle Cure definitely shows promise if their maiden effort is any indication of what's around the corner. ★★★★★

## MOSAIC

Wang Chung's latest reflects upon life and love, but most importantly, having fun. The single "Everybody Have Fun Tonight" had fun with the charts a short while ago with its frolicking vocals and jumpy brass. The follow-up is "Let's Go" and it follows suit with its tight harmonies and its comfortable, feel-good groove. "Hypnotize Me" is in a similar category--crowd-pleasing kitsch. "A Foll and His Money" is a triple meter swing that compares relationships and how they slip away to how a fool throws away his money. The album's clincher, though, is "The World In Which We Live." It is a rather pessimistic view of the world with all of its problems that offers no solutions. The chorus reads: "The world is a mosaic upon a golden floor / Moving silently, darkly through space / And our lives are the fragments and all that's gone before / Broken jewels in excrement base." Though innovative musically and clever with effects, the overriding negativism seems out of step with the band's aura of good feeling.

With the exception of a slight problem with some of the lyrics, MOSAIC is not a bad album. I wish Wang Chung could see that "the world in which we live" is not without hope--just a little short on people who will speak up for it where pessimism and disbelief are status quo. ★★

# Les 'Pop' McKay dies

A long time friend and supporter of Trevecca, Les "Pop" McKay, died yesterday morning in Pontiac, Michigan after two weeks in the hospital.

Mom (Marion) and Pop came to Trevecca in 1974 as Johnson Dorm parents and supervisors of the Snack Shoppe. They were dorm parents for nine years, and Pop continued as manager of the Snack Shoppe until 1984.

Mrs. Wilma Gallup, Trevecca's nurse, says of Pop, "He was a loving person. Both of them had a great ministry with young people. He had a good sense of humor, and was loved by everyone."

"Pop was one of the first persons I met when I came to Trevecca," says Scott Stargel, editor of trev-echoes, "He gave me a job as a short order cook and made me feel like I belonged here. He was a great man."

The McKays left Nashville in August of 1986 and moved to Pontiac to be closer to their families.

Both attended Eastern Nazarene College in Boston, Ma., and they served as pastor and wife in Michigan for several years.

Pop received the Staff Member of the Year award in 1983.

The cause of death was not known at press time, and funeral arrangements will be announced later.

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# TO THE EDITOR

Dear Editor:

I was delighted to see the list of Who's Who recipients printed in your January 29th issue. I felt that this year's group truly represented our finest TNC product. Therefore, I was equally dismayed when I read in your recent issue that one of those recipients, Lori Clements, will not receive the full recognition that I believe she deserves. I regret that a very outstanding, young woman who has been a campus leader, a candidate for the Valentine Pageant as well as a member of the Homecoming Court—one who has excelled in academics, and one who has been an example of an upright and wholesome character—would feel stigmatized in any way.

I am not usually an activist or considered a non-conformist or controversial individual. Perhaps this issue upsets me because I hear the echo of similar statements made to me thirty years ago when I received similar criticism. I can still remember how the brand "immodest" and the implication of compromise affected me. My picture was considered unacceptable and was used only after longer sleeves had been penciled in. Though I will admit that the addition is hardly noticeable to the casual observer, the same principle, as now was involved. Many things have changed in three decades except the response of "We must please the constituents" and "If the constituency is not pleased, they may refuse to pay their budgets." I worry that our concern for the students sometimes gets lost as we strive to have just the right image for the constituency. This attitude also places our editor and sponsor under great pressure.

I have not seen Lori's picture, and I can realize the controversial features of it, but she felt it represented a special part of her makeup that helped to identify her individuality just as previous candidates have been pictured as fishermen or dramatists.

I am not advocating lowering our standards in any way, but I am expressing a concern that instead of being so concerned with peripheral issues that we go below the surface to deal with some vital concerns that often we tend to ignore or that we refuse to deal with that may affect our students' eternal destinies.

The motto on the Trevecca seal is "Esse Quam Videri," To Be Rather Than To Seem. My prayer is that we, the constituency, faculty, administration, and students, will go beyond "seeming" holy by the way we look or sound and truly "be" by our depth of character and commitment.





# Trojans clinch TCAC

Trevecca clinched the Tennessee Collegiate Athletic Conference with a big win at Lambuth Tuesday night.

The Trojans defeated Lambuth 94-79. Avery Patton, Trevecca's all time leading scorer, added a big chunk to his total by pouring in 33 points. Aquinas transfer Charles Brooks had 20, and Juniors Scott Hiser and Sandy McClain were both in double digits with 19 and 10 respectively. Hiser led the team with 10 rebounds.

McClain and Reggie Little had to sit out the last half of the second period after a bench-clearing brawl. Both were ejected from the game and face possible suspensions.

The win gave the Trojans a 14-1 TCAC record and guaranteed Trevecca the home court through the District 24 playoffs. Trevecca extended its winning streak to 14 games which ties the school record.

And the Trojans would really like to break that record for more reasons than one.

It just so happens that Trevecca's next game is tonight against crosstown rival David Lipscomb. Trevecca defeated Lipscomb at Trojan Fieldhouse in

their first conference match-up. If the game lives up to what it should be, it will be an offensive explosion. Lipscomb and Trevecca are both averaging over 90 points a game this season.

Trevecca finishes up the regular season at Lindsey Wilson this Saturday night at Columbia, Ky..

In this week's other game, Trevecca beat their other crosstown rival, Belmont College 94-88 to send the Rebels out of the playoff picture.


