Dr. David Slamp announces resignation

Dr. David A. Slamp, Associate Professor of Religion, will be leaving the Trevecca Community at the end of this semester. Dr. Slamp has accepted a new and exciting ministry assignment: Administrative Pastor of the Church of God, Anderson in Wichita, Kansas. This is the largest congregation in that denomination, averaging well over 2000 in worship.

His responsibilities as Administrative Pastor will include: pastoring and training the 12 staff members and 18 directors of different ministries in which the church is active. These include a Christian school, a counseling center, and about 70 small groups.

Dr. Slamp noted the difficult decision to leave involved "Four months of prayer and mixed emotions," and he would like to express his love for the whole Trevecca community, as "it has

become home. I go with confidence that I know God always has someone who can do the job as well or better, when God clearly leads us somewhere else. I am excited about using my gifts to the maximum potential in this new and challenging assignment."

The Division of Religion and Philosophy's search committee will begin to meet concerning Dr. Slamp's replacement within two weeks.

Dr. Slamp has no intentions of leaving the Church of the Nazarene, and the Church of God, Anderson does not have membership. The denomination is one of a group of denominations within the broader Wesleyan/holiness tradition of the Body of Christ to which the Church of the Nazarene belongs.

Dr. Slamp graduated from Northwest Nazarene College in 1966; Nazarene Theological Seminary, 1969; and earned the Doctor of Ministry degree from Fuller Theological Seminary in 1990. He began his ministry in Southern California, serving as Associate/Youth Pastor for 2 years, then pastoring a church in San Diego for 6 years. He then pastored El Paso, Texas First Church for 5 years before returning to his home turf in Vancouver, Washington, where he pastored for 7 years. He

was Assistant Professor of Practics and Director of the Master of Ministry program at Southern Nazarene University in Oklahoma for a year and a half. He pastored on special assignment in Hereford, Texas, for a year and a half before joining the faculty of Trevecca in the fall of 1992.

Since coming to TNU, Slamp has been active writing and developing the CareRing small group ministry resources aimed at local churches in spiritual growth and evangelism. His ministry in this area has included 3 1/2 years on staff at Nashville 1st Church and College Hill. He has spoken widely in the Church of the Nazarene in the U.S. and Canada, and his seminar on "Unleashing the Middle-sized Church" has been sponsored by the Church Growth Division of the Church of the Nazarene.

Dr. Ryan Gray selected new baseball coach

Dr. Ryan Gray, assistant baseball coach at MTSU, has been announced as Trevecca's new head baseball coach beginning this summer. He is a graduate of Union College (now Union University) and holds a doctorate from MTSU in teaching.

"I think we are very, very fortunate to be getting him. He's a fine young man. . . . He's had good experience at the

Division I level. . . . He's very well known in this entire area of Tennessee. He has a good rapport with high school coaches and junior college coaches, so I think he is going to do a great job for us recruiting," says TNU Athletic Director Lora Donoho.

Gray, age 29, is regarded as a fine teacher. At MTSU, he is the director of the computer lab. Positive recommendations on his behalf were

Well, having played at Union University, I realized the conference is one of the stronger NAIA conferences. I realize its going to be a new conference, bringing in

stronger teams. I realize the tradition and the strength of Trevecca baseball having played in the same league. That was very attractive. The opportunity to be head coach at this type of institution. . . and also the opportunity to teach in this department after having received my doctorate at MTSU was very attractive.

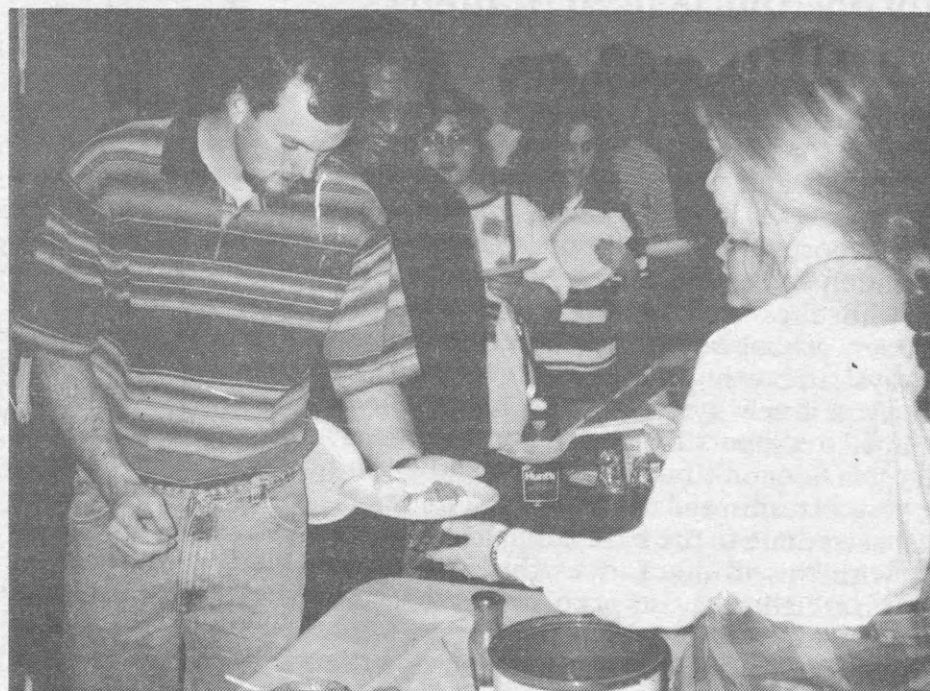

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Personal autonomy and Christian community: a give and take relationship

This week marks an important time in the history of Trevecca Nazarene University. Not only has it seen the official change of Trevecca's name, but it is also the week in which we elect our student government leaders for next year.

Having said this, I would like to return to the topic with which I began to deal in the last issue of the newspaper: Christian community. For our purposes, we should consider what Christian community might mean for Trevecca Nazarene University. Some would say that Christian community for Trevecca means that we should all love, trust, and respect each other. Some might say that it means that we all share in the redemptive work of Christ. Others might say that Christian community is life lived in the Spirit and not according to imposed morality.

Rather than focusing on any of these, I would like to propose a very specific aspect of Christian community for our consideration: maybe one element of Christian community is that each member of that community is more oriented toward giving than taking.

This might seem rather simplistic at first, but it seems to me that those individuals who I most respect as Christians are ones who are nearly always willing to give of themselves. This includes teachers, pastors, and laypersons alike. On the other hand, I seem to be predisposed toward suspicion of individuals who seem to only be "takers." And here again, this would apply to teachers,

pastors, and laypersons alike.

So how does this apply to us as members of the Trevecca Community? First, it seems to me that in a very fundamental way, one must surrender some element of personal autonomy to be a true member of any community. If there were not some demand (or responsibility) placed on us by our community, would we be a community at all? Conversely, if the community does not have certain responsibilities to the individual (or, in a sense, if the individual cannot place appropriate demands on the community), is there a community at all? Second, communal living would appear to be a process of both giving and taking. After all, if everyone were to give, but no one were to receive, the act of giving would be useless.

Now let's apply this to a relevant situation: SGA elections are this week. We will be electing students to both represent us and lead us. In order for this school to be a community, I believe that it will require that each of us be willing to give our attention to this event and to cast a vote for who we would prefer to fill these roles. Second, I believe that every candidate should be willing to give of himself or herself to actualize the potential that exists both within themselves and, more importantly, within this school and student body. Lastly, I believe that we all must be willing to give of ourselves to each other and to this school as we forge ahead toward our visions and goals.

And maybe, just maybe, we will find ourselves in something like a Christian community.

Was it appealing that Trevecca is a Christian school?

Yes. Having players with strong character is very important. The institution and the ideals and guidelines that Trevecca have is consistent with my belief system....

What is your coaching experience and is this your first head coaching experience?

This is my first college head coaching position. I coached two years at Covington High School in Covington, Tennessee. I was head baseball coach at Clarksburg High School, [also] in West Tennessee. **Have you received valuable insight since you have been at MTSU that has helped you be ready for TNU's challenge?**

Yes, absolutely. I've been very privileged to work with three class individuals at MTSU on the coaching staff. I can't say enough for Coach Peterson, the head coach, and the wisdom and insight he has given me [and] the experiences with hard working players—hard working student athletes that not only take athletics seriously, but take academics seriously. That's why you call them student-athletes.

Student comes before athlete.... They are representing the ideals, beliefs, and standards [for which] Trevecca University has stood for many many years. The athletes should realize that it is a privilege and not a right to get to play college baseball.

How was your reaction to your first meeting with your new players?

It was very encouraging. I was straightforward and honest with them, that's the way I like to deal with people. I was very encouraged by the feedback that I got, as far as their work ethic and there responsibility to become better baseball player but more important than that to become better students and better citizens in the world that they live in.... Athletically speaking, I'll find out more in the fall.

Concerning Coach Gray, team captain Clayton Callicott said, "He's going to come in and fit the position real well.... He's got everything well laid out as far as the program and everything. He's got an open mind and he's going to do a great job fitting into school and the program.... I think he's going to do a great job."

New members force TCAC name change

Recently, the Executive Committee of the Tennessee Collegiate Athletic Conference (TCAC) met and decided it was time for a name change. Because of several changes in school memberships a new name was desired for the Athletic Conference. The proposed name is the Transouth Conference.

The TCAC has been undergoing some changes in the last couple of years. In 1994 the colleges of Belmont, Christian Brothers, Cumberland, and Lambuth all announced that they would be looking to join other conferences. Belmont and Christian Brothers have both joined the NCAA, while Cumberland and Lambuth have moved into a football conference.

With these changes, the TCAC

announced that there were openings in the conference for schools who would be interested in joining. Four colleges from across the Southeast, Williams Baptist of Arkansas, Birmingham Southern of Alabama, Berry College of Georgia, and Lee College of East Tennessee, each expressed interest in possibly joining the TCAC. In 1995, the Executive Committee of the TCAC met with the schools and approved their membership into the athletic conference.

Professor Toby Williams of Trevecca Nazarene University, Eligibility Chairman for the TCAC, explained the name change: "Last year there was a special meeting held in which a name change was proposed since there would be four schools outside the state of Tennessee in the conference. The

proposed name was Transouth." Williams says that the name will not become official until October of 1996, when the committee meets to give final approval to the change.

Due to the changes within the conference, the Trevecca Trojans will face some different teams on all the athletic schedules beginning in the fall of 1996. However, colleges like Belmont may remain on the schedules as out-of-conference opponents.

Including Trevecca, the new Transouth Athletic Conference will have eleven member schools rather than ten. Professor Williams believes that the Transouth Conference will be an even stronger conference than the TCAC. He adds, however, that Transouth will remain a Division I NAIA Conference.

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Trojan basketball team finishes season with 17-16 record

The Trevecca Trojan's basketball team finished the 1995-1996 season with a record of 17-16. They improved their win total by eight games from last season. Head Coach Sam Harris said, "I think that it was a great step in the right direction for us and our basketball program to win 17 games."

Harris also expressed that progress is being made toward his goal of being conference championship contenders. This year's team finished with a winning record despite numerous injuries and with about half the team being underclassmen.

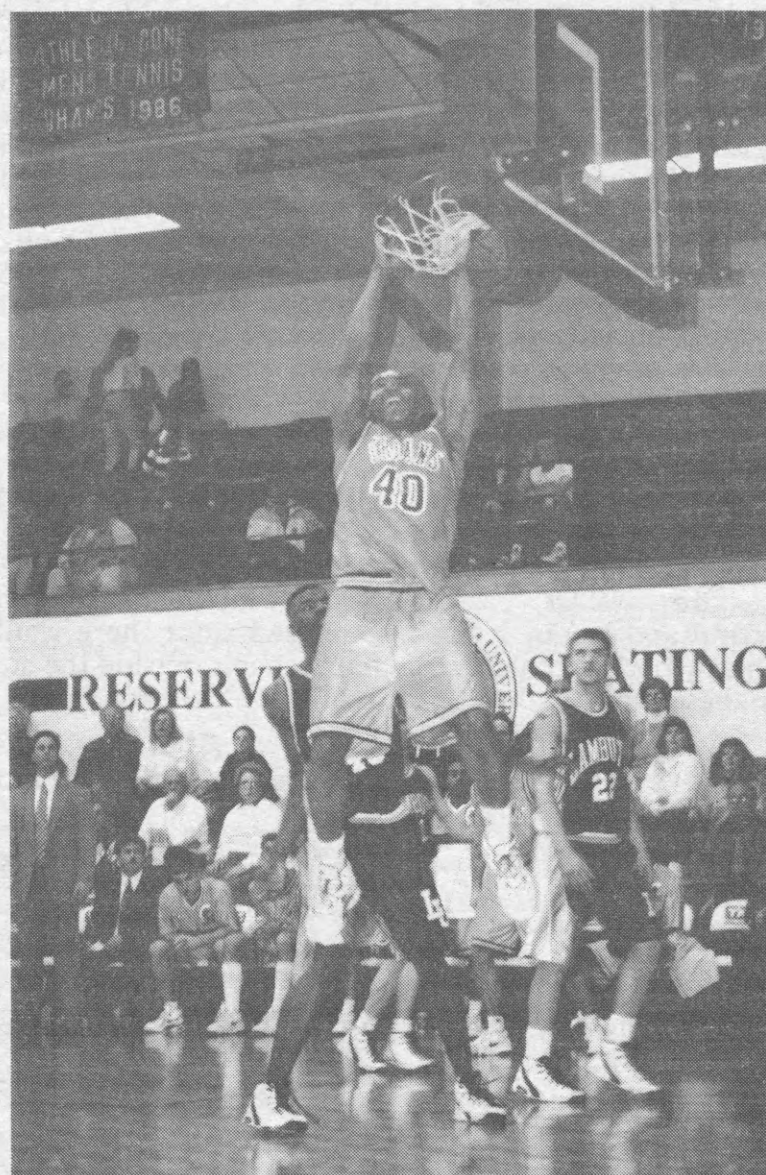
In regard to the team's goals from the pre-season, Coach Harris said the following: "We had a couple of goals: Number one, we wanted to win the three tournaments we were to be in—we won that. Number two, we wanted to finish about .500%—we did that. Some of the things were statistical goals. We wanted to shoot 50% from the floor—we ended up shooting 48%. We said we wanted to shoot 74% from the line—we shot 73%."

David Blanford said that he thought the high of the season was achieving the winning record and the low being that some of the losses should have been won. He commented, "The new guys and freshmen helped us tremendously. I think we are

going to have a real good team next year." Blanford anticipates that Coach Harris will be able to recruit some bigger players to go along with the good nucleus of returning players to have an even better team next year. Blanford expressed pleasure that his averages went up in almost every statistical category, but says would have enjoyed that more with a few more wins.

Coach Harris also expressed his desire to win more conference games next year but acknowledged that it will be tougher with Lee College and Birmingham Southern entering the conference. Further, he said that the team will need to improve in terms of analyzing their opponents' strengths and weaknesses, though improvement in following the scouting reports was demonstrated this year.

In summing up the season Coach Harris said, "I think on the court we improved tremendously this year. I think off the court our players have to become better students and accept their responsibility for their classroom responsibility and the activities that surround them—their off-court behavior.... You can't be as good as you need to be if you are not eating right and not getting proper rest and [are] then trying to play three games in our league on a weekly basis after the start of January."

Louise Chapman: vessel of the Lord

(Editor's Note: Since March is Women's History Month, Trevechoes decided to look into the past and profile an outstanding female leader from the Church of the Nazarene. The following information was condensed from the August 1993 issue of World Mission magazine.)

Since the beginning of outreach ministries in the Church of the Nazarene, a strong correlation has existed between women and missions. According to the editor of World Mission magazine, "Women have played a significant role in the promotion, support and work involved in this ministry." One woman who can be greatly attributed for such influence is Louise Robinson Chapman.

According to close friends of Chapman, early in her life she made a covenant with God that she would give herself totally to Him. "It was from then on that God never once failed her," said Gail L. Sawrie, a writer for *World Mission* magazine. After Chapman graduated college, she

was ordained and was appointed by the World Mission Department of the Church of the Nazarene as a missionary to Africa. Chapman entered missions in 1920 when the work was new, and missionaries had to do a little bit of everything since there were so few men and women on the field at that time.

After spending almost 20 years in Swaziland, Chapman came home on furlough in 1942, and, due to the war, was unable to go back to the field. It was at that time that she married Dr. J.B. Chapman, general superintendent of the church of the Nazarene. According to Mrs. Chapman, those were some of her most beautiful years, and "life was wonderful and blissful in every way."

Shortly after her husband's death in 1947, Mrs. Chapman was chosen to be the general president of the mission work, equivalent to a present day NWMS director (the executive officer of the organization). However, Chapman admitted that this position of 16 years wasn't as enjoyable as the mission field, but she knew that it was where God wanted her to be.

Upon retirement from NWMS, Chapman was stricken with a virus similar to that of polio, which she acquired on a trip to Papua New Guinea. This illness paralyzed her whole body. However, through God's strength and healing power, she worked her way up to partial mobility.

For the years to follow, Chapman continued to minister to others and never lost sight of the importance of missions. She believed that it was her main task was to keep Christian people "awake" and help them realize their commission: "to help others find the fullness of life which God wants us to have."

As recently as the 1989 General Assembly, Chapman was promoting the importance of World Mission Radio. Reportedly, the 96 year old woman wrote to 400 persons by the form of a Christmas letter and was able to raise one million dollars for the cause.

In August of 1993, Louise Robinson Chapman went to be with the Lord. In the words of Nina G. Gunter, general director, NWMS, speaking of the influence Chapman had on those around the world: "You may think that Louise Chapman is dead. But don't believe a word of it. She is more alive now than ever."

Eye on Your Aid: Computers to simplify aid process

Most of you know that the financial aid process can sometimes become complicated. However, a new system is in place for the '96-'97 year that will help in simplifying various aspects of the process. This new system is EDE, or Electronic Data Exchange. I attended a workshop this past December to learn how EDE would affect our office and the students at Trevecca. I came home excited, for I found that the changes would be positive for everyone.

In the past, you (the student) have applied for financial aid and then begun a waiting period of five to six weeks to receive the SAR (Student Aid Report). To receive financial aid for the '96-'97 year you will again apply for aid and receive a SAR just as in previous years. The difference now is that the SARs will be transmitted electronically to our office for all students who list Trevecca on their applications. This will enable us to possibly mail out award letters before students even receive their SAR in the mail. For students who do not list Trevecca as one of the institutions they might attend, our office, with permission of the student, will also be able to pull down an

electronic SAR.

Another important change is that the corrections to SARs will now be made electronically. In the past you have made the corrections on the SAR and then mailed those corrections to Iowa to be processed. Now, we will make the corrections electronically and receive the corrected SAR within 72 hours. This eliminates the SAR being sent to a home address and then being mailed to Trevecca. All of this results in financial aid being awarded to you in a more timely manner.

The third aspect of EDE that effects our office concerns the Pell Grant Program. In the past we have used hard copies to verify a student's Pell Grant, enrollment status, ect. Now this process will be done via EDE. This aspect of EDE will enhance the efficiency of our office and will help Trevecca drawing down Pell Grant money faster.

Spring Break 1996 is now a memory, but pursuit of financial aid for the fall of 1996 has just begun. If you have not applied for financial aid for the '96-'97 school year, you need to do so immediately. You can do this by completing the renewal form that

may have been sent to your home by ACT or by filling out a new financial aid application which is available in the Financial Aid Office.

As always, Keep An Eye On Your Aid.

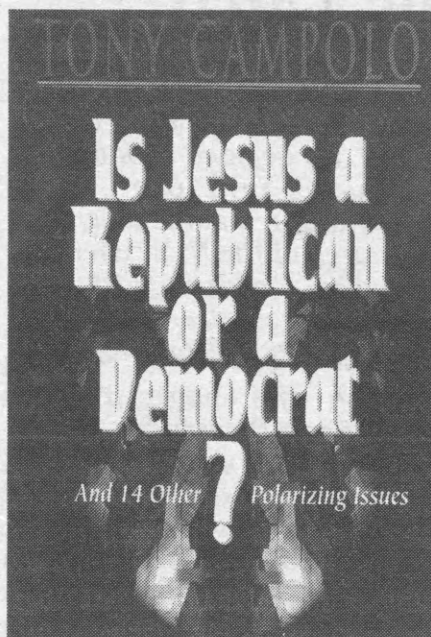
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Book Review: Is Jesus a Republican or a Democrat?

There are many issues that seem to demand an answer. For many of these issues, there seems to be no middle ground. Those that are not for one way of seeing things must then be against it. It is a good thing to stand one's ground, but a line must be drawn between the things that really matter and those things that are not vital.

In Tony Campolo's book *Is Jesus a Republican or a Democrat?* the reader is given a humorous yet serious look at the way the church fragments herself today over issues that have little or no Biblical foundation. In this book, Campolo deals with such issues as the struggle within churches to accept members of different political views, abortion, gay-bashing, illegal aliens, and welfare. Campolo also brings up questions such as "Does God have a feminine side?"; "Was Jesus a moderate?"; and "Is TV demonic?"

Obviously, we can look at some of these issues and laugh, but it is important to really examine what makes us laugh. Many laugh

at these because they have known themselves or others to spend much time and energy on these questions without saying much at all.

Campolo asks these question for a reason. He "believes that Christians have a Biblical responsibility to confront real issues and to speak the truth without hedging their bets—even when that goes against politically correct stances of either the left or the right." This, however, is certainly not the approach he seems to be taking in this book. This seems to me to be yet another book that wishes to inform the reader of all the ramifications of any side of an issue without standing for any one in particular. The result is a great deal of conflicting information that the reader must then try to sort out into some kind of argument. Campolo does a very good job of presenting and destroying all sides of an

argument until there seems to be no ground at all on which to stand. The reader is left wondering if it would have been better not to know.

Another fault one finds glaring from the book is a resentment the Campolo seems to hold against the church for some of the ways in which he has been treated personally. For example, in one chapter entitled "Are Christian talk Shows Christian" Campolo complains about a radio station that would often comment sarcastically on his earlier ideas and books. He further complains that this station was responsible, in part, for the disruption of his ministry.

All in all, this book seemed to me to be an exercise in making mountains out of molehills. Many of the issues that Campolo raises just seemed to be trivial and not worthy of great thought. Further, those issues that were really important were side-stepped as if they were lepers.

Drama Review: J.B.

The TNU Communications Department performed Archibald MacLeish's *J.B.* on the weekends of February 16-17 and February 22-24.

J.B. is a tale about one man's suffering based on the Biblical story of Job but in a contemporary setting. The conflict centers around the struggles of a good man and his battle within himself for knowledge of God. The story line and the performances were wonderful.

The first thing that caught my attention in this drama was the scenery. It was done in a mock circus motif and did an excellent job of reflecting the symbolism of what was happening in the play. Jeff Frame said, "We [Director Kim Messer and Frame] wanted to create a nether world with a circus motif so that it would serve as a bridge between the spiritual world and the physical world. We also wanted to suggest in the set design that both the spiritual world and the physical world coexist simultaneously. Beyond the gray of the set the only color in the design came in the form of the lighting and the costuming."

Some other things that I really thought were great about this play were the casting and staging. The cast worked very well together and everyone did a great

job of portraying their characters. The cast showed good staging quality. Two characters had to remain on stage for the entire play, but never fell out of character and never distracted attention from the main action on stage.

My favorite part of the play was the word puzzles and poetic speaking that was scripted for several of the characters in the play. The poetic speeches that I enjoyed the most were those of the male policeman, played by Vince McVay; the old hag, played by Robin Hess; and the Flower child, played by Bethany Mitchell. Though the crowd on the evening I attended was quite small, the energy of the cast was great. I was very impressed with the whole play.

"The drama department presented a thought provoking dialog engaging the human situation. What emerged was a picture of man not necessarily as he wants to be, but the only way he can be and still truly be man," said Chuck Haselwood, a junior at TNU.

Those who did not see *J.B.* missed an excellent production. TNU's Communication Department and all involved did a great job, as usual.
