## Welcome Back!

Trevecca's campus has come alive once again with the hustle of every day college life. Many students began moving in their dorms Friday, August 21, others are still arriving.

Friday evening was the beginning of many new friendships for the freshmen of the 1987-88 Fall semester. An ice cream social, sponsored by Trevecca's Student Government Assembly, was held in the Jemigan Student Center's cafeteria. New students, as well as old, were able to create their own sundaes.

Saturday was a day full of activity for the frosh. By 8:00a.m. Saturday morning many frosh were taking their ACT tests. Required testing for all frosh began at 2:00p.m.. Benson Auditorium sited the first Freshman Studies at 6:00p.m.. Parent Orientation followed the Freshmen Studies.

Parent Orientation has been designed to inform parents on the history, spiritual life, student life, academic life, finances, and financial aid offered at Trevecca.

Hosting the session was Dr. Homer J. Adams, president of Trevecca. Adams addressed freshmen parents and told of the

different changes college students have from living at home. Adams mentioned that (1) freshmen do not have their parents there to force them to get up and go to class, (2) no one can force them to go to church, and (3) they can stay up all night. Still there are restrictions. "Freshmen students are forced into adjusting to a greater freedom than they have ever had in their life," states Adams. He continues, "many spend the extra money their parents have given them during the first week."

Also speaking at the Orientation were Dr. Don Dunnington, Chaplain; Mr. Steve Harris, Dean of Students; Dr. William Strickland, Academic Dean; Mr. M. L. White, Chief Fiscal Officer; Mr. Everett Holmes, Financial Aid Director; and Dr. Melvin Welch, Director of Admissions.

A reception was held at 2:30 p.m. in JSC for parents and new students to meet with Trevecca administration and faculty.

Monday, August 24, freshmen had general orientation while upper classmen registered.

Tuesday, August 25, the freshmen were able to register for their first semester at Trevecca.

## Tuition outstrips inflation

(CPS)—College students returning to campus this fall will find higher tuitions awaiting them again.

Tuition increased faster than the inflation rate for the seventh consecutive year, according to a survey by The College Board released August 9.

In its annual look at what colleges are charging students, the College Board found four-year private schools are now 8 percent more expensive than they were in fall, 1986.

They now cost an average of \$120,493 for tuition, fees, room and board.

Four-year private schools have raised tuition by 8 percent each of the last 3 years, while four year public schools have boosted costs by an average rate of 6 percent during the same time period.

Latest figures from the Office of Management and Budget in Washington, D.C., indicate the

general inflation rate for 1987 may reach 5.4 percent.

In 1986, prices nationwide increased an average of 2.6 percent, and have not increased by as much as 4 percent any year since 1984.

Nevertheless, students at four-year public institutions will pay

an average of \$4,104 for school this fall, a 6 percent jump since 1986, the College Board said.

At private two-year campuses, students will pay an average of \$6,945. Students attending two-

Mr. Richard B. Ryding joins the Trevecca faculty as Associate Professor of Pastoral Ministry. He holds a B.S. from Seattle Pacific, M. Dr. Jerry D. Jones comes to us as Professor of Education with primary assignment in the graduate program in Education. He holds a B.S. from West Virginia State College, an M.A. in Counseling and Guidance from West Virginia College of Graduate Studies, and an Ed.D. in Supervision, Curriculum, and Administration from Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University.

Mr. Gregory P. Runyan joins the Trevecca faculty as Assistant Professor of Business. He is a graduate of Trevecca in Accounting and Business Administration, has a C.P.A., and

is currently working on an M.B.A. at Tennessee State University.

Ms. Lena J. Hegi will join the faculty in January, 1988, as Assistant Professor of Communications. She has a B.A. from Trevecca, an M.A. in Speech Communication from Auburn University, and is currently writing her doctoral dissertation for a Ph.D. in Communication at the University of Massachusetts at Amherst.

Dr. Kenneth W. Oosting has been employed as Director of the new Management of Human Resources Program on a management contract. Oosting has a B.A. from the University of Michigan, an M.A. in History from Central Michigan University, and a Ph.D. from the University of Minnesota in College Management in Early American History.

This column has been a frequent request by the student body here at Trevecca, and it is finally here. A column that will deal with those problems that you just don't know what the answers are or who to turn to.



need to raise tuition to compensate for money they no longer get from state legislatures year public colleges will pay average costs of \$687.







A budget crisis in Oklahoma, for instance, forced legislators there to increase tuition at state campuses by more than 10 percent this fall.

Citing a "fair but inadequate" increase in funding from his state legislature, Western Michigan University President Diether H. Haenicke said August 5 he'd have to raise tuition for undergrads a whopping 9.5 percent this fall.

Upon hearing of the College Board's summary of tuition hikes, U.S. Secretary of Education William Bennett—who has asserted colleges raise their tuitions more than necessary because they know their students can borrow more money from the federal government—sighed, "There they go again and again and again. When will they ever stop?"



# Church Corner

What do super glue, a bear trap, a boa constrictor, and First Church of the Nazarene college/career ministries have in common? They are all designed to make connection with you, and once they do, you can't let go!

It's a new day of ministry and involvement for TNC college students, as well as students from other schools and career youth, at First Church. Collegians' Pastor Bruce Oldham arrived in late March, a new College/Career Leadership team (COLT) has been assembled, and new programs are being developed. Bruce came to Nashville First after four-and-a-half years of youth ministry experience in Alabama and Florida, and four years of serving as the Southeast USA regional

Representative to the General NYI Council, which includes developing and directing TNT at TNC each spring. His wife, Peggy, a 1979 TNC graduate, contributes additional depth to the college team; they have a two-and-a-half year old son named Scott.

This year's theme of "CONNECT!" is derived from Ephesians 4:16, "From Him the whole body, joined and held together by every supporting ligament (connected), grows and builds itself up in love, as each part does its work (NIV)." The task is three-fold: 1) to have each collegian who attends First Church committed and accountable to that local Body; 2) to provide avenues for personal growth through emotional

support, academic-occupational relationships, spiritual growth groups, and fellowship; and 3) to help each student, because of his commitment and time in personal growth, to "connect" with ministries in the Nashville area where his ministry skills and talents are needed. The goal is to have a group who is alive, positive, growing, and active; with each member being involved in at least one ministry to others.

Some of the aspects of the First Church program are:

**SUNDAY SCHOOL**—It's the "entry point" of the program; it's very difficult to stay up-to-date and involved without being regular in attendance in Sunday School. Two classes meet

weekly: Collage, which meets in the gym, is taught by Vince Wilcox and Bruce Oldham, and Horizon, which meets in room 222 of the Youth Building and is taught by Wilson and Connie Tate.

**S.A.C.K.** (Sponsor a College Kid)—The original student adoption program is back in strength. Bobby and Rondy Smith are co-ordinators. Each First Church collegian is matched with a First Church family for support and fellowship.

**CORE**—A program of leadership development and discipleship. This new effort is led by Ed and Jenny Savage. The focus is to develop personal spiritual leadership and equip you in personal evangelism and caring ministries. Participants must make a weekly commitment to the group, and upperclassmen are recommended.

**CONNECT**—The program which lends its name to our theme has two sections:

**CWC** (Connect with Careers) is a network of Christian businessmen and career people who will be available for counseling in your chosen major and projected career.

**Ministry Connections** is an organization of social and spiritual ministries, like the Nashville Soup Kitchen, STEP, Prison Ministry, Juvenile Dept. Tutoring, along with local church ministries like children, youth, and music ministries.

**FELLOWSHIPS**—Regular social activities are planned, all coordinated so as not to conflict with TNC activities. Most are at a low cost, and allow you chances to meet and share with students from other schools.

**MUSIC**—A college ensemble is being formed, there are opportunities to sing in the Sunday School class time, the monthly "Quarter Hour" on Sunday evening, sponsored by the college/career department, and in an occasional college choir, as well as spots open to you in the Sanctuary Choir led by Harlan Moore.

Why be involved in a local church, as a college student? Several myths which may discourage you need to be exposed for what they are—myths. They are:

a) I go to chapel 2 or three times a week at school; that's enough to keep me spiritually


healthy. Experiences of college students past proves otherwise. Although chapel is a great resource for you, it is not designed to meet the spiritual needs you have at this point in your life. You need to be committed to a local congregation.

b) I will go to the worship service every Sunday; that's enough. Yet Sunday School is the "entry point" for involvement; without it you will merely be a spectator in most cases. Without involvement in other aspects of local church ministry, you miss the ministry potential, contact with the "real world," and accountability. Even at a Christian college like Trevecca, you'll find forces which discourage your commitment, people who "straddle the fence" or are apathetic or antagonistic to committed Christianity, and the temptation to compromise or neglect your relationship with Jesus. Regular and involved commitment to a local church, in all aspects will help bring stability, consistency, and a sense of meaning to your college experience.

Why be involved at First Church? Things are happening! It's a big enough church to give you endless varieties of ways to serve, yet small enough to make you feel at home. It's close to the campus. Bus service is provided weekly, leaving from in front of the Jernigan Student Center at 9:30 each Sunday morning and 5:40 on Sunday evening. First Church and TNC have a rich heritage and tradition of serving together, to go along with new, progressive ministries. Most of all, it's a place where you will be loved, yet also have the best expected of you. We want to help you grow, mature, and take responsibility. Together, let's connect!



Sandy was named to the league's all-star team at the end of the season. Mac Heaberlin played for Athletes in Action in Europe. Howard Triche of Syracuse and Jeff Moe of Iowa were just a couple of his teammates.

**Question:** Should Molitor get the record, will he have an asterisk by his name in the record book? The argument is that Molitor is a designated hitter and doesn't have to play in the field.


