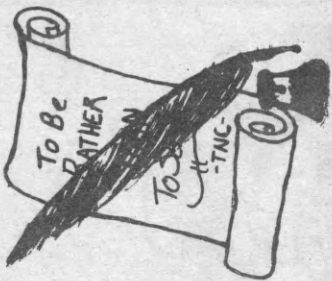

Obviously this is not an easily accomplished task. It takes a lot of work and a lot of people, but most importantly it takes the Lord. It also takes you. This program does not work without you. L.I.F.T. meets every Wednesday evening at 6:30pm, in TSAC. You are always welcome and encouraged to attend, and if attendance is not enough for you, you are also welcome to share in song.

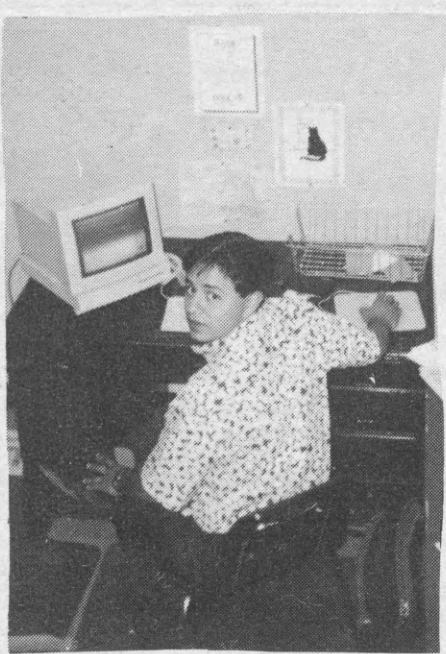

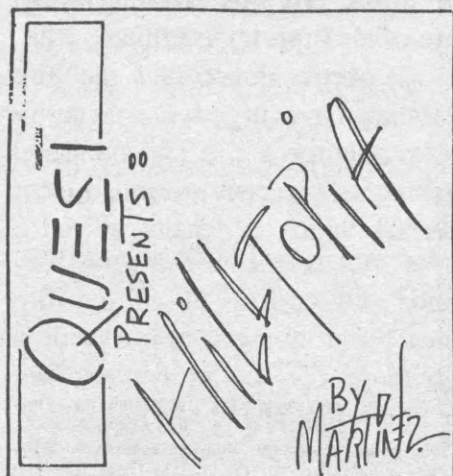

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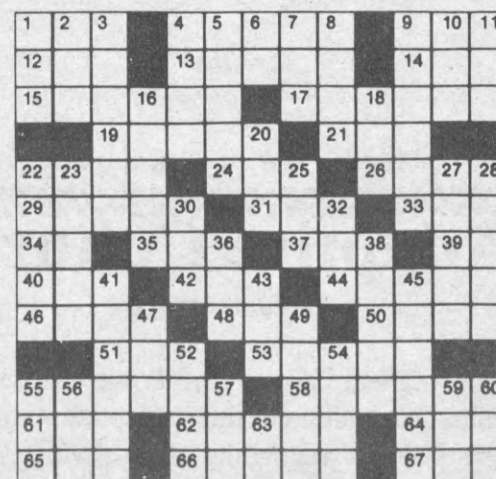

## Check It Out!

Excitement flourishes as busy research-hungry students pile into the library. Why all the fuss?

Everyone has been talking about "automation" at the library, but not everyone knows what it is.

Automation will allow books to be recorded on computer when checked out. In order for this to work, students will use their T-Cards during the check out process. A scanner will match up the student's identification information with the book's information, allowing the staff to know who has it and when it will be returned. Overdue books and fines will be recorded this way, as well.

The project involves more than merely setting up a few computers. A barcode sticker (much like the ones on supermarket items) must be placed on every item that is eligible for check out. There are 112,000 of such items, and every sticker must be affixed by hand. The barcoding process is monotonous and relatively grueling. Student assistants Sharon Spraker, Jamen McGranahan, and Tammy McClure helped during the summer, and made great progress. "Because our students did a wonderful job we didn't have to rely heavily on volunteers," said Mark Hall, Systems Services Librarian. Hall also expressed gratitude to those who volunteered their time.

Students will be able to do book searches on computers instead of in the card catalog. Every book has its own file in the computer and can be accessed in many ways. The conventional card catalog method allows books to be found by looking up author, subject, or title. This new method allows books to be found by call number (the number on the spine of the book) and by searching a key word.

This key word search is an important feature, said Mrs. Thrasher, Director of Library Services. Search terms can now be combined to reveal a whole different selection of books. For example, if the topic

Civil War, the computer can go straight to any book that has those words in its title or file. In the old card catalog the Civil War was a subtopic under American History, Wars, or individual state histories. This easier access will increase the students' awareness of books and will aid in the use of more of the library's resources.

Access to the library system is available by modem or by network from other campus buildings. Staff persons have already been able to do searches from some departments. Greater access will soon be available.

The roots of this automation project go back several years.

"Two years of research went on before the system was chosen," said Mrs. Ray Thrasher. "We (library staff) went on trips to Indiana, Pennsylvania, Ohio, and East Tennessee to see how their systems work."

The system chosen is developed by software vendors' Data Research Associates. This St. Louis-based company serves Tennessee Tech, Rhodes College in Memphis, Memphis-Shelby County Public Library, Christian Brothers University, and Belmont University. "Whole state library consortiums have adopted this system," Mrs. Thrasher said.

So how much does all of this cost? The project is budgeted for a little under \$150,000, according to Hall.

TNC's Vice President for Institutional Advancement, Claude Diehl, was responsible for the acquisition of all the funds, Mrs. Thrasher said.

"We have had a great response," said Diehl. "All of our sponsors have been very favorable about Trevecca and what it's doing for their employees."

Automation will especially benefit TNC's off campus adult students in the MHR and MOM programs in that they will be able to do all of their book searches away from school, and then can go by the library and pick up their sources, said Diehl.

These students have full time jobs and meet for class one night per week from 6:00-10:00.

The market that Diehl chose to appeal for donations is the employers of many of the adult students. These are the businesses that have the most interest in TNC. The lead gift is \$25,000 from First American National Bank, TNC's major bank and employer of 26 TNC students and graduates, said Diehl. Other contributors are South Central Bell, Comdata Holdings, Co., Allstate Foundation, HCA Foundation, NationsBank, Purity Dairies, Inc., and Genesco, Inc. "All but two of our calls are going to donate. When you get a ratio like that, it's unbelievable," said Diehl.

The library staff has been rather selfless in regard to

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sequence of its automation functions. They sacrificed getting the "office work" portion of the system up until the research part was ready for student use.

"Most libraries acquire the management function first, like cataloging and circulation. We've reversed it here. We think our students really need access. We felt it was important to put our students first," said Hall.

The complete project should be up and running by Thanksgiving, said Mrs. Thrasher. "We really feel like our students come first." This motto can be sensed all around the library.

# RADIO DAZE

A new radio station coming to Trevecca this fall will be a training facility for students.

The control room will be designed to function like a regular radio station. The only difference is it will only broadcast on campus through cables.

WNAZ Station Manager, Mark DeYoung, said that it will be a station where beginners in radio can gain experience. Students who already have some radio background will be able to build on their experience.

DeYoung will oversee the "Campus Carrier AM" station from a distance, but students will be the sole operators. They will have an opportunity to gain not only on-air experience, but station management experience as well. According to DeYoung, those involved will be volunteers or students required to participate for a class. The station will operate from seven or eight o'clock a.m., until curfew.

"The control room has been completed," DeYoung said. "Now it's a matter of raising money to get the signal to the rooms." The station has all of the equipment it needs to operate, and is located in the old WNAZ control room. Funds are currently being raised to get the hook-up lines into the dorms. DeYoung was not sure how long it would take for this much anticipated project to become a reality.

"Benson Hall will receive 'Campus Carrier AM' first," said WNAZ/WENO General Manager, David Deese, "because it will be the least expensive to hook up. Telephone wire will run from the station to the guys' dorm where an AM transmitter will be coupled to the electrical system. This will propagate the signal to be picked up on an AM radio receiver at the proper frequency.

"The womens' dorms will have to wait until more funds are raised, because the hook-up will be more expensive. Tennessee, Georgia, and Johnson Halls are too close together to each have a separate transmitter without interference. Because of that reason, only one transmitter will be used. It will be located at Georgia Hall with coaxial cables running to the others. This is a much more complicated system, and it will take more time and money to install."

In addition to serving as an on-air training facility for students, the new station will provide listeners on campus with an alternative radio station. It will play a mixture of Christian rock, alternative, and contemporary hit radio. Some of the groups that will appear on the playlist are: Petra, DC Talk, Code of Ethics, Crystavox, Guardian, Bride, White Heart, Whitecross, X-Sinner, Michael W. Smith, Pray for Rain, Jacob's Trouble, Steve Taylor, King's X, The Brave, Newsboys, Dakota Motor Co., and

much, much more.

"We already have some of the music here at WNAZ on compilation discs that record companies have sent us," said DeYoung. "Some of these songs will be transferred to cartridge tape, and others will be played directly from the disc."

The "Campus Carrier AM" will also serve as an advertising medium for clubs and organizations on campus. A club desiring to advertise a certain activity can have commercials produced for a set rate, which will enable students at the station to learn production and sales methods.

Obviously God is always a big part of what they do, but they have other help as well. Fred Mund, the vocal coach for the group, listens to them and then gives them pointers to polish their songs. Garrett Hessler is several things to the group including engineer and producer of their most recent album.

If you have ever been to one of their concerts, you already knew the basics. So let's get to the information you probably haven't obtained yet. Five different people coming from five different places in the United States, yet they are all at Trevecca. How did this happen? Well, there were five different answers to that question. Jonathan had the desire to attend a Christian college and located Trevecca through a college directory. He visited Trevecca and decided this was the place for him. Brad was attending a Nazarene church in Marietta, Georgia when he heard of the Purple and White. He says it was a combination of two things: his attendance of a Nazarene church and, ironically, New Direction concerts at church and camp. He had never even heard of the Trevedores until the summer before he came to Trevecca. Jerry took his step of faith at a Trevedores concert in Central Florida while he was in Junior High. He wanted to do for other teenagers what had been done for him, and he decided to use the same avenue as well. Gerron has known about our school for a long time as he has attended basketball games here for several years. Jeff had a friend in Texas that dreamed of coming to Trevecca. However, he made

Trevecca already owns WNAZ and WENO. WNAZ is at 89.1 FM on the radio dial, and plays adult contemporary music. It has been a part of Trevecca since 1967. WENO is AM Stereo 760 on the radio dial, and plays southern gospel and some bluegrass. Trevecca bought WENO three years ago and it is now one of the top 20 stations in Nashville.

Both of these stations have served as excellent training facilities in the past. However, it will be more beneficial for the beginning student to start out at a smaller level and move up to WENO and WNAZ.

Obviously God is always a fun of her. That is, until he became saved himself. Who's laughing now...?

So now you know how they arrived here and who they are, but what else? How do they work together? Are they friends outside of the group? What do they seek to accomplish this year? Put any five people together, and no matter how well they get along, they will disagree on occasion and the Trevedores are no exception. How do they deal with that? They have discovered that they are surprisingly different from one another and at the same time they are very alike. They have learned to compromise. They each have their own favorite songs and also songs they don't particularly love. When they find that there is a divide on what certain members like and other members don't, they each make a choice. That way everyone has a like and a dislike. If they find there is greater tension, they will part company for a few hours and have some "quiet time." To their commendment, they have not come across an argument that has threatened to form a permanent rift.

These guys are friends to one another in the truest sense. They hang out together regularly throughout the year, although not necessarily by themselves. However, during the summer they will schedule times to get together and go out, just 'the guys.'

When an inquiry was made as to their visions for this year, the answers again showed their diversity. Jonathan stated that he would like to "sing good christian music as best as we possibly



can". He feels that with a combination of the music and the ministry, God will be able to take their work and use it to reach their audiences. Brad expressed that he would like to "be the best group musically that we can possibly be, but at the same time be the most efficient group ministry-wise with neither one neglecting the other." Jerry feels they are "a group of true ministry, our focus is God and what he's done (personally...in my life) [and] for us. He's led us to where we are today. The Trevedores is a medium for that." Gerron says his vision for the group this year is "20/20 when I've got my glasses on." Seriously, he says it is too easy to let it all go to your head. He says that they may be "nothing at Trevecca", but the young people in their audiences may think they're the greatest. They have to be careful and maintain their focus. Their purpose is to lead in the worship and not put on a show. Jeff's foresight for this year is that they will never reach the point where they feel "we're good enough not to practice or rehearse." He believes "it's a ministry and a job," a job just like any other and that they will be striving to do their best to glorify God--as they would in anything. He would like them to always keep in mind that there is always someone better than them at what they do, and that's true of anything in life. Even if you become the best there is always God to keep you humble.

Next they were asked: What do you think of the Trevedores as a group? Jonathan believes they are a group that does the best they can to bring the message to the people and use good music to do it. Brad thinks they are "effective" to teenagers that are looking for a good school, but are also looking for someone closer to their own age that is "excited about living for Christ". Jerry put it quite simply, but more than adequately. They are "four of the closest friends I have and they are like my brothers". Gerron was asked

this question after the Wednesday night on-campus revival service. His feelings were they are a "positive example" to high schoolers making the choice between secular and Christian schools. At the same time he feels that the "recruiting isn't even important really." He says what is important is winning them to God and then they'll make the choice of Christian schooling and "can experience *this*"--speaking of revival--whether it be at Trevecca or not, but "I hope they come to Trevecca". Jeff could not seem to pin down one answer. He said "it is hilarious, it is frustrating, exciting, and incredible. I mean, you're taking five different personalities that you wouldn't think would click, but through God and the music, it clicks."

So, what's new with the Trevs this year? Music, what else? In the past the Trevedores have been put into the category of "Southern Gospel"--they would like to break out of that stereotype to start catering to all age groups. They are branching out into all genres of music, such as Contemporary, Rap, and Rhythm and Blues while still keeping some Southern Gospel and

Traditional in the mix. Here are some examples of these different genres: "It's All Right Now" (Southern Gospel), "Addicted to Jesus" (Rap), "And Can It Be" (a capella, Traditional), "I Now Live" (Rhythm and Blues), and lastly there is "Midnight Cry", (Contemporary).

Lastly, they were asked what they would like Trevecca to know about the Trevedores. They each shared a desire to represent Trevecca the best way they know how and they all expressed how much it means to them that they can do so. Jonathan said, jokingly, he would "like everybody to know where LaPlata, Maryland is." Seriously he would like us to know that they are doing their best to show their audiences what Trevecca is really all about. Brad's answer was along the same lines in that he would like us to know that they "really are interested in representing the college and the students of the college in the best way possible to the churches that support the college." Jerry would like to share that they are "real people.... We love our school and it means a lot to represent what students feel and spread it around the region." Gerron

states that they "feel confident that we are putting our best effort into it. We may not be the best to hit the stage, but we're trying our best" to show Christ and the spirit of Trevecca. Jeff shared that "when we talk about Trevecca the people shape what we say." They call Trevecca a place "full of friends" and they speak of how much "like a family it is." They also say it's the "people here that make Trevecca" and they "hope it's represented well."

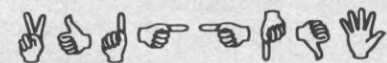

#### Police Corps Would Provide Loans to Students

I am renewing my push to establish a national Police Corps that would provide loans to college students who agree to work as police officers for four years after graduation.

The program would be similar to the Reserve Officers Training Corps (R.O.T.C.), adding that students who enroll in the Police Corps would be eligible for up to \$30,000 in federally-guaranteed student loans if they agree to post-graduate service in a state or local police force.

In many of our nation's cities, the police forces are overwhelmed by violent street crime. One of the greatest deterrents to crime is police presence - on the streets and in our neighborhoods.

The Police Corps proposal offers communities what they need most -- a practical, realistic program to put more police officers in uniform and on the streets.

I, along with Senator Arlen Specter, R-Pennsylvania, first succeeded in

passing the Police Corps proposal as part of the Omnibus Crime Bill of 1991. However, the legislation died after the Senate and House failed to pass the final version of the crime bill.

I am renewing my call for the Police Corps program because the need for more police officers has grown even more urgent over the past two years.

Day after day we are confronted with more examples of savage and mindless violence -- random shootings, carjackings, gang battles.

Vicious criminals are terrorizing our communities, they are robbing us of our security and they are preying on our loved ones, especially our children.

Since 1971, while reports of vio-

lent crime have increased by almost 300 percent and spending on prisons has increased by 154 percent, total spending on state and local police has increased only 12 percent.

In addition to providing college students up to \$7,500 for each year of college for a maximum of four years, the federal government would provide a \$10,000 grant to a state or local police force for each Police Corps officer it hires.

This provision is modeled after the National and Community Service Trust Act, under which the federal government will support the service of participants in local service agencies with funds for salaries and child and health care benefits.

## Barney's That Critter We Love to Hate

Barney the Dinosaur loves you.

Presumably, that includes the three young boys in Galveston, Texas, who attacked a Barney look-alike recently and tried to tear his head off. And the Florida advertising agent who created the "I Hate Barney Secret Society." And the countless children who replace Barney's treacly lyrics with their own: "I hate you/ you hate me/ Let's go out and kill Barney..."

That's a whole lotta love.

Barney backlash is everywhere these days, the result of a public television phenomenon grown so popular that it now grosses close to half a billion dollars a year in merchandising, and grosses out a cynical adult audience that can't understand why. Aggressively aimed at 2-and 3-year-olds, *Barney & Friends* has a Nielsen rating of well over 3.0, allowing it to surpass *Sesame Street* as the highest-rated kids show on PBS.

Barney's outgrown malls and he's outgrown most public appearances," said Beth Ryan, a spokeswoman for The Lyons Group of Allen, Texas, that manages the Barney empire. "He doesn't do 'meet-and-greets' anymore. When Barney appeared in Minneapolis state fairgrounds in June, he attracted a total of 60,000 (people) for five shows, and a crowd that large can be scary and hard to control.

"We take great pains to protect Barney and the children who want to see him. We are very selective about where Barney appears."

In fact, Barney's first scheduled appearance October 3 at the re-opening of the Los Angeles library will be his first

following a summer in which The Purple One laid low and his critics picked up steam. Whether it be the sappy theme song, the insipid dialogue, the endless reruns or that hyuk hyuk voice, Barney-bashing was rampant. For instance:

Dozens of newspapers and magazines ran cranky anti-Barney editorials. The *Atlanta Journal-Constitution* printed two cartoons within days of each other - one showing Barney being eaten by a real tyrannosaurus rex, another with him being shot dead by a child - and was flooded with letters from angry parents.

Two Detroit disc jockeys, Jim Johnson and George Baier of WCSX-FM, introduced "Arnie," Barney's illegitimate, low-life half-brother, who cheats kids out of their money and sings about perverts and dysfunctional families.

David Letterman unveiled a "Top 10 Horrifying Secrets of Barney the Dinosaur" list that include this gem: "Offered Fred Flintstone \$1 million for one night with Dino."

T-shirts bearing Barney's likeness framed by the cross-hairs of a gun began popping up in major cities.

A public access TV station in Athens, Ohio, aired *Barney & Friends* with swastikas and statements and such as "Barney is next to Godliness" superimposed on the screen.

Business Week ran a story entitled, "Wouldn't You Love to Knock the Stuffing Out of Barney?"

But nothing tops the efforts of Robert Curran, who began the *I Hate Barney Secret Society* newsletter in January as a joke, and tapped into a vein of adult anger and confusion so great that he was forced to handle all the mail. "We get so many letters, I've lost count," he said by television from his home in Davie, Fla. "But there's been something like 2,000 in the last 10 days alone."

## STUDENTS FREED!

### FROM BOSNIAN PRISION

LINCOLN, Neb.--Two University of Nebraska-Lincoln students working as relief volunteers in Croatia were released this summer after being held in a Bosnian detention center for about 18 days.

Abbas Ali, a senior engineering major, and Suleman Ahmer, a graduate student left the United States in November 1992, to work in the Bosnian relief efforts, said Zahid Nazir, Ali's roommate.

"They are collecting things that are needed in Bosnia," he said. "Sometimes they need medicine, sometimes they need food."

The students, who are natives of Pakistan, were distributing supplies from a relief office in divided Croatia when they were captured. Constant battles in the area made the situation extremely dangerous, Nazir said.

"Anything could have happened with the war going on there," he said. "Their parents were really worried. Bad things have been going through my mind since they were missing. They're back safely now, but I haven't been able to talk to them."

Arshad Syed, information systems manager for the College of Business Administration, went to Croatia in July to help negotiate the students' release, said his wife, Lucretia Syed.

Syed convinced the American Embassy in Croatia to assist in the rescue effort after much persuading, his wife said.

"He was thinking about exchanging himself for his two friends in order for them to do something about it," Lucretia Syed said.

The U.S. was reluctant to get involved in the incident, Lucretia Syed reported, because the two students were from Pakistan and not American citizens. Through Syed's efforts, the two students were safely released.

Ali and Ahmer were working for Al-Nasr International Organization of Lincoln. The organization, certified by the state in January, was founded by Syed to provide humanitarian relief.

The Bosnian effort was the first time the organization had gone into another country, said Lucretia Syed.

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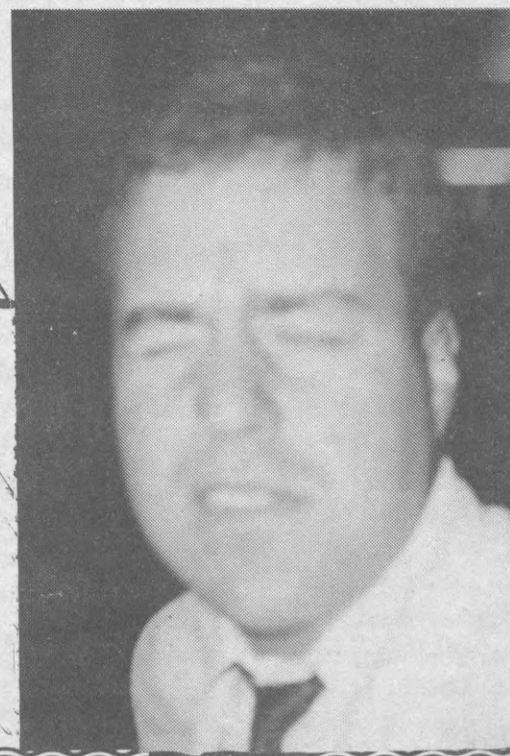

## A CALL TO ARMS

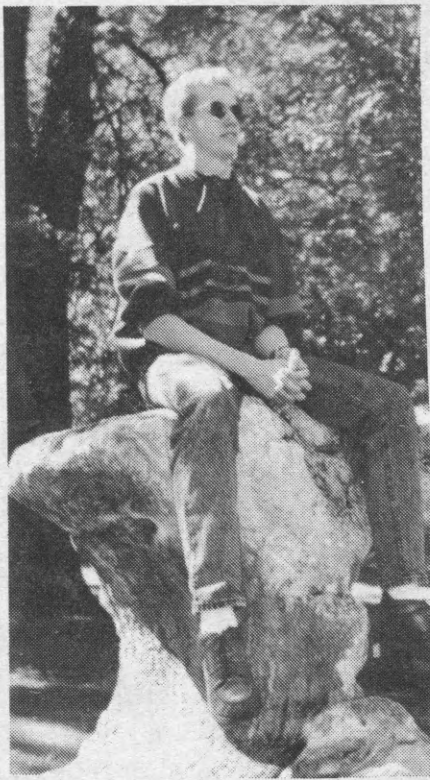
Dear Editor:
