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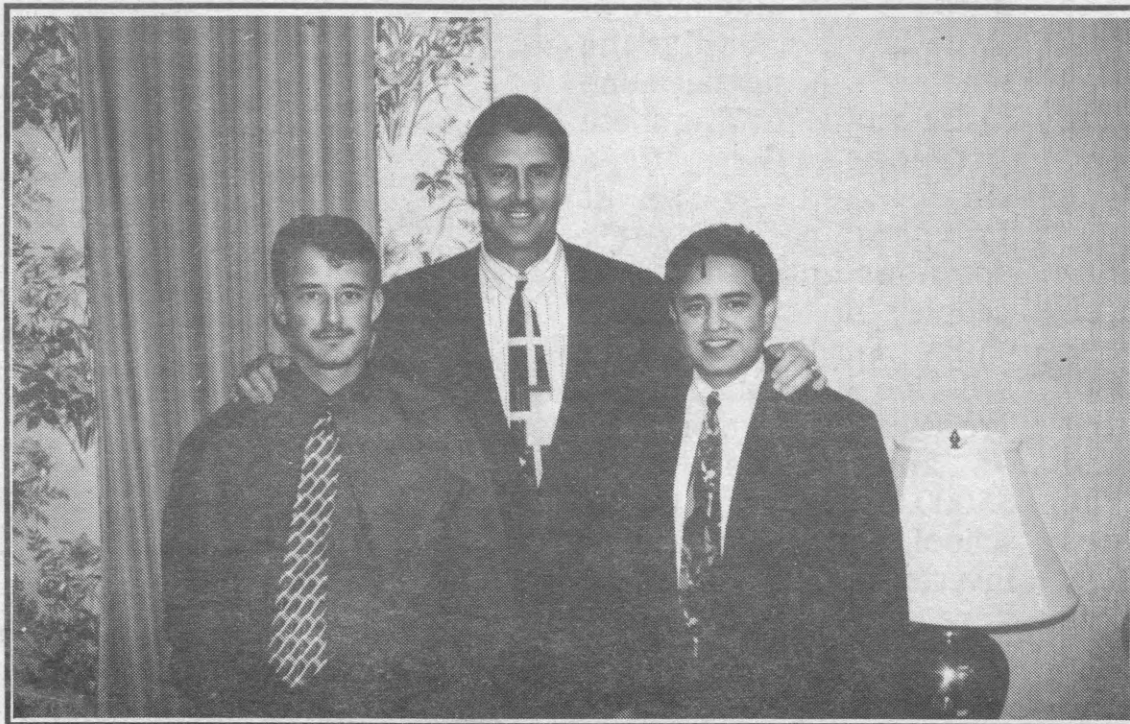
Danny White speaks at Hall of Fame Dinner

For the past few years, Trevecca Nazarene College, in cooperation with other sponsors, has been able to provide the Trevecca community with an outstanding event. This year, in cooperation with the sports medicine center at Baptist Hospital, the Trevecca T-Club sponsored the 1994 Hall of Fame dinner. The special speaker for this event was former Cowboy Danny White.

The Dallas Cowboys, in 1974, drafted Danny White after he set new records for the NCAA. Danny White joined the Cowboys in 1976 as a punter and backup quarterback. White set team records with 3,980 yards and 29 touchdown passes as Dallas went to the playoffs for the ninth year in a row.

Mr. White addressed the Trevecca community with a very motivational message. Danny White expressed that success depends on being in the right place, working hard, and surrounding oneself with good people. After telling witty stories about his teammates and the special times he shared with the Cowboys, he expressed the importance of teamwork. He said, "Life is a team sport in



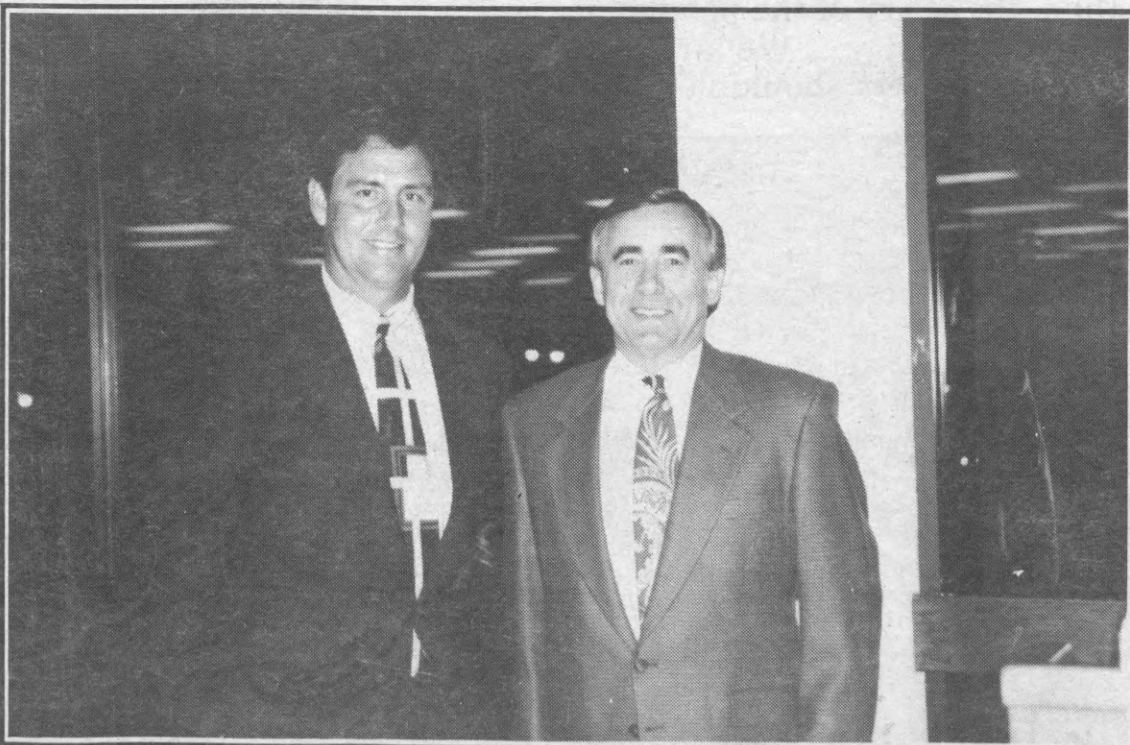

The Africa Experience

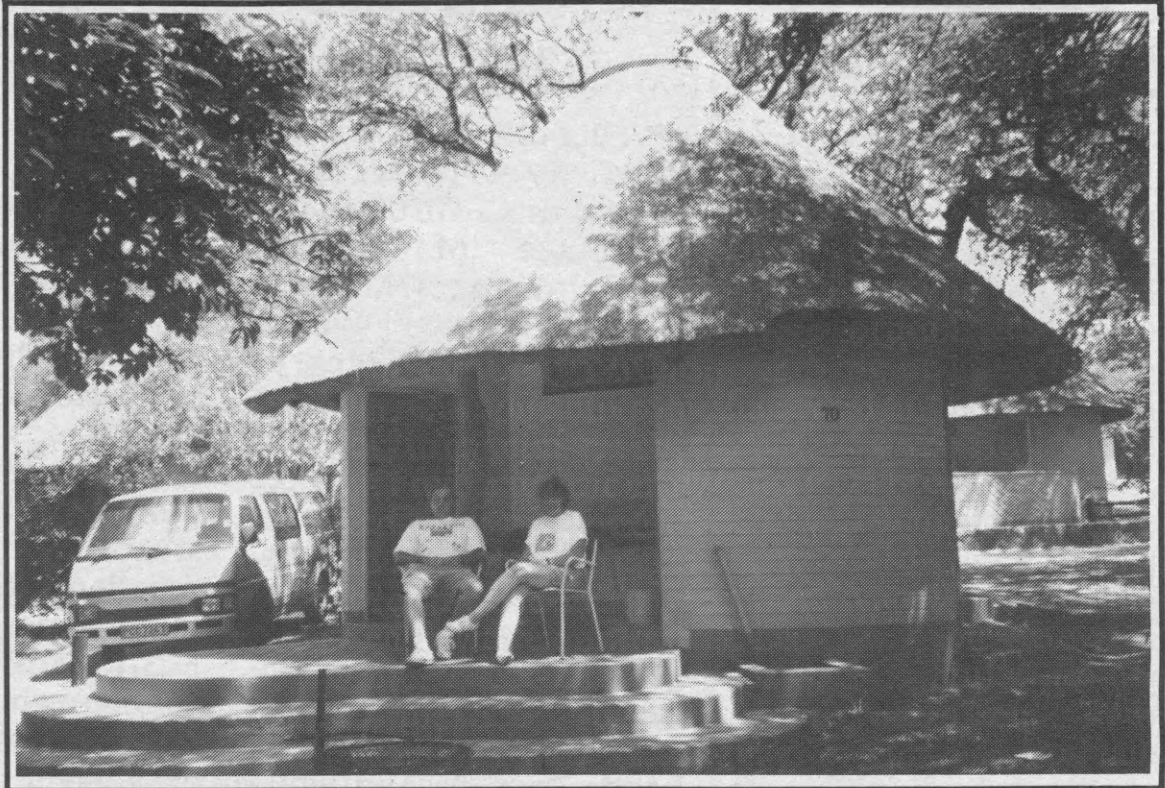
Two of Trevecca's students took time out of the busy spring semester to put into action the concept of serving and ministering to others. Missy and Sean Poloskey traveled to Swaziland, Africa, February 9 through 19 to help build a clinic and hold Vacation Bible School for the town of Manzini and the village of Bulunga.

Sean and Missy belong to Parkview Church of the Nazarene in Ohio, a church whose focus is upon missionary work throughout the year. Missy's father, Chuck Hail, was in charge of this particular trip, and through generous donations by members of the church, was able to have a group of 32 travel to Africa. The group was made up of laypersons in the church, including seven who were doctors, nurses, or pharmacists, thus forming a medical

team to give the Africans the medical attention they needed. Thirty suitcases traveled along with the group, containing medical supplies and toys for the children.

Once in Swaziland, part of the group built a clinic on land donated by the Chief of the village, while the medical team, Missy, and her mother, Brenda Hail, ran the Vacation Bible School and the clinic on alternating days.

A clinic was desperately needed in the Bulunga area, because it is an hour's ride from the village to the nearest hospital, and the bus only stops by twice a week. The pervading influence of the local witch doctors also has a hold over the people, even the Christians. With a clinic in the village, staffed by student nurses from the mission school, the locals will be able to get medical help in

time.

Missy and Sean are very thankful for the experience. Missy commented, "I would love to live there! We feel called to do something in missions, and God keeps opening doors." On the trip itself, she said, "The locals were very thankful, and incredibly friendly! They were also very generous with their time and food."

One of the more dramatic experiences

of the trip was the two-day ceremony the locals held in the group's honor. They were so thankful that they presented the group with a beast (an ox) from the Chief's own herd. They proceeded to kill the beast in front of the group, skin it, and cook it! Although the cultural shock was profound, the group understood the great honor they were bestowed, and were appreciative.

Many who return from missions trips claim to have been ministered to as much as they ministered, and Missy and Sean are no exception. The friendships established over cultural and linguistic barriers served to enrich the lives of everyone involved. Although returning with 30 empty suitcases, Missy and Sean perhaps came back with more than when they left.

- *To serve as a liaison to the Minority Affairs and Affirmative Action Faculty Committee on matters that arise related to campus ethnic issues and concerns.
- *To assist in formulating recruitment strategies targeting ethnically and culturally diverse populations on the southeast educational zone of the Church of the Nazarene.

Student Service Plan

In a White House ceremony [in March], President Clinton signed into law his hard-fought National and Community Service Trust Act of 1993 which allows students to pay back educational loans by spending a year of their lives tackling such pressing problems as health care, education, public safety and the environment.

The establishment of a national service plan, often described as a domestic Peace Corps, was a repeated promise in Clinton's campaign speeches and became one of his most consistent causes for applause while stumping on the campaign trail.

Clinton has referred to the service plan as "a defining initiative" of his administration, and he has worked particularly hard to guide the bill through Congress this summer.

A sense of celebration pervaded on the South Lawn of the White House during the signing ceremonies. Inside

Trevecca has joined efforts with local businesses and property owners to form the Murfreesboro Road Neighborhood Association. Original efforts focused on eliminating crime in the area. The Association has also been working with the Metro

Beautification and Environment Commission to establish a Clean-Up Day and coordinate beautification efforts. Saturday, April 23, from 8:00 a.m. until noon, has been set as the Clean-Up Day. Headquarters for the event will be the lot beside Channel 2 at the corner of

Murfreesboro Road and Parris Avenue, and a Continental breakfast will be available at 8:00 a.m. The Beautification Commission will provide gloves, hats, trash bags, and a free T-shirt to all who participate. Channel 2 is also anticipating

providing television coverage for the event. Trevecca is responsible for cleaning the following areas: Factory Street, Lester Avenue, and Murfreesboro Road from Lester Avenue to Waller Buick. Any and all interested organizations, clubs, and students are invited to participate—the Basketball team has already committed to the effort. It will be a great time to join efforts with local businesses and property owners to improve the neighborhood. 
violations to create?) The squalid dorms and the bursting parking lots are screaming for the attention of campus improvement. Why are the cries put off?

VIDERE QUAM ESSE, that's what.



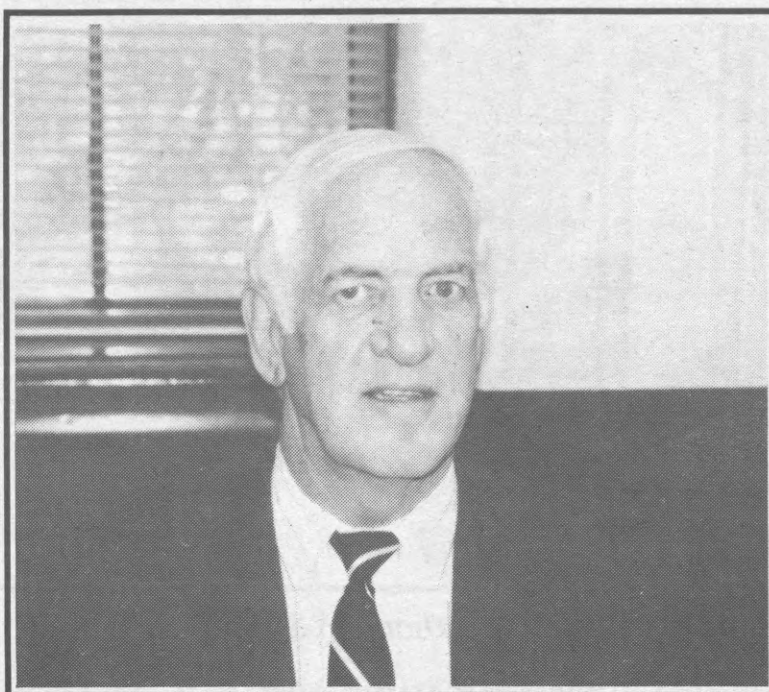

Ray Richards is a man that carries one title and wears many hats. 1991. He believes that the last three years have been great financially for Trevecca, and equally as great in his own journey.

At the conclusion of this semester, Ray Richards will once again bid farewell to Trevecca. Upon retirement he plans to move back to Oklahoma. He expressed mixed emotions about retiring, but added that he will continue to work part time at Southern Nazarene University. Retirement, he said with a smile, will give him an opportunity to spend time with his grandchildren, and on the golf course.

Today, Trevecca's financial base is excellent and "The years ahead can be exciting years." If one analyzed Trevecca's financial statement today he or she would see that Trevecca has moved into a strong financial position, in large part due to what has been done in the last three years. (Ray Richards doesn't give himself enough of the credit he deserves for this.)

Mr. Richards suggested that future TNCers analyze the cost of state schools compared to the cost of Trevecca. Many people do not realize that state school tuition is usually cheaper, but room and board along with other necessities are usually more expensive than here at Trevecca.

Mr. Richards really appreciates the student body here. "The students have been warm and friendly. I have always been pleased with the spirit, morale, and spirituality that goes on here at Trevecca." Mr. Richards will be watching with great interest as Trevecca develops because Trevecca's best years are yet to come.

The Concert Choir is a large men and women's choir directed by Dr. Brian Killian. Dr. Killian is an

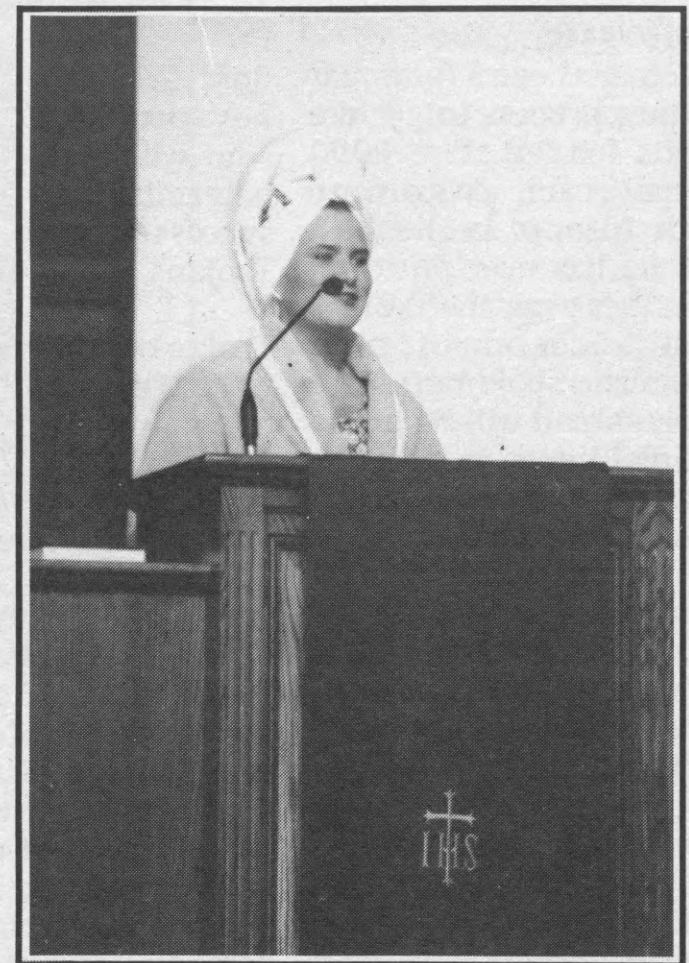
Associate Professor with a Doctorate from Combs College of Music. He plays the organ in chapel when he is not busy teaching piano or directing the Concert Choir.

Vanderbilt Marching Band. "The hope of the band program at TNC," says Dr. Farnsley, "is to provide a transition from the high school band experience to an adult approach to music, which would contribute to the musical life of the church and community."

With a Doctorate of Musical Arts from the Southern Baptist Seminary, Dr. Timothy Cierpke is Professor of Music. The Choral Union is a men's and women's choir that is active in the spring semester under his direction. Dr. Cierpke is also director of the Madrigalians, a small vocal group that has

two major performances per year: the Chamber Concert in the fall, and a Medieval dinner in the spring. The Trevecca College and Community Orchestra is another group that Dr. Cierpke directs. An accomplished vocalist and cellist, Dr. Cierpke also teaches private voice and strings lessons.

The Ambassadors is a men's choir directed by Professor Fred Mund, and has had the privilege to go on four international tours in eleven countries. This choir is known for its spiritual numbers, but also performs sacred classics as well as hymn music.

Men's chorus music from Wales, which was picked up on one of their tours, is also featured by the Ambassadors.

Professor Mund is also chairperson of the Music Department. He has degrees from Olivet Nazarene College and Butler University, and has completed residency and course requirements at Peabody College in Nashville.

The Music Department has big plans for the future, according to Professor

Mund. One goal is to have one hundred majors in the Department. Another goal under consideration is the add to the Masters Program degrees in commercial/gospel music, music therapy, and sacred music. If a Masters Degree for sacred music would be added, Trevecca would be the only school in the area as well as the only Nazarene school to offer it. One of the Department's biggest and most ambitious goals is a new music building. The new building would include

larger classrooms and practice rooms as well as a larger performance hall. This performance hall would also double as chapel. A larger studio would be a part of the new building, adding video recording and production facilities in time. A feasibility study for this future building and

equipment needs has already been done and although not quite confirmed, the new music building is a possibility in the future.

With a rich and varied tradition and eyes on the future, Trevecca's Music Department is ready to expand. Professor Mund feels that, "With good use of our

facilities, our perfect location (Music City), a dedicated staff, and the quality of our students, we will set the pace for other Nazarene colleges."

The Music Department will set standards for the future and, as always, provide a thoughtful and exciting program of music for years to come.

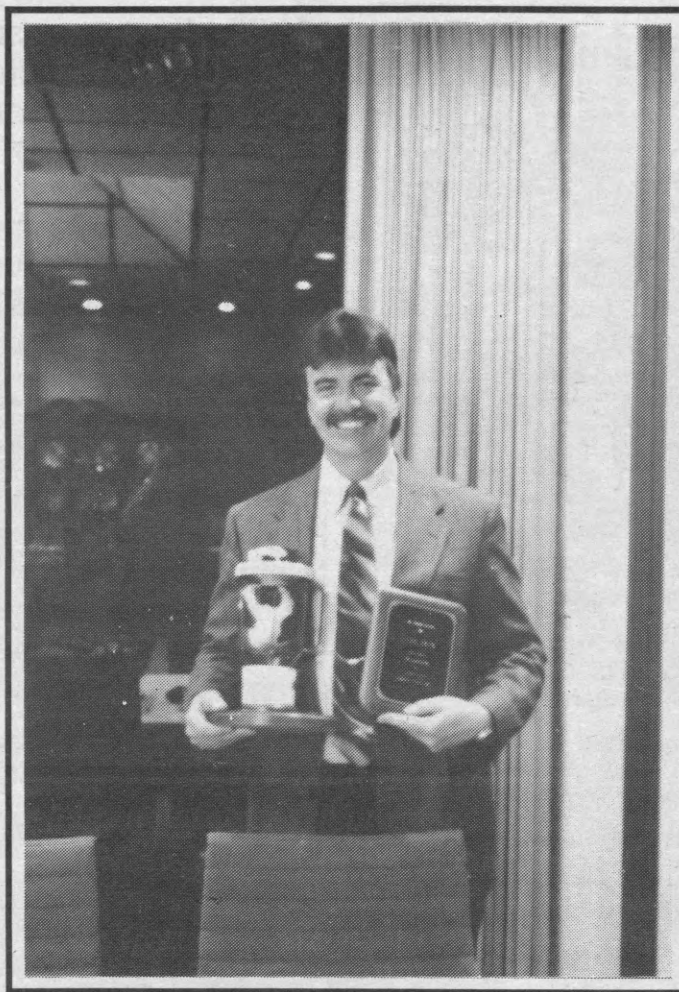
Honors Banquet: A Tribute to Craig Keen

President Reed: An Interview with the Pastor

"As I emerged from college, I assumed that I was pretty well prepared for the pastorate. I had led the Student Prayer Band at my college, debated successfully against the Harvard debate team, and been named as the outstanding graduating student."

"With ego firmly in place, I accepted the pastorate of a small congregation in a county seat town in Northwest Missouri,

population around fifteen hundred, assuming that they would be duly impressed with me."

Dr. Reed goes on to say, "Within a year's time I came to understand that the ten to fifteen people who gathered in the converted store-front building each week were not impressed with my abilities; nor was the extended community."

Indeed, narcissism is the inherent companion of youth. Fortunately, with the ancient of days comes wisdom and understanding. Intellectual awareness, keen insight, and sound judgment are the by-products of experience.

Following thirty-five years of ministry, Dr. Reed

has discovered another by-product of experience. Opportunity. However, opportunity has not evaded Dr. Reed in the past. Three decades of concentrated ministerial activity have yielded frequent highlights.

Dr. Reed has rendered his services as a professor at Trevecca, Olivet, and NTS. His career has not been restricted to the fields of education and homiletics, but maintains extensions into film-making and occasional penmanship. Dr. Reed has contributed to the home ministerial training program through his creation of a Pastoral training video for Nazarene Headquarters.

Furthermore, he has written books on stewardship, church growth, practices, worship for Advent, and soul winning.

As the Nazarene Book Committee seeks to offer a text in Pastoral Theology, it is their desire to obtain an author from within the denomination. In seeking to bestow such an opportunity upon someone, their essential qualification has been summed up in one word. Experience.

Upon review of qualified candidates, President Reed's experience has emerged as adequate to meet the task at hand. In coordination with his efforts to respond to their request, Dr. Reed is once again entering the teaching

field. At the outset of fall semester, 1994, one will be able to locate Dr. Reed in front of the Pastoral Ministry chalkboard, drawing from his experience, and sharing his opportunity.

As Dr. Reed commences to write a Pastoral Theology text, he will not be relying on erudition alone. In a word, he will be appealing to the two-fold source of prior scholarship and self-evaluated experience — experience only acquired in county seat towns with limited opportunities. The experience of yesterdays accede opportunity for today, the dividends of which we are seldom able to see until tomorrow.
