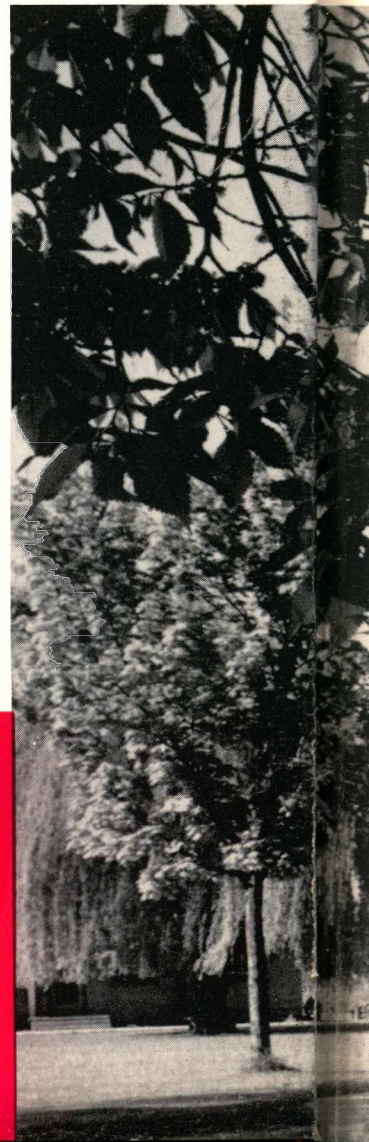

Northwest Nazarene College began in 1913 with the organization of an elementary school devoted to Christian training for the children of the local Church of the Nazarene. Within two years the school had added both high school and college work to its curriculum. The first degrees were conferred upon a class of four graduates by President H. Orton Wiley in 1917.

The college has shown steady growth and development down through the years. In 1928 the first class was graduated from the state accredited Normal department. In 1931 the College of Liberal Arts was accredited as a junior college and as such was accepted as a member of the Northwest Association of Secondary and Higher Schools. In the spring of 1937 the college received accreditation as a four-year college by the Northwest Association. In 1938 the college was elected to membership in the Association of American Colleges. In 1950 N.N.C. became a member of the National Commission on Accrediting.

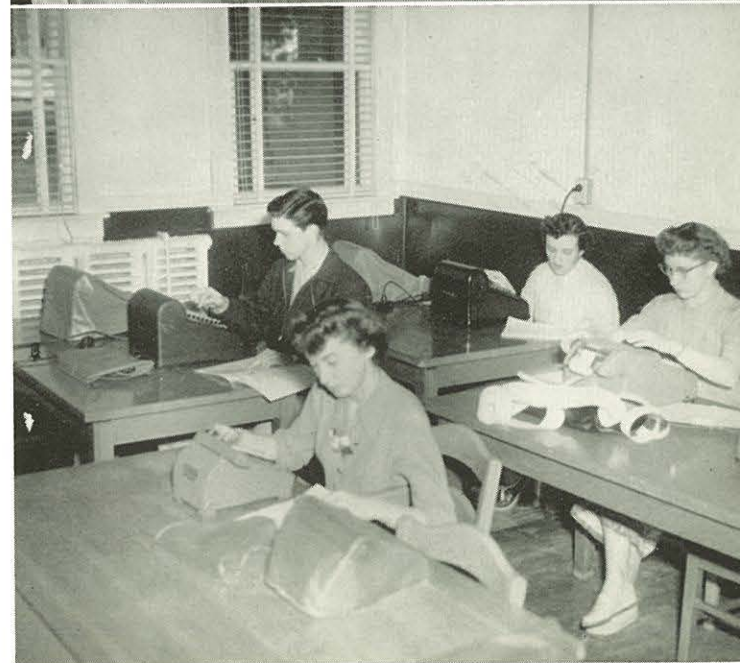
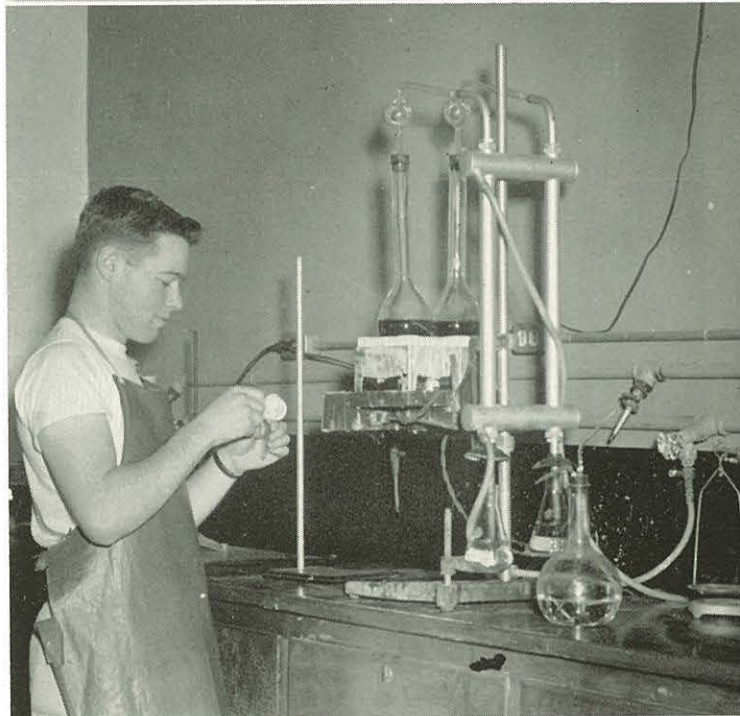
At present Dr. John Riley is a member of the higher commission of the Northwest Association of Secondary and Higher Schools. Dean Thelma B. Culver is state chairman of the Teacher Education and Professional Standards Committee for Idaho.

On the scholastic side, Northwest Nazarene College offers godly professors and dedicated upper-classmen who help freshmen to see that while all are not called to be preachers and missionaries, every person must serve Christ in a vocation or a profession. To find our task is then the problem.

Freshmen tests which point up interests and abilities; conferences with Professor Tillotson and his staff of advisors; chapel talks by representatives from various walks of life; the psychology class planning papers—all these help us to find the place which is each one's to fill. Moments of prayer in the dormitory chapels or in church also shed light upon our decisions.

Having decided on a vocation, students turn to the departments of instruction where are found seventeen subject majors and three divisional majors to meet the needs of everyone. 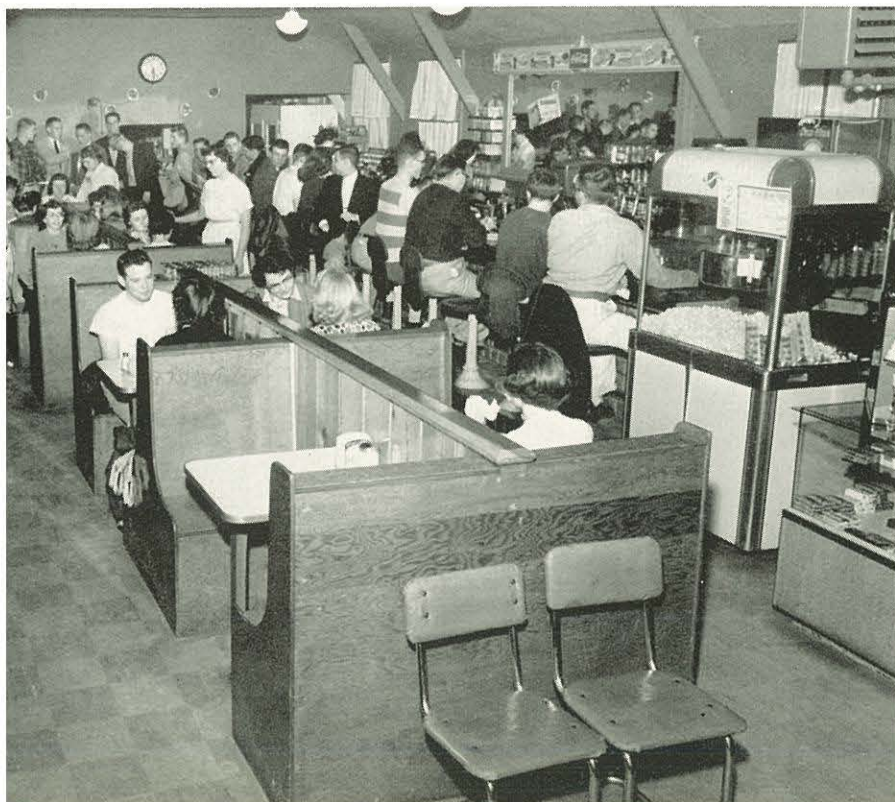

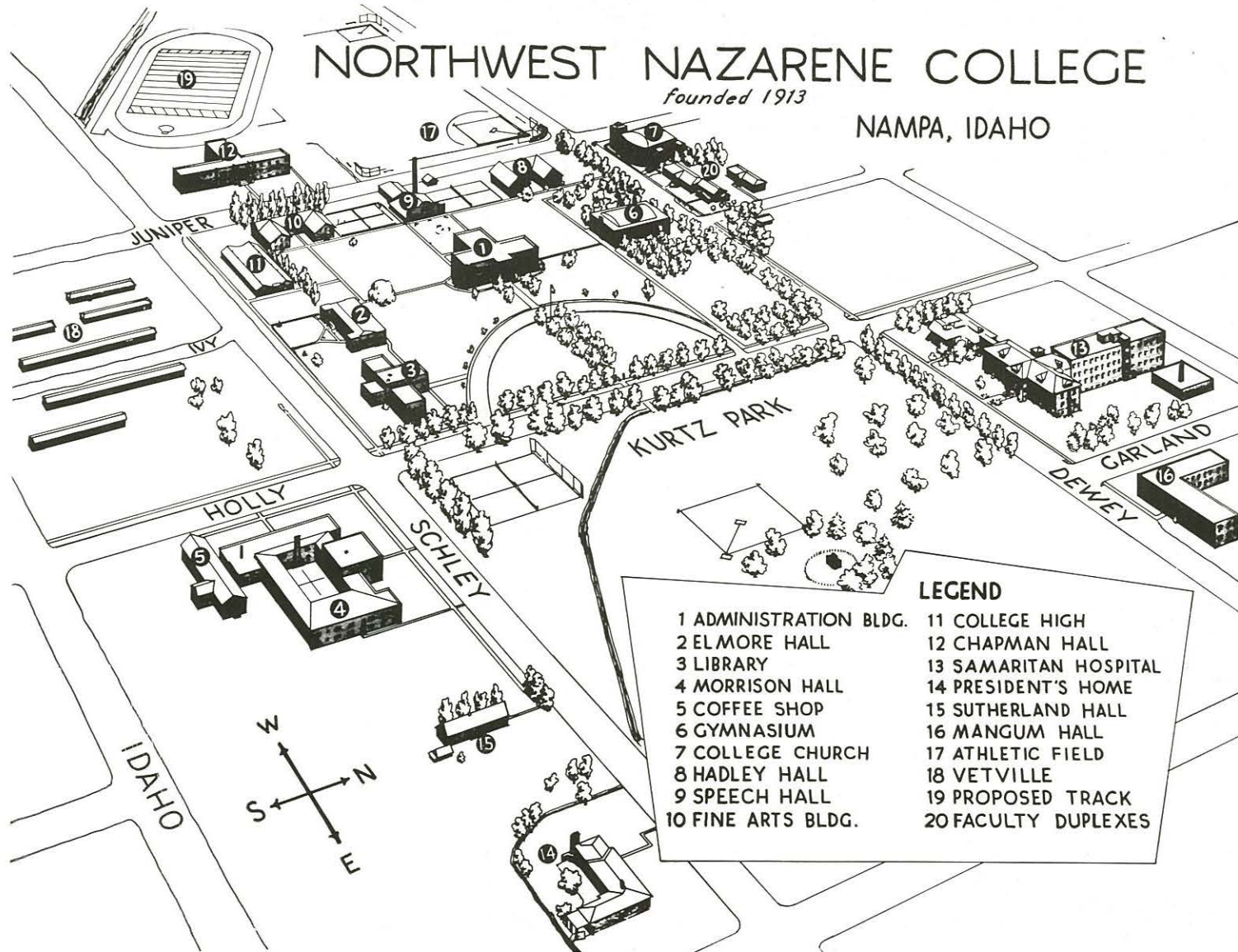

He must have the great dynamic of love and be dedicated to a love of truth and its diligent search,

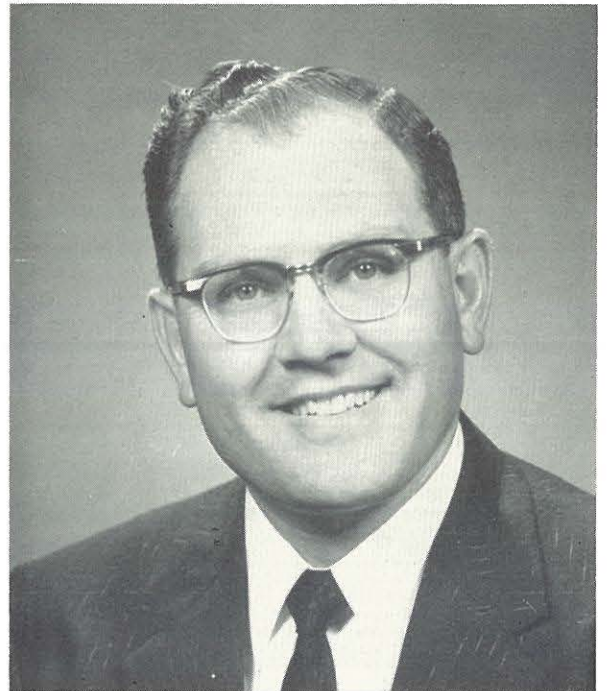
Dr. John E. Riley has been that man. He is ably supported by Mrs. Riley, the gracious and active first lady at "Number One Faculty Row."

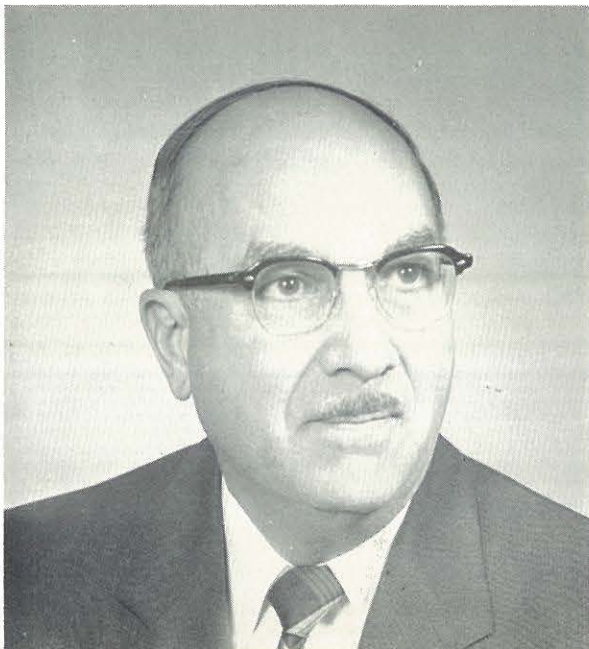

Personal interest is a powerful tool in their hands as they strive for this goal. An encouraging word, a smile, and a prayer exert an immeasurable influence.

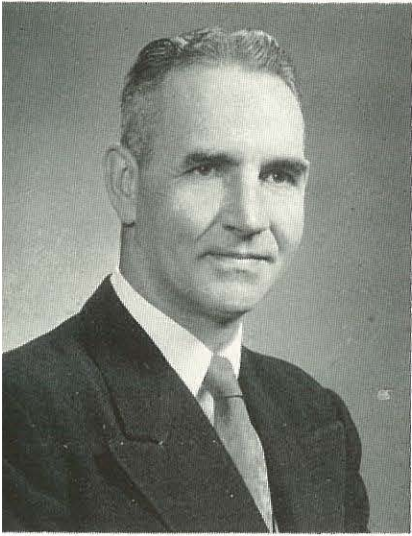

Student Council

An important part of every school is its student government. Here at N.N.C., the student council is the legislative organization. Student morale was kept on a high level, as Vice-President Joe Michel presented good healthy entertainment on weekends, and arranged chapel programs on Wednesday, that contributed to everyone's cultural life.

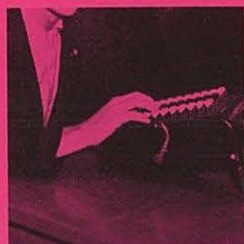

Vacations come and vacations go, but there will never be one in which Dean Thelma Culver will ever learn more than her trip to Europe last summer.

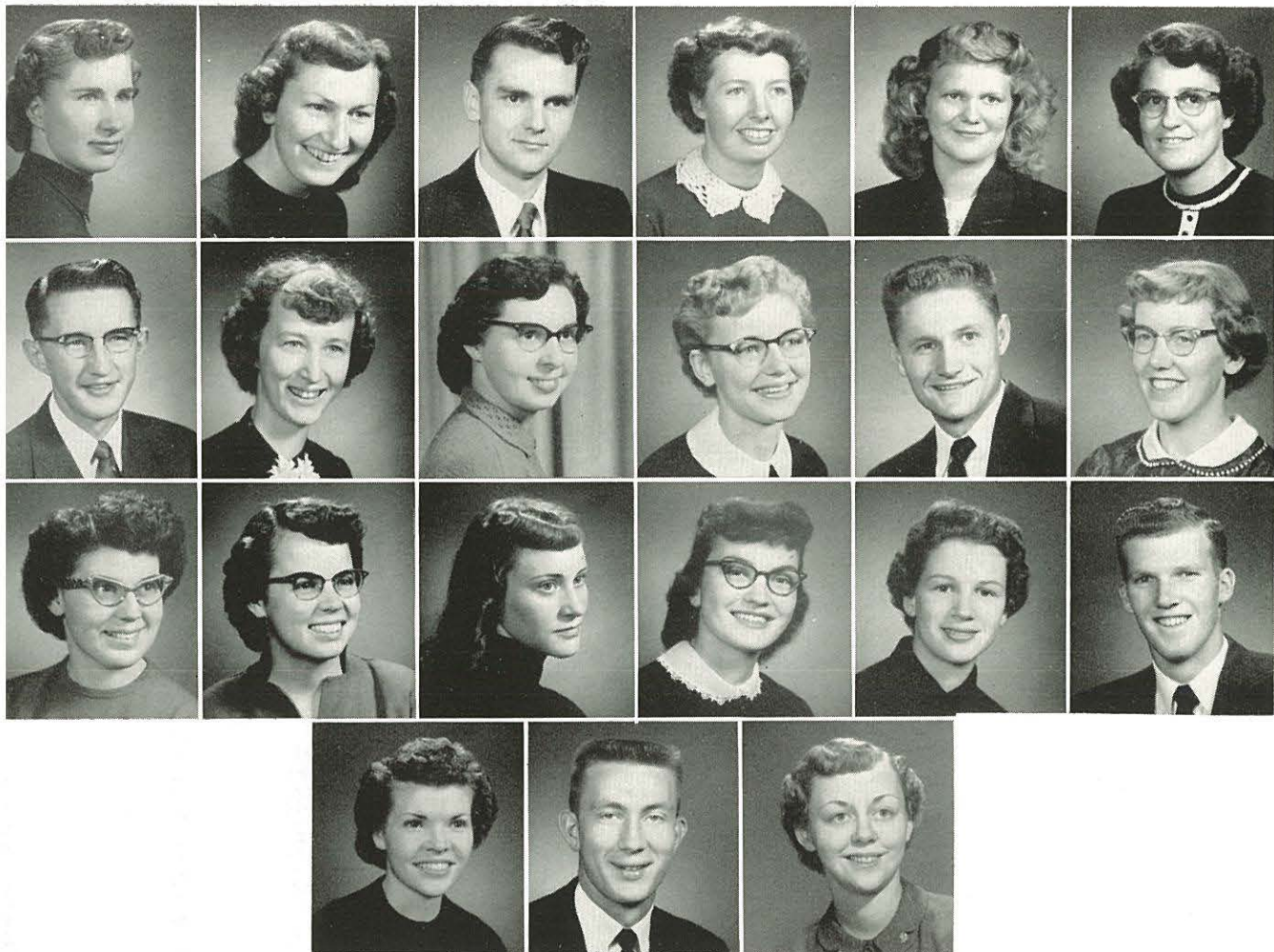
The trip began in De Kalb, Illinois, where Dean Culver attended a meeting of educators from the 48 states. Dr. Culver is Idaho state chairman of the teacher education and standards committee.

From De Kalb, Dr. Culver went to Montreal, Canada where she joined educators from all sections of the United States on a study trip to Europe sponsored by New York University. The group sailed from Wolfe's Cove, Quebec to Southampton, England on June 30. From Southampton they went to London where they studied at the University of London.

In London the American educators were joined by fifty educators from the continent for a discussion of education on the international scene. Sessions were held at Westminster Abbey with two members of the parliament representing labor and conservative groups as discussion leaders.

From London the party went to the continent where studies were made in Belgium, Switzerland, Germany, and France. Dr. Culver reports that the high light of the tour for her was the group's visit to SHAPE and NATO.

"It was the perfect trip for me," says Dr. Culver in commenting about her summer.

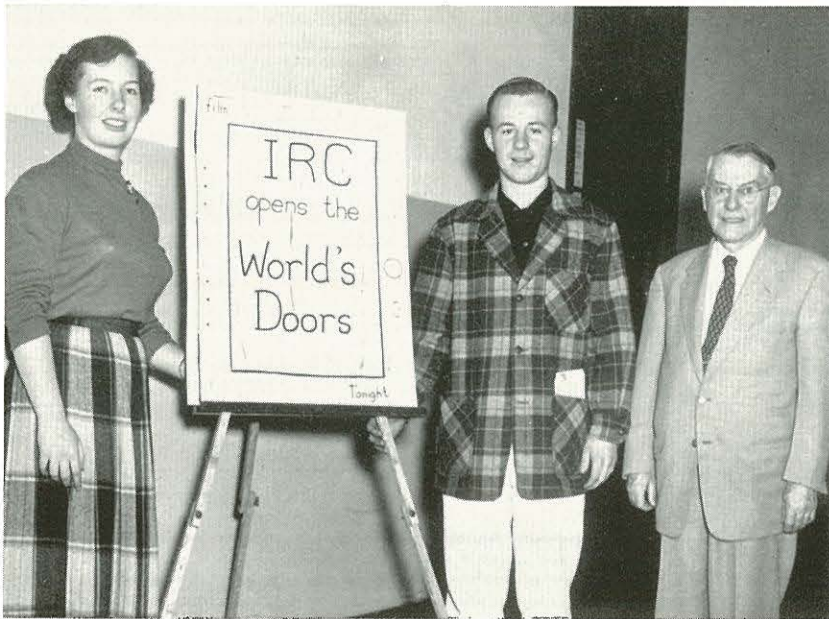

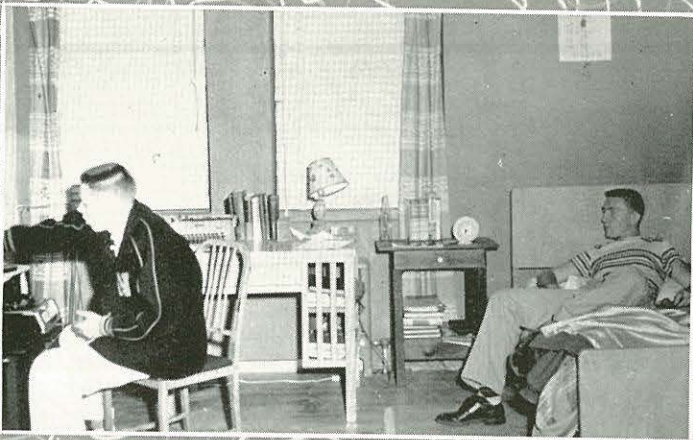

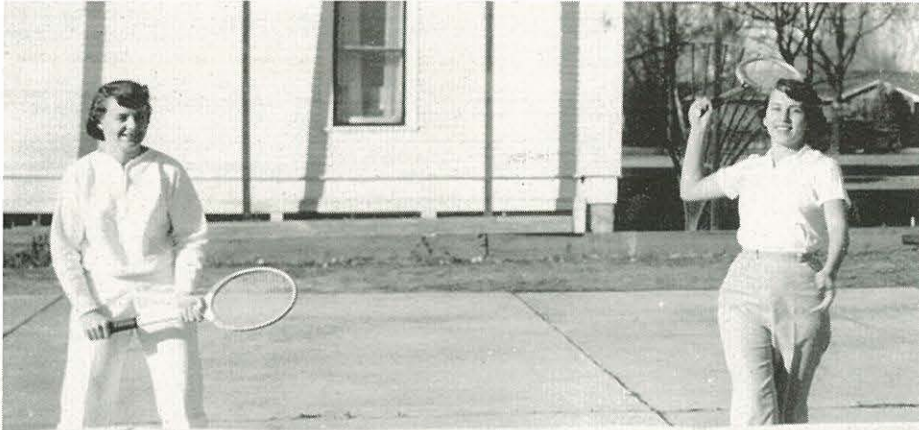

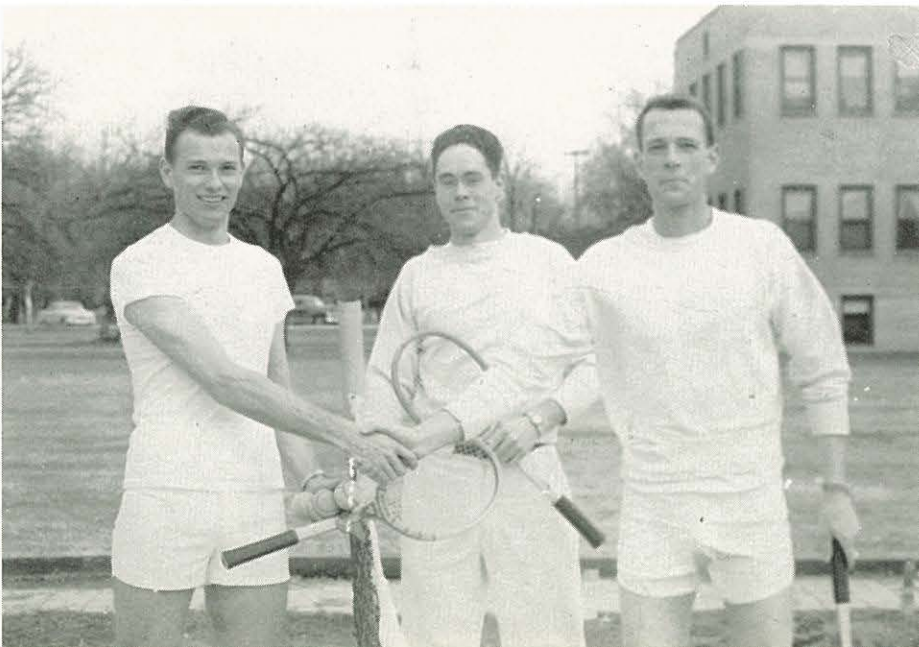


Betty Richardson and Lois Morgan prepare for spring matches at the N.N.C. courts.



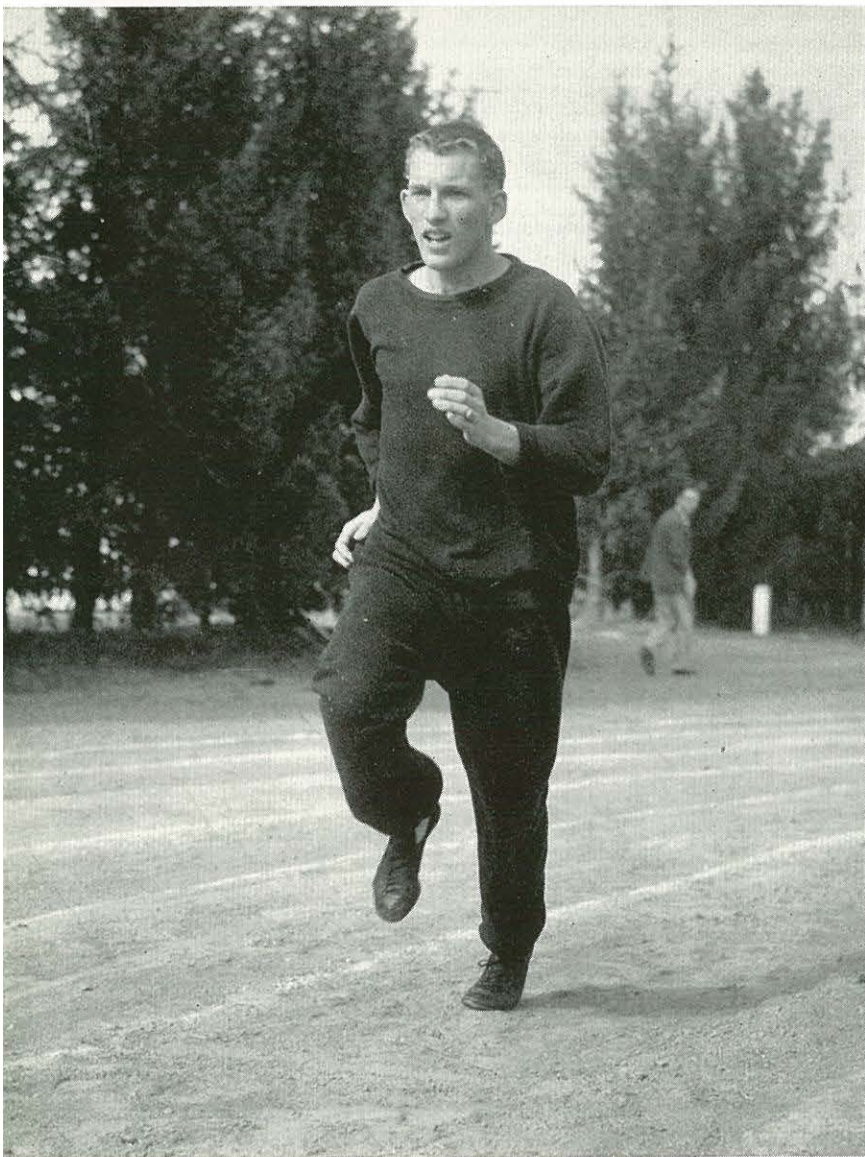

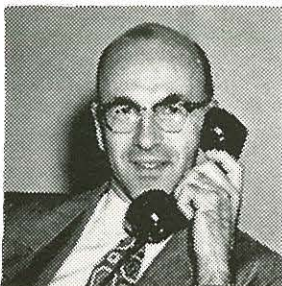
College Church
