

EDITORIAL

ONE DANGER TO AVOID

THERE is one danger we hope will be avoided in the work for Herald of Holiness. We have long observed that the church members too often relegate this matter of soliciting subscribers for the church paper to the paster. Often the pastor lets it get crowded out of his mind and time and this most important interest lags and suffers. The truth is, there is work enough to employ both the pastor and the members. The paper must not only be gotten into every home in your church-by no means should the work stop here. The paper is not only food for the edification of the saints, it is intended and made with the distinct purpose of being an advocate and a propagandist of holiness. It is intended to remove prejudice, to inform on the real import of holiness as a second work, to show the need of it in the home and in the business and the individual life. It will often exert an influence greater than even spoken discourse by the absence of the influences of a public assembly and of individuals who had heard or known of opposition maintained against the doctrine previously. Alone in his room the reader, uninfluenced and uninterfered with by any adverse presence, is impelled to yield assent to the transcendent evidence on which this glorious truth rests.

THE TRUTH is the church paper has never been tried out in this way sufficiently for our people to understand the tremendous power it will exert in this respect as a silent, noiseless, evangelist of holiness. Let our church members take this matter on their hearts and seek to push the Herald of Holiness among their neighbors and friends who are not of our church. If we would be as industrious and active to do this as Mormons are to spread corrupt literature in the homes of our people for their ruin we would soon be shouting over a new revival of holiness all over our country. Will you begin at once? Do not delay, but begin a systematic campaign in your neighborhood, resolved not to know discouragement or satisfaction until your church paper is scaffered broadcast throughout your community. May God help you.

T HAS from the beginning been a clearly demonstrated fact that the press has a most vital and essential relation to the church in all departments of her activity. The publication of suitable literature for the children of the church and of strong periodicals representative of the doctrines for which the church stands and the institutions by which the church expresses her benevolent and eleemosynary impulse is an absolute necessity.

EVERY church recognizes this fact and at great expense provides such agencies for the propagation of the work to which God calls them. The Publishing Interests are a right arm of power to every pastor and evangelist. The church periodicals are an indispensable aid to every father and mother who would most wisely and surely train up their children in the faith of their fathers. How any father or mother can get their consent to do without these adjuncts of power and holy influence in the home we can not conceive. How any

pastor can be indifferent or lethargic regarding the church paper and the Sunday school periodicals in his church work and in his efforts to reach homes outside his own immediate parish is an equal mystery to the writer. How an evangelist can fail to push conscientiously and energetically the church periodicals is inconceivable. These papers will add to the solidarity and permanency of his work. Reading a live spiritual church paper will immensely increase the probability of his converts gravitating into the Pentecostal Church of the Nazarene, which would be so helpful in assisting them to stand true and to grow.

GOD HAS most marvelously led and blessed in the creation of a suitable literature for our charch. All now needed is for our people to get these interests on their hearts and to push them with vigor and enthus asm. Brethren and sisters, will you not head our leving admonition and take these interests on your hearts and pray and work for the extension of the circulation of these periodicals, and of the excellent books which our Publishing House furnishes?

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A WORD FROM THE HEART

Simple love and loyalty for the church into which God has so sweetly and manifestly led us constrains us to speak with all the intensity and earnestness of an aroused heart to the preachers and members of our church. To those more intimately related to the projection of our denominational publishing interests the hand of our God has been so signally manifest as to appear nothing short of a miracle. By so much as our God has thus manifested His hand and His leading, He has imposed an obligation, personal and positive, upon every pastor and evangelist and individual member of our church to invest personal effort, time and money in the support and spread of these church periodicals and of the splendid books of our House, that they may achieve the largest influence of which they are capable.

MAT we fear is that tardiness of some of the classes we have mentioned may displease the Father. Remember that God does for us in these matters only what we can not do for ourselves. Push the paper into every home in your charge or neighborhood and then get it into every home you possibly can outside of your church as a splendid means of getting them in reach of holiness influence and preaching.

A MOST POTENT ALLY

TO PASTOR who has been a few years in the work has failed to feel often the need of efficient help in visiting the people and testifying and reinforcing the great truths he seeks from Sunday to Sunday to impress from the pulpit. How often the pastor has felt or said, "I wish I were a dozen men instead of one; what an immense difference there would be in the results of my work." Now, in the economy of God this is just what He intends we shall be and this is just what He has provided that each pastor shall be. He wants each of us to be a dozen or a score of men in our teaching instead of one. Has not modern invention and discovery arranged it in the industrial and mechanical world so that a man is multiplied many fold in the possibility of his product? Do you suppose God would leave us a thousand years behind the children of this world in our appliances for doing His work?

It is appalling the tardiness with which our people are brought to see this wonderful truth of the divine provision for the reduplication of the preacher in his work. By a wide and extensive circulation of a great church paper in his charge and also among the natural constituency of his charge any pastor can multiply his influence among the people many fold and wonderfully increase the results of his preaching. It is understood of course that we mean always a paper which stands for the truths for which the pastor stands and which ably and conscientiously abvocates the great principles of a salyation from all sin.

WILL OUR pastors co-operate with providence in this matter? Will they be co-workers with God who has so graciously provided us a paper which He designs shall be just such a means for the marvelous reduplication of the pastor's time and labor and fruitfulness in his great work? Brethren, faithful pastors of our church, rest assured that Herald of Holiness seeks to be every day and in every issue this kind of an ally and helper in your work!!

☆ ☆ ☆ ☆ ☆ REMOVE THE REPROACH

NE MAN on a modern Linotype machine can set as many type in a day as about six men could set by hand in the old way, and on the machine a much better character of work is done. One man's labor in threshing by a modern threshing machine means as much as perhaps eight or ten men's labor meant on the old plan of treading out the grain with oxen. One man's labor in planting wheat with a modern drill means as much as the work of perhaps six or eight men in the old way of sowing by hand and it means a better yield of grain as well. The same is true throughtout the agricultural and mechanical world. It simply means that in modern times by the means of improvements in machinery each man is multiplied from one to a dozen or twenty men as to yield from his time and labor. This greatly increases the total product from the time and labor of men by multiplying the productive capacity of the individual man.

NOW THIS is just the need of the church. We need that the time and gifts of the individual pastor and church be so supplemented or multiplied as to practically

make one individual's labor and time mean that of a dezen or more men in the work of the Kingdom of our God. Why not, we ask? Shall it be and continue true in this as in so many phases of the Lord's work that "the children of this world are wiser in their generation than the children of light"? God has put within our reach the very and the only means by which a wise and up-to-date pastor can thus multiply himself many times and really make his time and preaching and visiting mean that of a dozen or perhaps a score of men. The Herald of Holiness is that agency waiting the wise preacher's use. The paper preaches the same glorious truth-by line upon line insists upon the same full salvation from all sin both actual and inbred-proclaims the same necessity and means for growth in grace, and in every way seeks to arouse conviction of the necessity for this blessed work and to remove misconceptions from the minds of people respecting this vital truth. What an advocate of holy power and blessed influence to have silently walking, talking, preaching, and exhorting among a paster's people and these in the reach of his church! How the paper reinforces and emphasizes the teaching and preaching done from the pulpit by the preacher.

ET ALL our pastors awake to the marvelous possibilities of this wonderful arm of power God has put within their reach and determine to place the HERALD OF Hollness not simply in every home in their charge, but in every one's hands who habitually or occasionally attends upon their ministry. It would pay any church to raise a sum of money annually with which to place the paper in the hands of such people as can not be induced to subscribe for it. You say, O, this is a new departure you are advocating. Other church papers are not doing this." No: other church papers are gravely considering going out of business. We are a peculiar people; have a peculiar paper: are to do a peculiar work no other churches are doing; and we are to use means and do things which other churches are not doing. God wants us to keep step with His providential marching He is doing for us. He has given us a paper capable of being the means of such a multiplication of the preacher and we must accept and discharge the great responsibility by so spreading the paper that it can do what God wants it to do. Thus can we remove this reproach from us, and the children of this world be no longer wiser in their generation than the children of the Pentecostal Church of the Nazarene in the matter of their church paper. ***

Individual responsibility is the most important and one of the most neglected truths in the whole realm of morals. Its neglect has allowed to lag and suffer the most benign and needed institutions given by a kind providence to the cause of God in this world. Pastor, church member, take to heart this danger in the matter of circulating Herald of Holiness. You, individually, personally, God expects to do a positive, specific work in this matter. Are you at it? If not, will you begin at once?

God wants to reach the eye as well as the ear of the lost. He reaches the second by the preached Word. He reaches the first by the printed word. Will you be the bearer of the printed word to His lost ones? You often wish you could preach. This is one way all can preach.

An Indispensable Arm of Power

The circulation of good, streng books is one of the highest duties of a church. It is likewise an indispensable arm or power. Neal Dow, who was the original and most conspicuous factor in carrying the state of Maine for prohibition, was once asked how he accomplished such a wonderful result. He replied: "By sowing down the state with prohibition literature." No great reform was ever accomplished in any other way. No great church ever gained a footing or succeeded in propagating the truths for which it stood without the aid of strong books scattered broadcast among the people it had reached and whom it sought to reach.

Books are helpful alike in indoctrinating those reached and those it is sought to reach with the saving truths taught by the church. There is no greater aid to the direct preaching of the Word than the silent influence of the printed page read in the quiet of the home or study. removed from the distractions of other presences and other interests.

To see a potent illustration of the great power of books we have but to look at the ravages of worthless and vicions beeks. Many of the crimes which shock the public and outrage the moral sense of the community, are confessed to be the direct and exclusive result of reading the cheap and vicious books which are found on all our railroad trains and on most of the book shelves in our book stores. The youth are very largely educated in crime by this means. The solitude of the reader in his reading is the cardinal source of the tremendous influence of the printed page. Through the eye to the mind and thence to the heart, the seat of moral impressions and purposes. the thoughts are conveyed and the life is found to yield readily and the fruit comes from the reading. Necessity requires comparative solitude in reading as the presence of others is a disturbance unless they are of equal mind and interest in the book.

The great denominations have all recognized the necessity of book publication and distribution. Hence you see they have great publishing houses and constantly put forth books for their people. No great religious leader was wiser on this point than Mr. Wesley. He was an indefatigable writer and distributer of books. The product of his pen was prodigious, and for the spread of his great work he was very largely indebted to the use of books and tracts which he and his co-laborers so industriously circulated.

This is a subject the Pentecostal Church of the Nazarene must take seriously to heart and on which they must act with great promptness and vigor. Our preachers and evangelists must make it a point of conscience to seek to circulate far and wide holiness books and pamphlets and tracts. They will be appalled at the destitution they will find prevailing in the matter of such literature if they have not already made the discovery. Another point of very great importance is that our own church must furnish such books for our own people. This is not narrowness, but sense. We have now a Publishing House which proposes to furnish literature of this class for our people and our preachers and evangelists should make it a matter of principle and of conscience to procure of our own House all the books they can use or sell among our

The House keeps a large assortment of splendid books on hand and will constantly increase the variety. Even books you need which our own House may not publish can be procured for you by the House. Of one thing all may rest assured, there will never be found cause of complaint that we make or sell books of a character which a church should not sell or handle. Great care will always be observed not to make or sell or recommend a book which is in the least degree questionable. This is a point of great importance. Church Publishing Houses have not always been careful on this point.

The church is to be congratulated upon the completeness and modernness of the great plant we have in Kansas City. It is a marvel of beauty and fullness and up-todateness. God has marvelously led and blessed in the provision of such adequate and excellent facilities for doing the very highest character of work in all lines of church literature both in books and periodicals, and in the most expeditious manner. All that is now neededand this need is absolutely imperative and vital-is the intelligent, active, diligent and loyal support and cooperation of our people. The House is powerless without this. It might be augmented to double its present capacity and cost but without the support and co-operation on which we insist it had as well be dumped into the river or sold out for what it would bring. We may add that were we as a church devoid of the spirit of loyal support required to make it succeed we would as well surrender the field as a church and go out of business.


We make this statement only to give emphasis to our conception of the vital necessity of this arm of power to the church. We do not for a moment believe there will be hesitancy or lack of ample, prompt and vigorous support. Let us do the great and noble thing. We are not content to see the ordinary thing done. There is a reason for this. This is an extraordinary age, the needs are extraordinary, and we verily believe we are a people called and commissioned to do the extraordinary work demanded for the times. Let all records be broken by our preachers and people in the matter of book distribution. Supply your own home and church with an abundance of the best books. Then see to it that the hands and homes of thousands of individuals are supplied with our own books and booklets and other literature. God wants great things done. Let our people do something truly worthy of the church and of the cause and which will be pleasing to God.

THE WRITTEN PAGE is God's silent messenger to the souls of lost men. Shall we see that they get it? Brother, sister, God speaks to your heart. Will you listen, heed and promptly get about this, your Master's business?



The kitchen, the stable, the poultry house—indeed every part of the farm or home was better provided than the center table or bookshelves. And yet there were children in the home whom the devil was seeking to reach and debauch with the vile literature which met their gaze at every turn of life. For the cost of them, good religious books are the


best paying and cheapest investment a man can make for his home. Many fathers are far more careful about raising good colts than they are about raising fine children. And yet it pays better in dollars and cents, even, to raise good children than it does to raise good colts. Blooded colts sell for more money than common ones. But one bad boy can waste the income from a dozen fine colts every year and break the heart of the loving mother and father in addition.


HE above is a splendid illustration of the marvelous skill of man in a mechanical way. It represents the "last word" in type casting machinery, and, as is commonly heard, "does everything but talk." This machine produced everything on this page including headlines and the initial letter beginning this paragraph. By aid of this machine the pages of the Sunday school literature are set entire, no publication for that purpose carrying a single line set by hand, with the exception of the title. The wide scope of the machine is only one of its many good qualities. The rapidity of composition is limited only by the skill of the operator. An ordinary issue of the Herald of Holiness requires three days for composition; and this at only normal speed. The Kerald can be set in two days, operating the machine at its capacity. This machine makes possible the publication of a paper covering our entire connection. News coming in during the very last hour, or even half hour, allotted for composition, is handled easily for the current issue. While no attempt ordinarily is made to get news "down to the minute," yet the fact remains that when the case is at hand the machine is here to do it with. The machine with its present equipment has four faces. This number allows for all the faces necessary for the periodical work, and for circular and book work. By judicious combining of different faces the entire composing room force is limited to the machine and one hand man. The linotype saves in salaries for extra men its cost in two years' time. That is to say that whereas 11/2 men now do the entire composition on ALL the work, four would be required doing it by hand. So 21/2 mem are not required, and their salaries during all the years of the activity of the linotype are saved. This entire issue shows the many-sidedness of this wonderful machine. Look carefully through this paper and mark the many uses to which it has been put. Most of the work is done without the operator leaving his chair. Just as man cannot be at his best without the great essential



HE production of church periodicals is a task of no mean dimension. Not only must the literature be produced in a manner befitting the message it conveys, but the expense of producing in must ever be kept in mind Especially is this true in our Publishing House, as the growth in circulation of the literature ever presents new problems of production. Having a small (comparatively) circulation with which to meet the first cost of production-which is as great to us as to other houses having ten times the circulalation-we are careful to have only the best in the way of machinery with

which to produce the work. The opposite page presents the Linotype, that marvel of the composing room; and herewith is shown halftone pictures of some of the pressroom and bindery machinery. The Babcock Optimus cylinder press is used for printing the Herald of Holiness and other forms of corresponding size. The Herald is a one-impression job-that is, all sixteen pages printed at one time—and requires a sheet 40 x 56 inches. However, this is not the limit of size, the Optimus printing a sheet 44 x 65 inches.

The No. 1 Miehle cylinder press is used for the Sunday school literature. It is now being erected, and when in running order will produce our Sunday school periodicals-including Sunshine for Little People in colors-at the rate of two thousand an hour. It is a faster press than the Optimus, and produces first-grade work at a maximum speed. The further addition of a pony cylinder press-to produce the covers for the Sunday school periodicals, song books, etc.-will make a cylinder equipment of good service to us. A new design Gordon job press is used in printing the office stationery, blanks, receipt books, circulars, book notices, etc. It is a late model, and prints a sheet 12 x 18 inches. The bindery has a Brown book and newspaper folder, which folds, pastes and trims with but one feeding through, delivering the papers ready for mailing. The cut does not do justice to this excellent machine. When it is remembered that thousands upon thousands of sheets are fed through this machine each

month, the completeness of the operation is appreciated. At present an Advance hand-power cutting machine is used. As the work grows a power cutting machine will be added. The wire stitcher used for the periodicals and books is a Boston, easily the premier of stitching machines. At present this equipment, together with imposing stones, type cabinets, mailing tables, galley racks and paper storage, is in the basement of the main building Even in the rather crowded quarters, the amount of work turned out is amazing The difficulties-many, indeed-encountered in starting the central plant are gradually being overcome. We are submitting this special number of the Herald of Holiness as a sample of what can be done with this equipment. No inconsiderate factor in the production of the literature is the consciousness that it is being mightly used of God in bringing the knowledge of full salvation to many precious waiting hearts. Spurred on by the thought of the harvest for His kingdom, we are keyed up to use to the full capacity the tremendous possibilities in this modern machinery. With the cylinders printing the insides, the jobber

the covers, and the folder, stitcher and cutter finishing the work, and every piece turned out bearing a full gospel message, we are confident that the increase in plant will be fully provided for in good time. God is over all, and in His hands we entrust the future. His the work is, and His we are. So we labor on, pray on, trust on, knowing that He who cared first will coatinue His care. So we use the machinery and praise God for such an opportunity to

help to spread scriptural holiness.

And especially that it has been possible in the good providence of God to secure so fine a property in so advantageous a position for the carrying on of this work at Kansas City, Mo.

We recognize that this plan of the Church can not be carried out without heroic devotion and faith; embracing large sacrifice by the many. Who would have it otherwise? Who would desire that the work of Jesus Christ should go on with-

out our having a sacrificial part in it?

This work now calls for earnest prayer and work. Like the famous missionary we "Ask great things of God and undertake great things for God." The very great things must be done by the way of the throne; that we may be filled with supreme passion and undergirded with utmost devotion.

Faith and Works

DEAR FELLOW-WORKERS:

We, the Board of Publication of the Pentecostal Church of the Nazarene, having been authorized by the General Assembly to establish a church Publishing House, have undertaken this great work in the name of God and the church.

Our purpose is to establish an institution which shall publish in every possible form the gospel of full salvation. far we have had in a very marked manner the favor of God. We confidently expect His continued blessings and guidance. We are fully convinced that it is in accord with divine providence that every member of our church have a share in this great work. The General Assembly endorsed our request for a capital of \$50,000.00 for this business, a sum equal to two dollars and a half per member for the entire church. We therefore ask pastors and people to unite with us in observing Sunday, October 6th, as a day of prayer for this great enterprise. A Small Investment

The amount asked for as working capital for our Publishing House is a comparatively small sum. This may be readily seen by a comparison of figures. In an ordinary congregation it is necessary to invest from \$25 to \$100 in the church property for each person ministered to weekly. In the average college a much larger capital is required. For even a moderate equipment a college requires from \$250 to \$1000 for each person it serves.

The Publishing House of the Pentecostal Church of the Nazar-ene preaches the gospel of full salvation to over 50,000 persons weekly, and all the capital we ask for is one dollar a head for every person to whom we now minister. Furthermore, we can minister to ten times that number or one half million souls without increased capital.

Many of our people have already subscribed liberally. If the whole church will make as much of an effort as they can, there will be no difficulty in getting the amount needed. Only do your best, brother, and we will be satisfied.

When our publishing interests are properly presented to our people, there are many of them who desire to make larger subscriptions to the publishing house fund than they can pay immediately. We want all such to understand that we will gladly receive subscriptions to be paid in weekly, monthly, or quarterly installments. We need your help and you need the inspiration and blessing which will surely come to those who take special interest in this work, hence we are pleased to make any arrangement which will make this possible.

Who is Responsible for the Success of Our Church Paper

A. E. REINSCHMIDT

We need say but little concerning the merits of our paper; our paper does not need "patronizers" so much as patrons. The official and contributing staff have done their part well and have given us a good paper. Now, given a good, meritorious paper, WHO is to circulate it and HOW can it be successfully accomplished?

Who? While the membership and the evangelists and District and General Superintendents can do much to secure new subscribers, still the job is mainly up to the pastor in charge.

How is the securing of subscribers best brought about? Permit us to offer a few suggestions: (1) We must have an appreciation of the worth of the paper and of the people's need of the same. All of our own people need it to build them up and make them loyal Nazarenes; then, it should go into the homes of the unsaved, the homes of Christians who are not connected with any church, and to the members of other churches who may desire it, as propoganda of our church and doctrine. (2) Let every pastor determine that he will secure as large a list of subscribers as possible; set up a mark and aim at it and tell the people what you are trying to do; people will always help when they see we are trying to do something particular, definite. (3) Let each pastor take a pocket full of sample copies of the paper with him when making his pastoral calls. This will bring results when every other way fails. If the first copy fails to win a subscription, try another (different) copy. We gave a certain woman a sample copy and she refused to subscribe after reading it; we gave her a different number; she read it and came after us with a dollar for the paper, and we had to lend her our own paper till hers came through the mail. We must urge the paper upon individuals in the homes instead of merely presenting it to the public congregation in a general way. And, while we are making for the success of our paper, we will be incidentally strengthening our local church by every subscriber obtained.

We humbly submit the above, because we know it is practicable. By faith we saw possibilities where to the natural eye they seemed-slim, and we started out to get a certain number of subscriptions and we got them in six weeks and the possibilities are not exhausted yet. If every pastor would do what he can, one hundred per cent more people will be taking the Herald of Holiness before the end of 1912. This is an all-important matter. Brother pastors, let us show our appreciation of the labor and sacrifice of the brethren who have made our paper possible; let us show our loyalty to the cause we represent, by taking this matter on our hearts.

God bless our church, our schools, our publishing house our workers all, and all the saints every-

is unequalled as a holiness paper, and the people realize it. Every week we have new evidences that it meets with hearty approval from ministers and laymen who are looking for the things for which it stands.

We plan to issue good, low-priced books on every phase of the doctrine of holiness so that every one can secure them. The amount of money made for the author or publishers is our least consideration. Our business is to spread scriptural holiness over all lands and our first concern is to issue books in a style and at a price which will insure the widest circulation. Our mission is preaching the gospel. The matter of profits is only incidental. To effectually accomplish this end we need the co-operation of all our pastors and people. We want you to read our books and to sell them to every person you can reach.

Thousands of persons can be reached through the agency of books. Our people can afford to become enthusiasts in the matter of circulating holiness literature.

As the new books are issued we will advertise them in the Herald of Holiness. When the announcements appear let every pastor take up the matter and see how many in the congregation want the new book; then order enough to supply them. In this way thousands of good books can be quickly scattered. If the pastor does not undertake it, let some member of the congregation take up the matter and sell the books. Let us sow this country down with literature which is full of holy fire. This method alone, if well followed, will bring about a revival of old-time religion.

In the mechanical department of our institution we purpose to install the best machinery of the kind our work requires and to employ persons who are competent to produce the highest grade product. Those who are familiar with such work express great surprise that we have gotten so much accomplished in the short time since the work was started. The providence of God has been manifest in all of this and He has answered prayer in many ways, for which we give Him the praise and the glory.

Go Ye and Preach

We as a church are commanded to go and commissioned to preach. Are we doing it? One of the most effectual ways of preaching the gospel and oftentimes the only means of reaching certain classes is through the printed page. The world has gone ahead of the church in using printers' ink to accom-

plish its ends.

We have an idea that it would please our heavenly Father if holiless literature were just as easily obtained, as attractively gotten up and as low in price as any other kind of literature. When we talk of making holiness books as cheap as some other kinds of books, some say, "holiness books are worth more than other kinds of books, and ought to bring more." might reply in saying that a real first class gospel sermon is worth more than a lecture on Mark Twain, or a rhapsody on the merits of Shakespeare and Browning. but they do not bring as much in the open market.

Jesus our Redeemer came to seek and to save that which was lost. He came to the lost sheep of the house of Israel. When He left the world He commissioned men to go in His stead. We are of the apostolic succession, and the command to us is GO PREACH! The point is to reach the people with the gospel. If by investing a little capital in a permanent business and the exercise of a little wisdom, ingenuity and zeal in the production and circulation of holiness lit- . erature we can reach twice or three times as many people as have been reached heretofore, the responsibility-is upon us to DO IT.

We have the facilities and the plans and the opportunity for doing it now. Shall we do it? If the l'entecostal Church of the Nazarene will furnish its Publishing House with even a moderate capital on which to operate the book business we here and now covenant to set a new pace in the work of publishing and distributing holi-

ness literature.

The question is, are nen and women "born again" and "baptized with the Holy Ghost?" When this is not the case, there is no real church—the called out—of God. This is the test which we desire all men to apply to the Pentecostal Church of the Nazar-

WHAT DOES IT BELIEVE?

The Penetcostal Christ of the Nazarene stands for apostolic purity of doctrine, primitive simplicity of worship and pentecostal pow-er in experience. The dispensational truth be-ing: that Jesus Christ baptizes believers with the Holy Ghost, cleansing them from all sin, and empowering them to witness the grace of God to men, this church stands especially for this truth and this experience. We recognize that the right and privilege of men to church membership rests upon the fact of their being regenerate; and would only require such state-ments of -belief as are essential to, and the maintenance of, that condition and experience. That a soul is entirely sanctified subsequent to justification through faith in the Lord Jesus Christ. 6. That the Spirit of God bears witness in the human heart to justification by faith, and to the further work of the entire sanctification of helitages.

es have fallen and are falling into worldliness, because of the lack of that second definite work of grace, known as being sanctified wholly; and knowing that there is a grace for justified souls where they may stand and rejoice in hope of the glory of God; and that it is the privilege and duty of all Christians to walk in the light and prove the power of the blood of Jesus Christ to cleanse from all sin: feeling so deeply that they must bear this message to men and create a center where the fire of Pentecost should so burn that men and women would be saved from sin and preserved blameless; they were ready to abandon all for this purpose. They were convinced that the dispensational truth—that which makes this a dispensation—is, that Jesus Christ baptizes with the Holy Ghost, cleansing human hearts and enduing them with power for testimony.

With these convictions, and by the impulse of the Holy Spirit, they went forth, "in the ful-ness of the blessing of Christ," to preach and witness to men.

Like the mustard seed in the parable, there were small beginnings: a few men and women standing and covenanting together with holy awe and sacred thanksgiving unto Him who had called them to be partakers of His holiness, that they would preach and testify this gospel of perfect love to all men as they had oppor-tunity, and seek souls for Jesus Christ. There were a few small churches in the East which united together, and a little band at Los Angeles near the western sea. And some seeds had fallen in the sunny Southland, wide spread. which began to spring up in the valleys and on the prairies. The work steadily grew until the branches, reaching forth every way, interlocked from East, and West, and South, in the center of the nation. Thousands of people were converted and sanctified, and they who were not a people became a people. In multitudes of places hungry, longing hearts are beckoning us to come and help them establish centers of fire, where pentecostal glory and power shall burn all the time, and men and women be able to find the fulness of the blessing of Christ. We wave back the answer, "We're coming."

7. In the resurrection of the 'dead and the life everlasting.

This church regards as more especially its work to preach the gospel to the poor and to organize people into church life, where holiness unto the Lord shall have right of way. ITS ADVANTAGES

What are the advantages of such a church? It is sad enough to know that there are many hundreds of communities where the gos-pel of holiness is never preached, but it seems

far worse that there are many places where a holiness camp meeting or revival has been held and where the ecclesiastical authorities use their position and power to smother or freeze out the life of those who have found the more abundant life

It is true that people can live through it all, but it is also true that they can live far better, grow faster and do more good when in a church that is in harmony with them, and where the very foundation of the society is

laid on the doctrine for which they stand. No turn of the wheel or change of authority can shut such a church against the old-time Bible doctrine of sanctification.

Clean and Unclean—Mark 7:1-23

E. F. WALKER, D. D.

How often the enemies of Christ get together in apparently respectable fellowship of unholy conspiracy against the Lord. (v. 1)

Religious fault-finders imagine they are serving God when only finding fault with good people. (v. 2)

Holding to traditions is the chief religious reverence and service with many. (v. 3)

Ceremonial ablutions that have always had prominent place among traditional cer-emonialists militate against pure religion and undefiled before God the Father. (v. 4)

Men pretend to find fault with Christ's followers, when really they are criticising Christ Himself, (v. 5)

Lip-service with heart disloyal is illpleasing to the righteous God who looketh upon the heart. (v. 6)

"You hypocrites" are words addressed by Christ to avowed custodians of truth, and professed practicers of righteousness, because their hearts are not right in His sight. (v.6)

Empty is the worship of mere traditionalists who magnify the sayings of men above the Scriptures of God. (v. 7)

Mere ceremony is followed often to the neglect of morality and obedience to divine dictates. (v. 8)

God's word is rejected by false religionists who are apparently very zealous to what they conceive as the "faith of their fathers." (v. 9)

What Moses said God said, for that man of God was the mouthpiece and penman of

the Most High. (v. 10) Human say-so is set over against the plain commandment of God. (v. 11)

Religious censors and bosses-drivers falsely called leaders-destroy the law of God by their own impious requirement of their "followers" (v. 12)

They who "make the word of God of none effect"—whether known as traditionalists, rationalists, modernists, higher critics, or what not-are sure to do many things against that word. ((v. 13)

Christ is the great authoritative Teacher who would give the true doctrine to the people who have been robbed and led astray by the "doctors" and "professors." (v. 14)

Mere externalism does not and cannot defile the real man any more than it does or can cleanse him. (v. 15)

"Ears to hear" are necessary. Mere artistically formed pieces of fibre on the side of the head are vain. Ears should be mediums through which thought conveyed by speech may be taken into mind and heart. (v. 16)

Christ has His privy council for His own, apart from the crowd, where His disciples may get deeper draughts and clear perceptions of truth. (v. 7)

Gentle reproof is an efficient and legitimate way of instructing slow learners of God's truth. (v. 18)

To take in materially is not the same as to take in spiritually, as the belly and the heart are not one. (v. 19)

Heart procedures that are vile defile the whole man. (v. 20)

In fact, sin of all kinds comes from the

unclean heart. (vs. 21-22)
Things in the heart that are not pure and right are evil in God's esteem ere they proceed from the heart. (v. 23)

The great lesson of our study today is that all real impurity is resident in and springs from a sinful heart, and that if the heart is not made clean all external and ceremonial washings are in vain—worse than useless. Unwashen hands may exist where the heart is pure, and hands as white as the lily may do dirty deeds prompted by the impure heart.

But "clean hands" also stand for right-eous deeds. "Who shall ascend into the hill of the Lord? or who shall stand in his holy place? He that hath clean hands and a pure heart" (David).

"Now do ye Pharisees make clean the outside of the cup and the platter; but your inward part is full of ravening and wickedness" (Jesus).

SPIRITUAL LIGHTS

REV. J. N. SHORT

As we understand the spirit and practices of the Pharisees it would seem most incredible that they should be so foolish as to so pervert the word of God, which they professed to believe, and rest in forms and ceremonies without the incorporation of the right motives and purposes of the heart.
We naturally inquire, Why is it intelligent people, under light, resort to these things, and depend upon them for salvation? Skeptics deny the word of God to their own damage. But the Bible is its own proof. Many deny the fall of man, and thus the depravity of the heart. Yet the very spirit and practice of the Pharisees, with that of men today, is its proof. In any matter of business pertaining to

world, where profit and loss are at stake, what intelligent man would ever be so blind and foolish? You cannot find a man, doing business for this life, who would do anything so foolish as to wash his hands, when they were clean, and believe that ceremony would bring final salvation. The proof that man fell away from God

in the beginning, and that all men have inherited the taint, as the word of God declares, is that man naturally is depraved: his state and life prove it. In nothing do the same class of men show themselves so absurd and foolish as respecting their sal-They are blind, and do not naturally see the truth, and by nature do not want it as God's revealed truth, and truth only.
But of that same class of men this cannot be said as to their relation to this life and what it affords. Such a man desires success in business. He chooses naturally to take the course which will bring success. He is not content to act blindly; he wants to know the success or failure of the course

In the end of the business year he will take account of stock to discover whether it is a winning or a losing game with him. To have success he knows there are certain accepted standards to which he must conform, and by which alone he can hope to Then he will not allow himself to be doing business in the dark. He directs

his course by certain accepted standards.
God's revealed word is the standard of
truth, His revealed will. To be right with
God is to be conformed to His word. And even under the old dispensation, when men did not have the witness of the Spirit that they were the children of God, as the apostle say we do now, yet they had a certain witness borne to them that they pleased God when they walked in the truth. Enoch had this witness.

Then would a man, if he desired truth

only, go through certain empty forms and ceremonies, as washing his hands and cleansing the outside of the cup and platter, and rest his eternal salvation, his rightness with God. on such action? If he desired to be right with God, as intelligent men do business for this life, he would test his course by the standard of truth, and be certain that he was harmonizing with the will of God.

If he was not fallen, depraved and blind, or, if being so, desiring to be right with God, would he not seek to know what God's will concerning him was? Would he not take account of stock morally to find out what gain was resulting to himself by the course he was pursuing?

What is man's condemnation before God? It is that light has come into the world, and that it is at his disposal. This principle is true in any age. Every man is condemned who does not try his spirit, bearing and action by the light God has placed at his disposal.

Jesus plainly showed that man's condemnation is not that he is born in sin, but "This is the condemnation, that light has come into the world, and men loved darkcome into the world, and men loved dark-ness rather than light, because their deeds were evil. For every one that doeth evil hateth light, neither cometh to the light lest his deeds should be reproved. But he that doeth truth cometh to the light, that his deeds may be made manifest that they are wrought in God."

This is the true test of every man's relation before God. In principle it applied to the scriptures of the Pharisees, and to all men in every age, as the apostle shows in his epistle to the Romans, 1st chap., 18-20 vs. The Pharisees had turned away from their scriptures, and had substituted their thought for the thought of God. They were not after truth only; they had distorted the word of God.

They were not without clear light. When a lawyer would tempt Jesus by asking what he must do to inherit eternal life, Jesus said to him, "What is written in the law? How readest thou?" The lawyer answered "Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy strength, and with all thy mind, and thy neighbor as thyself." To this Jesus replied, "Thou hast answered right; this do, and thou shalt live."

But, with this clear light, and the approval of his understanding of the law by Jesus Himself, he began to quibble to justify him-self by asking, "Who is my neighbor?" And men, instead of obeying, have been doing this ever since in the face of the plain truth of God.

This then is their condemnation, that they have the light, but are disposed to quibble to justify themselves, avoiding yielding fully to the truth. And many today are relying on forms and ceremonies as much as did the Pharisees, and they are doing it for the same reason. But their condemnation is greater because of the added light of the gospel of Christ and the demonstration of its truth in experience. -

They know as we know it was written in their scriptures, "Man looketh on the outward appearance, but the Lord looketh on the heart." Again "For as he thinketh in his heart, so is he." Faith in God, "Faith which worketh by love," forbids a man to rest in outward forms and in the mere saying of prayers.

But we may fall into the same error in principle when we profess to believe and do not obey the truth; when we pray and do not obey the light God gives; when we presume upon God's favor, and do not meet the conditions in His word.
