Spring revival . . . Dr. Harry Jessop. Gould Memorial Lectures and revival scenes and inspiring messages by Dr. Jessop.

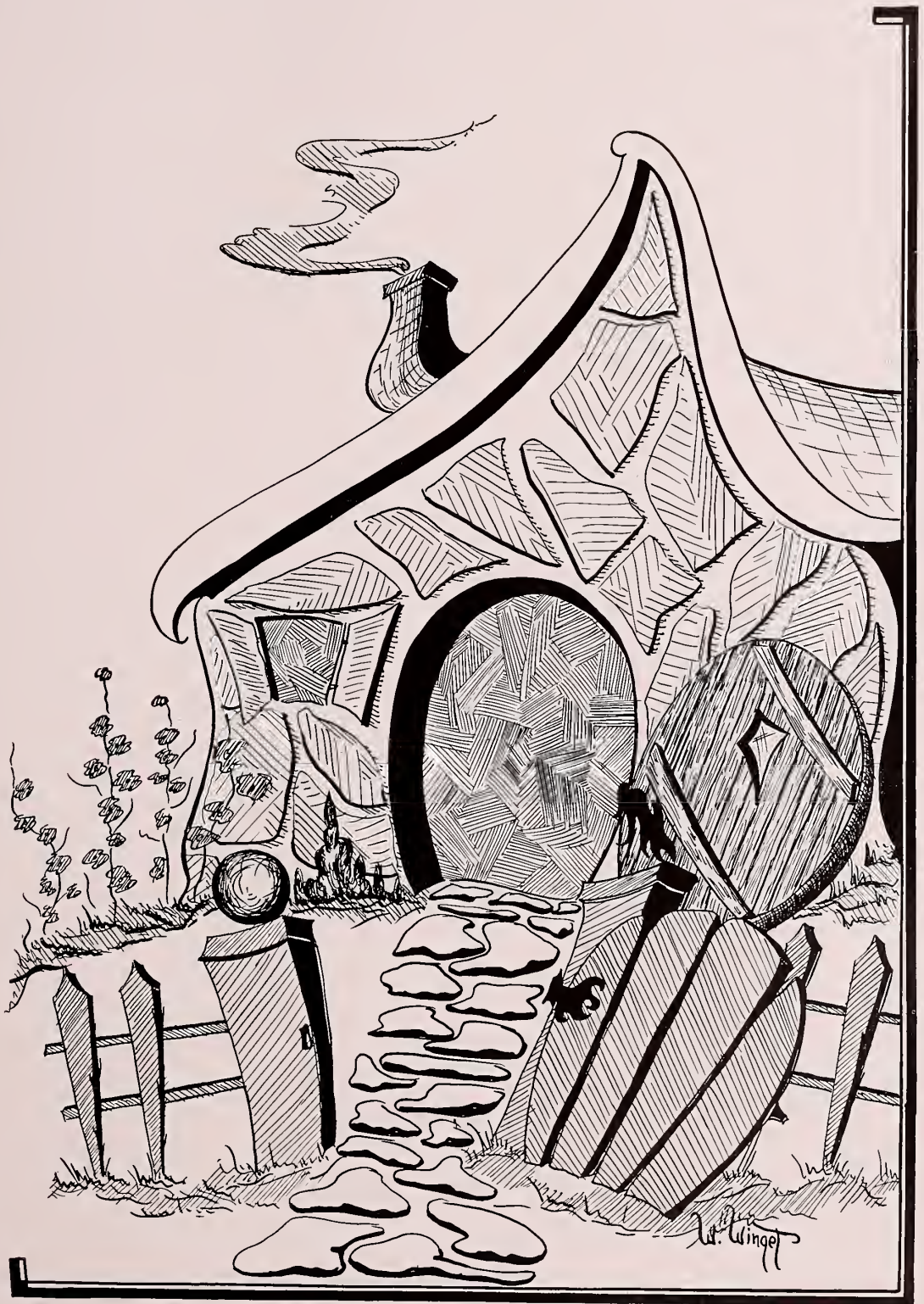

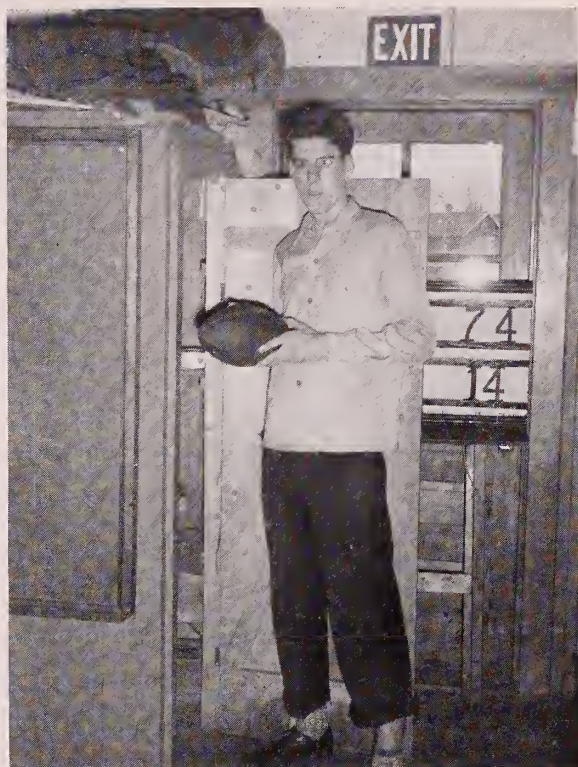

FRESHMAN CLASS

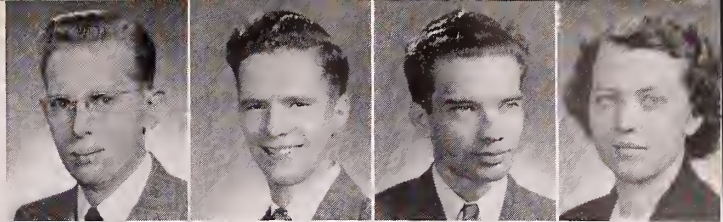

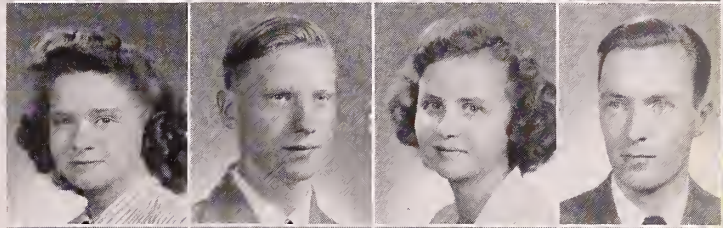
Rush Day arrived and we joined the society of our choice — or of our friends' choice. From then on competition increased as we met one another on the football field and basketball court.

SOPHOMORE CLASS

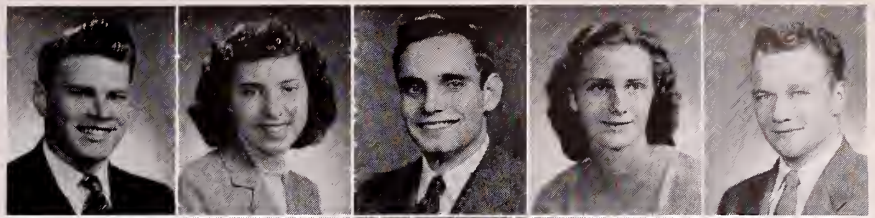

Two of the recitals represented the music department. Beulah Naylor very capably rendered the Italian selection, "Una Voce Poco Fa", and several numbers in German.

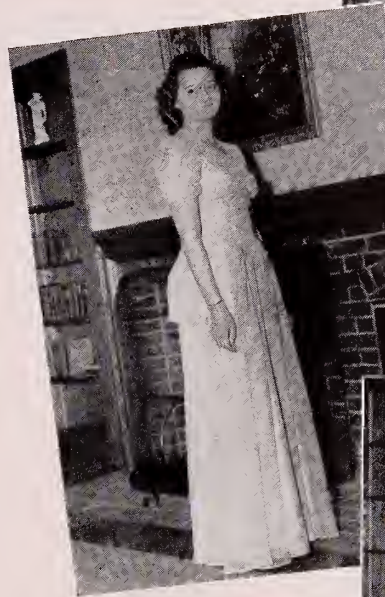
Eleanor Smith's organ recital made us all appreciate more truly the beauty and majesty of the organ. Her interpretation of Bach is not to be forgotten.

The story of **The Robe** became more vivid and powerful as interpreted by Albert Stiefel.

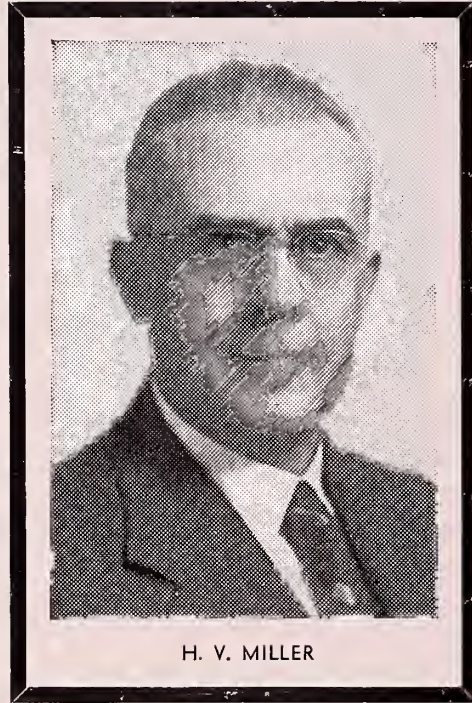
