## North-Central Representative Surveys Bethany's Liberal Arts

Dr. E. Ray McCartney, a representative from the North-Central association, was on the college campus December 9. He is a coordinator in Liberal Arts study. Dr. McCartney is the dean at Fort Hays State college in Hays, Kansas.

The purpose in the visit was to provide assistance in improving the teaching in the Liberal Arts department. Dr. McCartney also reviewed the studies which are now in progress. He met with the committee on improvement of instruction, and the committee on educational policies. He also met twice with the entire faculty. The purpose of visit was not to draw conclusions but to assist and offer improvement suggestions.

# **College History Professors Meet**

Attending the sixth annual conference of the Oklahoma association of College History Professors were Dr. Fred Floyd, Dr. James Garner, and Professor Jack Rairdon. The conference was held at Southeastern State college, Durant, Oklahoma, December 4 and 5.

Those present agreed that it was very worthwhile in helping the history professors of Oklahoma get acquainted and exchange ideas. Climaxing the meeting was a luncheon, followed by a business session in which plans were made for the next conference to be held at Enid.

Other colleges and universities represented were: Oklahoma university, Oklahoma A & M, Tulsa university, Phillips university, Northeastern State college, Oklahoma College for Women, Central State college, Panhandle A & M, and Northern Oklahoma Jun-

At the age of fifty, George Frederick Handel, composer of THE MESSIAH, realized that he was no longer the musical idol of the English people and consequently his savings were being rapidly consumed. He was also very ill because paralysis had left him with a ravaging fever.

Against the orders of his pnysician he traveled to Aachen, a city in Prussia on the Belgian border, for hot bath treatments. As a result, he improved both physically and mentally but was left poverty stricken.

Becoming impressed by the scriptural text included in a libretto he had been solicited to compose, he set himself to work at composing and for 24 days and nights he worked without food or sleep. As a result of this maddening tempo, he presented to the world THE MESSIAH.
