About \$2,000 was pledged for Trevecca with several individuals giving \$100.00 each. This money is to be used on the new Men's Dormitory, in the kitchen, or wherever it is needed to improve the school.

Miss Gladys Owen, who will leave New York by airplane on October 27 for South Africa, as a missionary of the Church of the Nazarene, was special speaker for the missionary prayer service Thursday evening, October 3, and for the regular school prayer meeting last Wednesday evening. Miss Owen, a graduate of Trevecca High School (1940) and of Trevecca Nazarene College (A.B., 1944), will teach in the secondary school of Brenersdorp Mission Station.

"It's hard to say in a few words what Trevecca has meant to me," Miss Owen said. "Trevecca offered me the opportunity to get the preparation that I needed. The educational and religious beliefs formed during the years I spent here gave me a firm foundation for further work."

In addition to her undergraduate work here, she took graduate training at Ohio Wesleyan University, Delaware, Ohio, where she was awarded the Master of Arts degree last July.

In addressing the missionary group, Miss Owen said, "When I first came to Trevecca ten years ago, my call to the mission field seemed to be in the far distant future."

There were many things to turn her from her chosen course, but through praying and living close to God, she is at the door of the glorious fulfillment of her calling. Our prayers and interests go with her as she enters the work to which she has dedicated her life.
